School Payments Are Increased

AUSTIN-House adoption of senate amendments today sent the governor a bill increasing the Burkburnett students were only ceiling on scholastic apportionment from \$22.50 to \$25 and boosting state payments to all public schools by a possible \$3,-875,000 for each of the next two

> Thus it appeared that a prospective savings of nearly \$15,-000,000 in major appropriation bills which are still in the legislative process will be largely off-

Yesterday the house voted to increase state aid to rural schools by \$5,000,000. This is paid from the state's general fund.

Only the apportionment, paid from the state available school fund on the basis of the scholastic census, was finally passed and it is subject to veto by the governor. The senate has yet to act on the regional meet which will be the rural aid measure and other major appropriation bills are in conference committees where they will take their final form.





The long-hoped for junction of American and British forces had intensified Rommel's plight, for now General Montgomery's British Eighth army was not only pressing him from the south, but its advance units now joined directly with General Patton's Second American army corps were menacing his flanks from the east. To the north, General Anderson's British First army had moved to close off Rommel's movements for a possible union with the Axis forces of Gen. Von Arnim.

In routing Rommel at El Akarit, General Montgomery took the Nazis by surprise with a night attack that blazed its way forward under the screen of 500 cannon and scores of tanks and reinforced by hundreds of planes overhead. In the first break-through the Eighth army had gathered in 6,000 Axis prisoners.

As the battle picture became clearer, the contributions of General Patton's American forces emerged importantly. Prior to the historic junction with the British Eighth army after piercing the Axis armies' flanks, the Americans had held up most of Rommel's armored forces in the El Guettar region, weakening his defenses and making easier the task of the British at El Akarit.

BLOCK-BUSTERS: Work Well Done

The penetrating eyes of British reconnaissance cameras confirmed reports of RAF bomber pilots that "block-busters" have done their work well in laying waste industrial areas of Berlin.

Photographs taken after one recent raid disclosed that 30 important war factories had been destroyed or damaged. The devastation was concentrated mostly in areas south and southwest of the center of Hitler's capital, a report by the air ministry disclosed.

Railway repair shops, freight yards and the Templehof airfield were among objectives damaged.

High-Strung Goat Drops In Faint When Surprised

DALLAS, April 21.-Dates for the issuance of sugar allotments for home canning of 1943 fruit crops may be set by local war folly of hypocrisy, while also price and rationing boards, under a ruling by the regional Office of Price Administration.

Loacl board members were given the authority because of their familiarity with crop conditions in their areas, the OPA said yesterday, and the fixing of dates on a local basis may prevent fruit spoilage

Sugar for home canning will be alloted on virtually the same basis as last year, the board added, with no deduction of blue, processed food point stamps from ration book No. 2 for sugar used for such a purpose.


