Lufkin Newsprint Plant About Ready To Operate

Lufkin, Texas, Dec. 19—The world's first pine pulp newsprint plant probably will go into commercial production a few days after Jan. 1, its directors predicted after a thorough once-over last Monday.

The \$6,000,000 mill four miles north of here went through a rehearsal, the machinery turning over for the first time in a demonstration showing everything but the actual production of paper.

Fifteen hundred cords of peeled pine were stacked in the mill's woodyard, ready for the grinders which will turn it into pulp. Directors said only a few details remain to complete construction of the plant which grew out of the experiments of Dr. Charles H. Herty, Savannah scientist, who believed southern pine could be made into paper suitable for newspapers.

E. L. Kurth of Lufkin, president of the company, Southland Paper Mills, Inc., presided at the business session of the board.


