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

#### Patterned Fabrics Affect Figure, H. D. Agent Says

Many seamstresses fall to realize that a patterned fabric can change their apparent shape. advises Mrs. Barbara M. Elliott County Home Demonstration

The larger the pattern in the fabric, the more likely it is to increase the size of the figure, Designs that are large, round, or in squares or checks seem to enlarge a figure more than do vertically arranged patterns such as stripes or florals.

Vertical lines repeated without interruption within a rectangular silhouette will emphasize height, An unbelted sheath dress in a stripe fabric worn by a tall, thin person will accent the height and thinness.

The same belted sheath on a short stocky woman, on the other hand, will exaggerate her weight and shortness. The vertical lines, uninterruped, cause the eye to follow across the figure instead of up and down.

Small, dainty patterns look well on small figures. They are especially attractive on fragile, delicate women.

Contrasting colors of equal you use them for trim. Consider using a contrast around your face for center of interest. Use patterned fabric in a garment to contrast with solid colors, making certain the pat-


