Proposed Cross Town Water Mains, Pump Station, Reservoir for Haskell

Mayor J. E. Walling announced today that sealed bids are being received at the office of the city secretary, city hall, until 2:00 p. m. March 31, then publicly opened and read, for furnishing all plant, labor, materials, equipment, supervision, incidentals and performing all the work required for the construction of a proposed Cross Town Water Mains, a Pump Station, and an 800,000 gallon storage reservoir to be located in Haskell.

Walling said that all proposals shall be accompanied by a cashier's check or certified check upon a National or State bank in the amount of 10% of the total maximum bid price, payable without recourse to the City of Haskell, or a bid bond in the same amount from a surety company acceptable to the City of Haskell as a guarantee that the bidder will enter into the contract and execute a performance bond and payment bond within 7 days after a notice of award of the contract to him.

"Bidding documents may be examined in the office of the city secretary, city hall, Haskell," Mayor Walling said.

RURAL PLANTS PAY

A BUSINESSMAN who should know, says that it is good business for new plants to locate in rural areas. His comments are of special interest to Texans for two reasons. He placed one of the plants in rural Texas in recent years. Also, Texas greatly needs rural industrialization to bolster the economy of many counties.

W. B. Murphy, Campbell Soup Co. president, has urged American businessmen to help ease farm unemployment and relieve urban congestion by locating more plants outside of cities.

Twenty of the last 26 plants built by the soup firm have been placed in rural areas. One of their largest recent installations is in Lamar County, near Paris.

Murphy cited their experience at this plant to dispel the myth that plants can't get skilled workers unless they are in large cities. "Our experience proved that myth to be very wrong," he commented. "At Paris, Texas, it took only seven months to get a plant into full-scale operation from a standing start."

He also demolished another myth that has kept industries in cities. This was the belief that company executives would be unhappy in small towns.

"We discovered that as soon as our new plants get well established in a community, the impact is reflected by development of the town to the extent that it is an ideal place to live. It isn't long," Murphy commented, "before we have a real difficult time transferring our executives from the country. One big advantage there is that it takes only 10 minutes to get to work."

The canning firm executive told advisers to U. S. Department of Agriculture that decentralization industry is a "self-serving proposition" that will help rural development and reduce urban problems.

A need for spreading industries over Texas is being emphasized by Texas leaders. Texas Industrial Commission Executive Director Harry Clark warned community leaders not long ago that 260 towns now on the map will disappear by the year 2000 unless they can develop local industries.

Clark has said that it is to the benefit of all of Texas to have new plants scattered rather than overwhelmingly concentrated in a few populous counties. Others have pointed to the stagnated or declining population in more than half of the state's counties as undesirable, especially since some of these counties lack the economic strength to support the public institutions they require.

With the manpower needs of agriculture steadily shrinking, and the number of farms dwindling, rural counties increasingly need job opportunities for young people to check their rush to cities and provide revenue. Many of these areas merit consideration by industries seeking new locations, as the experience of Campbell Soup Company has proved.
