



Mayor Finch prefaced his remarks by saying that "Haskell has long subsisted upon rumors rather than facts. It is imperative that persons seek valid information before telling or re-peating stories 'picked up on the street corner'." The Mayor informed his listeners that nothing will be done in secret, and any information circulates that brings up questions or feelings of animosity in the minds of persons, they should come to him (to the Mayor) for clarifi-

Mayor Finch further informed the Rotarians that "absolutely no one is authorized to speak for him," and he felt that this was true of all members

The Mayor asserted also, that he is simply not interested in "sides" in any controversy, and will not recognize that such exists as far as his deliberations are concerned. The speaker referred good humoredly to fellow Rotarian Bob Herren as being one of the controversial figures of the past, and said that he would no more feel inclined to apologize for having coffee with Mr. Herren than he would for having coffee with any other citizen ... no matter what their political views..."We represent all the people, even those who did not vote for us,"

Mr. Finch explained to the club the status of the current contract to erect a water storage facility, and announced that Mr. Yeatts of Yeatts and Decker, contracting City Engineers, would meet with the council and the Mayor in open forum at the Haskell National Bank community room on Friday morning, April 15, and brief them on the contract and awards, and that all citizens who were interested in the situation should attend the forum in order to be brought up to date on the matter. The contract, the listeners were informed, cannot be awarded without the approval of the current city council

There will be a delay in the negotiations, the Mayor explained, while consideration is given to the matter of how well this project will coordinate with any possibilities of a surface water supply. It is being considered that the location of the reservoir in a more northerly position would have these advant-

A grant of \$1,600,000.00 has been applied for through the Farmer's Home Administration. Mr. Finch further quoted the Governor of the state as saying the bonding authority of Texas Water Commission be raised next year from \$200,000,000.00 to \$400,000,000.00 in view of the pressing need, especially in West Texas, of water conditions. The Governor made this remark at the dedication of a new industry in Graham three weeks ago, in the hearing of Mr. Finch.

Mr. Finch urged the citizens to get behind the Industrial Foundation which is now being pressed to completion, because this is the most vital organization for Haskell at the present time." Haskell has some excellent industrial prospects, but we need some substantial "selling points" for inquirers in our community. Most importantly, the speaker said, we need to speak well of our community to all persons who might make inquiries, some of which will be made incognito. It is often taxi drivers and service station operators who make or break the success of an industrial inquiry, The Mayor stressed again

that the facing of our problems realistically and openly did not necessitate, nor did it indicate, "running down" of our town. He quoted a reputable source as saying that cotton income might be down this year as much as 35 to 40 per cent. We must begin to make firm plans for augmenting and supplementing this loss, as it will reflect upon the whole economy of our community,

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

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
