

NUMBER FORTY-FOUR

The Democratic column on the general election ballot lists nominees for all offices to be filled this year. The Republican and the Constitutional Party columns list only nominees for several state offices.

From all indications turn-out is expected to be fairly heavy for an off presidential election year. Especially is the race be-tween Democrat Waggoner Carr and Republican John Tower for United States Senator, creating considerable interest.

Also, voters will decide the fate of a whopping sixteen pro-posed (wordy) amendments to the State Constitution being submitted for approval or rejecto tion.

## Early Eating Habits Are Very Important Many impressions children

have about foods are establish-ed during the elementry school years. Such impressions can develop into strong likes and dislikes that may mean a child will avoid the most nutritious foods

It is important for parents to encourage positive attitudes toward foods and good eating habits, says Mrs. Barbara El liott, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent,

Research shows that the diets of many school children lack the essential nutrients - calcium, ascorbic acid and vitamin A. This deficiency can become more serious as the child grows older because he tends to eat less of the food he needs.

To correct or avoid this nutritional deficiency, p a r e n t s should provide adequate a-mounts of milk, citrus fruits and dark green or deep yellow or orange vegetables in each day's meal pattern.

Parents reinforce good eating habits by setting a good ex-ample, Mrs. Elliott notes. Children hardly see the importance of eating a good meal when adults don't. Since breakfast is



Actually, the outcome of the vote amendment will likely decide whether Texas will have annua registration, permanent voter registration, or some other sys registration.

A majority vote FOR "repealing the poll tax as a requirem voting" would require annual registration of voters without p of a fee.
