Students of history, railroad buffs, teachers, writers and others will find the eleventh edition of the "Railroad Film Directory," released recently by the Association of American Railroads, to be of extraordinary interest. The Directory is a guide to more than 345 films and slide films owned by or relating to the American railroads.

There are films for child and adult entertainment, films on freight handling...one is even based on the ever popular children's classic about "The Little Engine That Could."

These films are by far more than a dry document of an industry. One is entitled "The Great Train Robbery," the famous pioneer film production by Edison in 1903. Others have to do with the Civil War period, the opening of the West, Indian ceremonies, inventions in America's growth, the logging railroads of the west, iron ore from Labrador, tomorrow's railroading, etc., through an almost endless list.

The "Railroad Film Directory" is in effect a directory of American folklore. This is logical, since the rails have been and are the backbone of the American transportation system, and during most of the life of the nation have been closely associated with the important events that have shaped American history. The story of the railroads is the story of the United States.

**Safety Officer, Ralph W. Briscoe, Talks To B&PW Members Tuesday Evening**

Safety Officer, Ralph W. **The Good Earth**

Mrs. Emmet Wyche and I visited the lovely spacious home of Mrs. Noah Lane recently. As we drove up the circular driveway, my thoughts were... Here is a home landscaped for year-round beauty.

A low brick retaining wall completely surrounds the yard. Pfitzer Juniper winds gracefully around the circular driveway and acts as a screen from the road. Highly colored Nandina, japonica, pyracantha and roses frame the front of the house. Blue Spruce and native cedar stand guard, like sentinels, at each end of the house.

English Ivy curls its tendrils up the wall on the northside of the patio, where large pots of roses rest at its feet. A rustic wrought iron bench of white seems to say, sit and enjoy the view.

Tall arborvitae run the full length of the back yard, cutting the west sun off in the summer and the cold blustery wind in the winter. A large barbecue pit and table turn the yard into a picnic ground in the summer. Two barren mulberry trees show promise of summer shade.

The privacy of the back yard and the feeding station with two bird baths, make a good sanctuary for mocking birds in the summer, and many different kinds of birds in the winter.

Mrs. Lane enjoys looking out her studio window at a pair of red birds feeding.

Mrs. Lane has pot plants scattered through the house to capture the greenery of summer and hold it until spring.

As one enters the house the first thing to catch the eye is a large pot of schefflera, a five-leaved plant that somewhat resembles the castor bean tree. On the opposite side of the door a pot of poinsettia shares the limelight with a large rubber plant as it graces the large picture window.

Two brick planter boxes, filled with palms and Philodendron divide the studio from the living room area. It is in this studio that Mrs. Lane spends most of her spare time.

A large arrowhead Philodendron sends its graceful tendrils climbing up the dining room wall. An ivy makes a complete frame of a dining room window. A large pot of schefflera drinks in the east sun from the kitchen window.

Mrs. Lane is a self-taught artist. She won a blue ribbon on her first painting, "Winter Ice Storm," which by the way, was painted with a cotton wrapped tooth pick. No brush had yet been purchased, as Mrs. Lane was only experimenting with oils.

Not only does Mrs. Lane paint scenic pictures, she paints abstracts, modernistic and still life. Many of her frames she makes herself, they, too, are a work of art.

An abstract, "Symbol of Growth," shows the sun shining down on plants just uncurling from the soil. In the corner is Faith, Hope and Charity. Mrs. Lane said one must have faith that the seed would sprout and hope that they would grow and

produce so one could show charity by dividing with the community.

One abstract, "Rock," was painted for Mrs. Lane's son, who majored in geology in college, where he learned to love rocks. The colors remind one of wood from the petrified forest.

Most of Mrs. Lane's paintings were done from scenes around her home and ranch. An oil well all lighted up, for the night crew, is so realistic one can almost smell the oil and hear the clanging of the machinery as they bring in a well.

The scene that impressed me most was still in the easel not quite finished. It was of a breath taking sunset, with a lake nestling against the hills. A river flowing from the lake, on either side of the river two barren

trees, with graceful branches, stand silhouetted against the last dying rays of the sun.

A modernistic painting, "The Year of the Hair," shows three different girls in as many different hair styles. Mrs. Lane painted the panel for her granddaughter, so she would remember the changing styles.

It would take pages to describe all of Mrs. Lane's paintings, as she has two rooms lined with dreams transferred to canvas.

Mrs. Lane is a new member of the Haskell Garden Club. She will be a great asset to it with her many artistic talents.

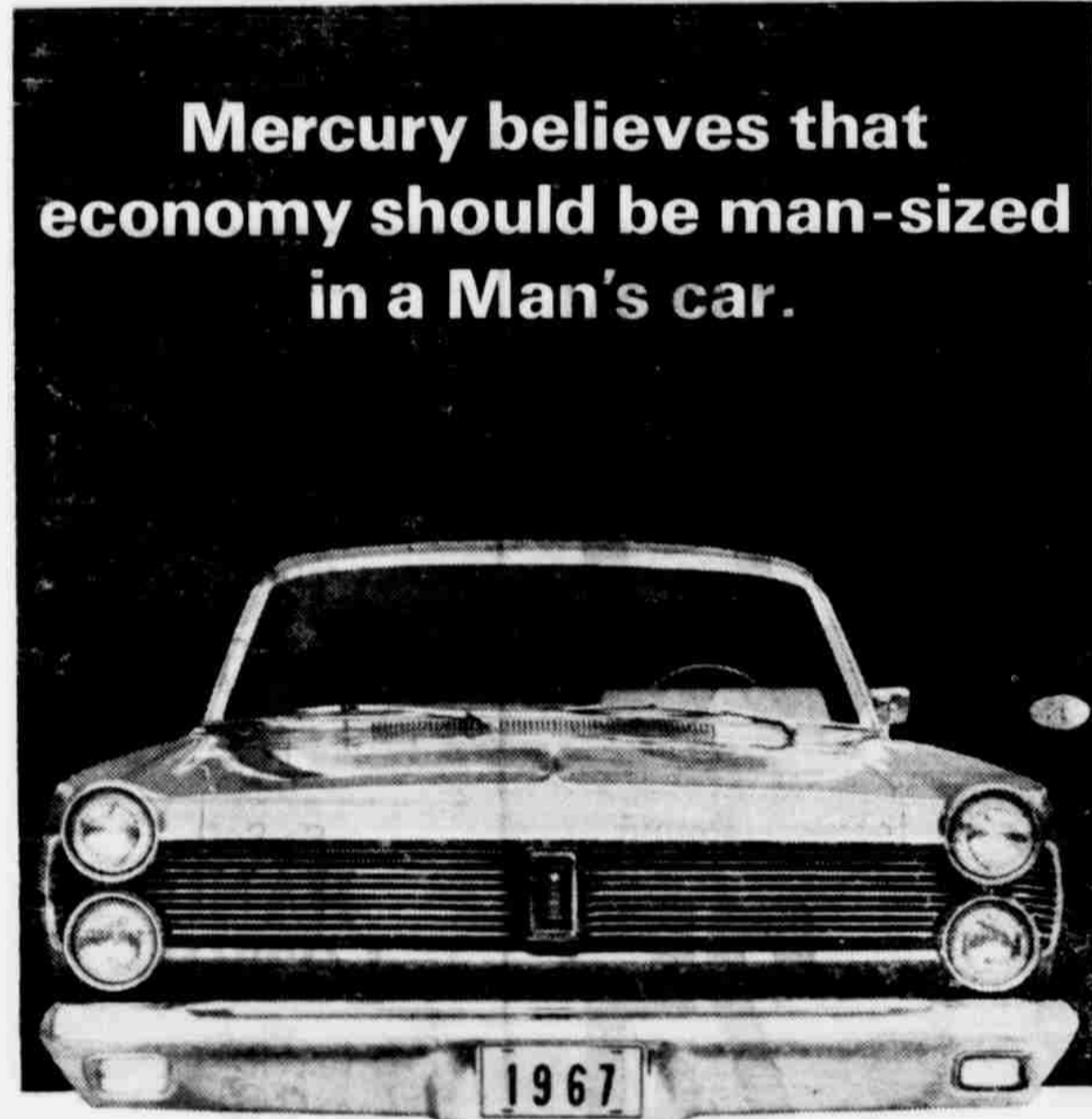

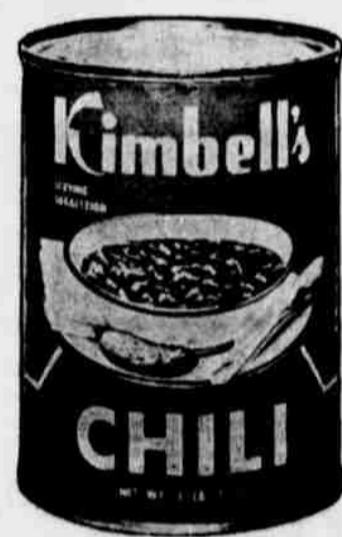

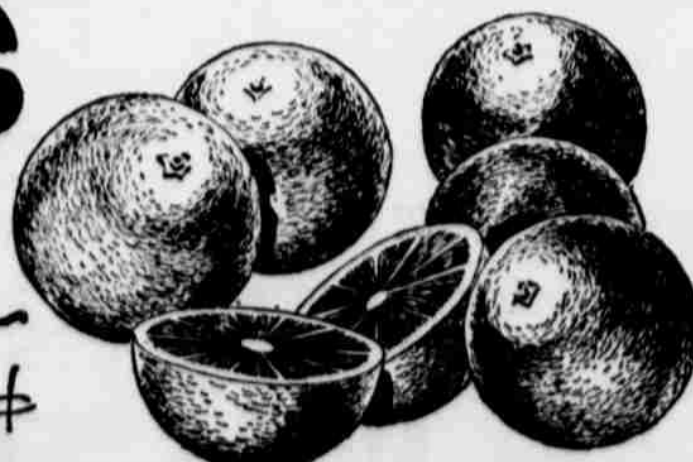

Testing of different varieties, new crops, fertilizer application and placement, disease resistant seed and varieties are just a few of the demonstrations that can be profitable to a farmer or rancher in the county. Usually these tests are a combined effort of a farm or ranch producer and the county agricultural agent. Schumann emphasizes that it is important that accurate records and data be kept on the tests so that the results will have a real meaning.

The crops and livestock subcommittees of the Haskell County program building committee help determine just what

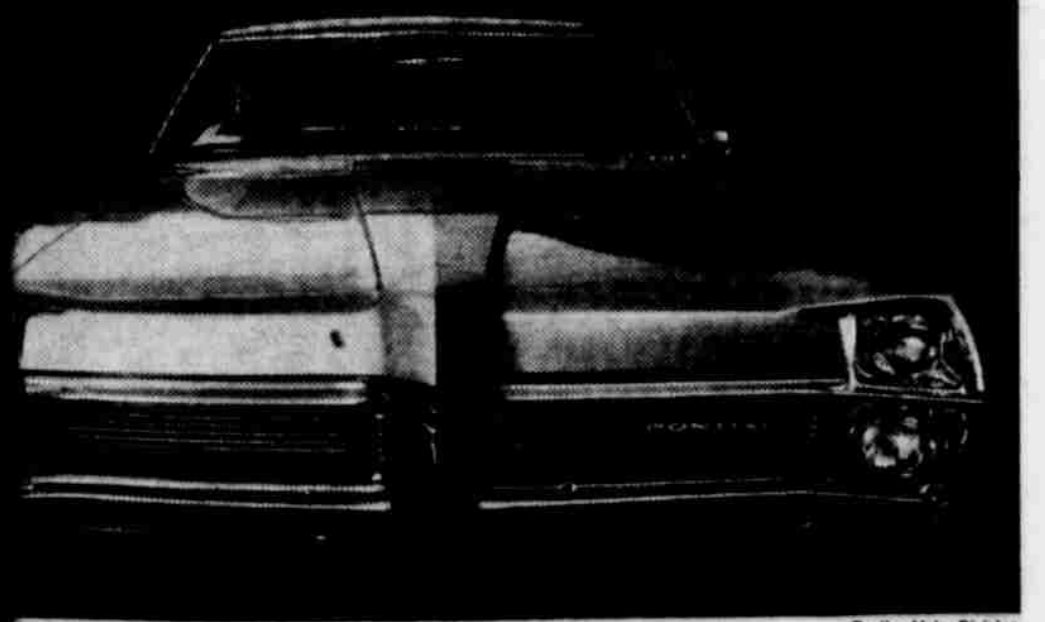

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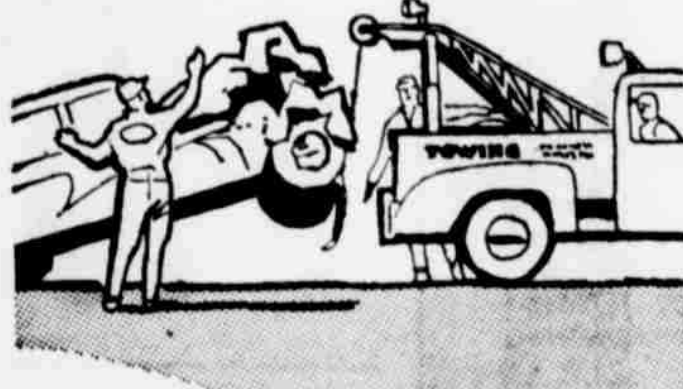

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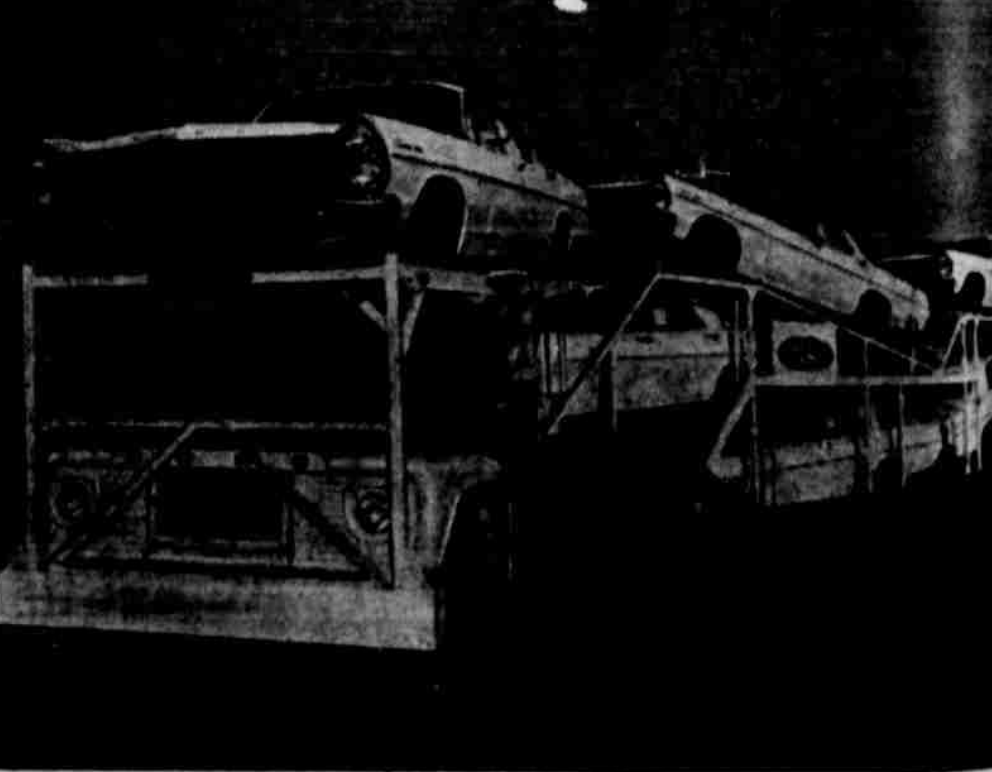
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
