

Trial testimony said the fight started when Mullins and Herman Lacy went to a woman's of his hay. house. She slammed the back door on them. White, a neighbor, came from his house and told the men the woman was not at home. Owens and Lacy argued with him, and White picked up three bricks and threw them, one hitting Mullins in the head. Mullins claimed self-defense.

The knife was never found, but White's trousers were shown to the jury, with a tear in the front.

The appeals court reviewed the evidence as to its proper presentation and concluded that Mullins had had a fair trial, and affirmed the sentence.

Application Made theran Church, Thursday, Dec. By Water Board For Federal Aid

> A called meeting of the board of directors of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority was held in Munday, on Tuesday night of last week. to outline necessary plans to make an application for a federal grant, as provided in the recently enacted Public Law 89117 of the 89th Congress.

The act provides for grants to assist in construction of water facilities where there is a need of financial assistance in development of needed projects. The board voted unanimously to make formal application for the grant to assist in construction of the Millers Creek Reservoir, which has been held up

for a number of years by opposition, claiming the cost was rohibitive in its original form. Preliminary applcation was made at the FHA Office in Seymour, Monday morning, November 29, and it was forwarded to the State Office at Temple, Texas by Mr. L. B.

Patterson. The board is of the opinion that, if a grant can be secured to assist in the project's cost, the stalemate which the authority has experienced can be eliminated.

"Plucky" Danny Isbell Surprising **Doctors And Physical Therapists**

On October 15. 1964, Danny learn to use available muscles Isbell was surprising defensive to do the normal tasks which players on the Ira football team were automatic before the injury, and to have other forms as he quarterbacked the Paint Creek squad.

Most of the time since then, Texas Rehabilitation Center, he has spent in surprising doctors and physical therapists with his trip back from what for many youths could have meant total and permanent disability.

'Guts is the only word for Shelley V. Smith, director of the West Texas Rehabilita-tion Center, says. "Danny has gotten excellent therapy from the time he was injured, but most of his progress is due to the fact that he's convinced he will walk again and he has the determination to carry through with what we can do for him.'

Danny was playing defensive halfback when he was injured. As he tells it, "I dived for the ball carrier. I guess that's where I made my mistake, I should have kept my feet on the ground. His knee hit me in the side of the head and that was it." The blow crushed the 4th vertebra in his neck, leaving him paralyzed from the neck

down. Danny was taken to Baylor Hospital in Dallas immediately after the accident and spent three months either flat on his back or flat on his stomach with 15 pounds of traction on his neck. But even while lying flat on his back, the physical therapy was started.

During those early days the hospital, therapists started what is described as "range of moving the major motion."

muscles in as normal a way as possible in order to keep them from becoming useless. Muscle re-education began a short time later.

Last April, Danny was leased from the hospital but for him the fight back was just beginning. Twice each week he is brought to the West Texas of Electra; one brother, Mar-Rehabilitation Center where he works with weights to strengthen his arms, undergoes occl therapy to help pational

he goes to school, attends all practice sessions and games of the Paint Creek football and basketball teams and spends hours each day in exercises to help his muscles regain their strength. Coach J. R. Mickler provides helping hand for therapists

of physical therapy.

by helping Danny with some of his exercises. Danny serves as manager of the football team from his wheelchair, but in the halls of the school, he some times lets other students ride in the wheelchair while pushes them down the hall.

Walking is still a slow and painful process for Danny, but therapists report he making considerable progress. He can now walk with a walker or by holding onto the handles his wheelchair and pushing in front of him.

Classwork presents something of a problem. "I can't write very fast or very well," Danny says. "So I've had to learn to keep up with what is going on

without taking many notes." He's a junior in Paint Creek High School. He was a junior at the time of the injury and after being in the hospital for almost the full school year, he decided to start back as a junior this year, "I only attended eight weeks and with subjects like chemistry and second year algebra, I didn't think I could

algebra, I didn't think I could do them on my own," he says. Even today, the doctors and therapists are hesitant to pre-dict how far Danny can pro-gress, but Danny himself shows less hesitancy. "I'm going to make it," he says. "Tve come this far and I know that I'm color to walk normally again." going to walk normally again." Fruit trees and all decidious (leaf losing) trees may be pruned as soon as they are dormant. Be sure to paint scars with a good tree paint to prevent the invasion of diseases and insects. Grape vines may also be pruned now.

Cuttings of decidious trees and shrubs may be taken this month

Calla lilies may be planted now. Put amaryllis bulbs into the soil as quick as they come on the market.

Mulch all semi-hardy perennials. Be sure to mulch chrysanthemums that have never


