Under the sponsorship of the local Jaycees a Bloodmobile from the Red Cross Center, Wichita Falls, was in Haskell Wednesday of last week from 12:00 moon to 6:30 p. m. and set-up shop at the community room, Haskell National Bank. In their support and strong stand for Viet Nam, Haskell Jaycees through the assistance of the Bloodmobile, collected a total of 37 pints of blood. All blood donations went directly to servicemen in Viet Nam.

Abe Turner, cashier of the Haskell National Bank, member of the Jaycees and vice-president of the Chamber of Commerce, was one of the donors, This makes a total of 15 pints altogether that Turner has given the past few years.

Turner was named a member of the "Gallon Club," during the Red Cross Bloodmobile's visit to Haskell. He has given blood at the Haskell County Hospital and at other places and his next donation of blood will qualify him as a "two-gallon" member, Dr. T. C. Lynch, medical di-rector of the bloodmobile, said the people of Haskell represent the first community in Texas to give urgently needed blood for American servicemen.

In 1964 the margin was cut by about 100 votes. 

Mr. Crawford was public weigher in Stamford for eight years and moved here in 1925, entering the gin business with Fred Sanders. He ginned for 17 years, then sold tractors and gleaner combines. Next, he bought cotton in an office with Bob Stephenson and also sold farm equipment.

Mr. Crawford was advisor to the Mexican Council on behalf of a Spanish girl.

Mr. Crawford married Annie Maude Williams on June 2, 1910, at Stamford. He has been a member of First Baptist Church since 1897 and was chairman of the present church auditorium building committee. Surviving are his wife of the home; one daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Lane of Burleson; four sons, Maurice of Wichita Falls; Dr. Paul of Bryan, D. B. of Westfield, N. J., and Dr. Horace of Richardson; two brothers, Sam of Stamford, and Raymond of Brawley, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. S. L. Young of Kemah and Mrs. C. C. McBeth of Thermopolis, Wyo.; an uncle, Lawson J.
