First Baptist "Family Night" Slated Tonight

"Brotherhood Family Night," will be held at the First Baptist Church, tonight, Thursday, March 24, beginning with a covered dish supper at 7:00 o'clock.

Each family attending is asked to bring a covered dish. Speakers will be Rev. and Mrs. Roy Davidson, formerly of Haskell, who have been appointed missionaries and they will leave April 13th for their assignment in Africa.

Rev. Davidson is a former pastor at the Pinkerton Baptist Church and served as assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church in Haskell about five years ago.

All but sixty-five of the 1600 persons over 65 in Haskell County have replied to social security's Medicare inquiries, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security in Abilene.

Tuley knows who 51 of the 65 are, from records of his office and the State Department of Public Welfare. They are being phoned or written again to see whether they have just overlooked replying, or are failing to reply as their way of saying "No" to the voluntary doctor bill insurance offered at a \$3.00 per month premium rate. He doesn't know the identities of the remaining 14. He asks that readers of the Free Press check with their friends and relatives and if they have taken no action as yet on Medicare, urge them to write a card or a letter to "Social Security, Abilene, Texas 79604." They should say they do or do not want to sign up for Medicare.

"I'd like to suggest that every person over 65 who has not yet notified the Social Security Administration do so before March 31st. Those who say "No" or who just don't reply, will get another chance in October of 1967. However, a person who signs up by March 31 can cancel his enrollment anytime before July 1; in effect, he is getting 90 more days to reach a final decision," Tuley added.

"Any card or letter, addressed to Social Security, Box 3258, Abilene, Texas 79604, asking to enroll for Medicare, postmarked March 31 or before, and signed by the over-age 65 person (or by a responsible person on his behalf) will be treated as a valid enrollment," Tuley concluded.

Free Registration Adds 584 More County Voters

Commission Established To Apply For Grant For Economic Survey

A planning commission has been established for the purpose of applying for a 100 per cent grant from the Farmers Home Administration to conduct an economic survey in this area.

All government grants for area development purposes require an extensive economic survey of political sub-divisions involved.

This survey may be used by schools, hospitals, or any other public agency or district for the purpose of applying for government grants.

The towns of Munday, Goree, Benjamin, Knox City, Weinert, Rochester and Rule each appointed two representatives on the planning commission.

The City of Haskell officials refused to appoint any representative to this commission. However, the Haskell County Commissioners Court appointed Dr. T. W. Williams of Haskell and Harlan Weinert, of Weinert, as their representative members of the planning commission.

The 15-day period for free voter registration ended last Thursday night at midnight, and according to Norma Childress, Haskell County Tax-Assessor-Collector, added a total of 584 voters to the roll.

The special registration was made necessary after a district federal court held that the Texas poll tax law was unconstitutional in all sections where in a poll tax was required to become eligible to vote.

This ruling was followed by a special session of the Legislature at which time a voter registration law was passed. All persons who registered may vote without payment of a poll tax. Those persons who had already paid their poll tax did not have to register again.

Mrs. Childress distributed applications to register in every community in the county. These applications were mailed or taken to the tax collector's office in the courthouse where a poll tax receipt bearing the stamp "Conditional Voter's Registration Certificate" was issued.

With the addition of the 584 free voter registrations, plus exemptions and regular poll tax, Haskell County's voting strength climbed to 2,852. Mrs. Childress said.

We Should Seek Out Industry

Ever since Adam woke up to find his rib cage asymmetrical, mankind has had to live with, face-up to, and occasionally stay ahead of that greatest of all unchangeables, change.

How can the average Texas community keep abreast of and understand these changes, let alone capitalize on their very essence in terms of economic advancement? "WE HAVE SUCH A DRUG"

April is Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. During this month the American Cancer Society is seeking funds for important programs of research, education and service.

It would be just as appropriate to designate April as Cancer Communication Month. Why? As a distinguished health officer said recently: "If someone invented a drug that would cure half of the present cases of cancer, the excitement would be beyond belief. We have such a drug: It is communication."

An estimated one-half of all cases of cancer could be cured by finding them soon enough and "doing" for them what we already know how to do. However, only one-third is being saved, largely because the individual does not go to his doctor in time for early diagnosis.

The problem of eliminating the gap between one-third and one-half—of adding 95,000 lives to the 190,000 now saved each year—is difficult. It is a problem of communication and motivation. Too often we are unable to persuade people to act in their own health interest—to present themselves in time for early diagnosis and treatment of cancer.

During April, volunteers of the American Cancer Society will be calling on you. They will ask for funds to support life-saving programs in cancer control. They will urge you to have a health check-up now—if you have not already had one—and to do so every year.

We urge you to do both.

The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

Easter will soon be here, and many a lucky lady will receive a pot of Hydrangea to brighten her day.

Hydrangea is easily grown out side here if reasonable care is taken in transplanting them from a pot to the yard. Pick a well drained rich, porous spot for the plants new home. Remove the plant from the pot with a kitchen knife, being careful not to disturb the soil around roots of the flower. Put the whole root ball into the soil leaving a depression to water the plant with. Partial shade is best for Hydrangea in this hot climate.

The plants can be cut to the ground each fall and the roots mulched. However they will grow here without that precaution. Mrs. Beatrice Livingood has a Hydrangea on the north side of her house. The plant withstood our severe winter and is leafing out with healthy, dark green foliage.

Do not be alarmed or amazed if a blue Hydrangea this year is pink the next year. Sweet and acid soil controls the color.

Lime or sweet soil produces pink blossoms. Aluminum Sulfate added to sweet soil will produce blue flowers.

Native Hydrangea of the eastern states have white or creamy white blossoms. Several years ago we went back east, the hills in Georgia and Tenn. were white with wild Hydrangea. An occasional plant had a pink or blue blush on the blossoms. Day lilies also were growing wild all over.

I wish every home in Haskell had an Aloe Vera or burn plant. My little grand daughter backed up to a stove and burned her thigh so badly it was in clear blisters almost at once. She was crying. I broke a blade from my Aloe Vera and rubbed the juice of it on her burn. In three minutes she said there was no burning at all. I've burned my hands from time to time cooking, when I do I rub the juice from Aloe Vera on the blister and in no time at all the burn is gone.

The funny thing about Aloe is one can pinch just a piece of the blade off and it heals up to be used again. I have pinched pieces off of one blade as many as 3 times before using it up. This little plant that looks some what like a miniature yucca is very handy to keep in the kitchen window.

Mrs. Paul Kuenstler served a refreshment plate to the Haskell Garden Club that was as pretty as a spring garden. Sandwiches made like Calla lilies, yellow daisy tid-bits and cup cakes with permanent daisies like miniature pots growing flowers, were set off by sparkling golden punch. It was truly a work of art.

Purpose of the meeting was to train leaders in order to have a more effective 4-H program for the county.

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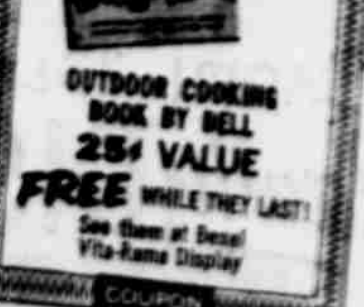
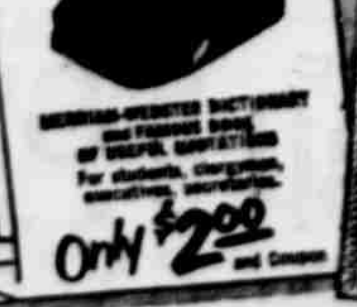

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A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL:

On March 31, 1966, the City of Haskell will take bids on the construction of the first phase of the City's program to provide Haskell with as good a municipal water supply as can be found anywhere in this part of West Texas, and this is a good time to report to you, the citizens of Haskell, on the efforts we have made to obtain an adequate water supply for Haskell at a reasonable cost.

After a 1965 Survey by an engineering firm and their report stated that Lake Stamford would not yield sufficient water to provide for sale to the City of Haskell, we immediately began investigating alternative sources of supply. Well water is Haskell's most readily available source of supply and we employed Mr. Ed L. Reed, a consulting Hydrologist of Midland and the leading ground water hydrologist of West Texas to make a survey of the underground field from which Haskell obtains its well water. Mr. Reed has made an exhaustive study of Haskell's underground water resources and he has given us a report which shows that Haskell can obtain enough water from wells to take care of its needs including anticipated growth until at least 1991.

Although our well water is plentiful, because of its high mineral content it is not of a desirable quality. But this condition can now be corrected. As the result of the tremendous amount of recent research, conversion of sea water to fresh water, treatment methods have been developed which will reduce the mineral content to desirable levels at a reasonable cost. We have an estimate from Ionics Inc., one of the leading manufacturers of water desalination equipment, for the installation of an electrodesalination water treatment system which would make our well water comparable to Lake Stamford water at a cost of 35 cents per 1000 gallons delivered into our water mains.

We believe that the continued use of well water with some form of desalination treatment offers the most reasonable solution to Haskell's water supply problem, and the construction program the City is undertaking has this approach in mind. The first phase in this construction program will cost about \$110,000.00 and will consist of a 800,000 gallon ground storage reservoir on North 7th Street with booster pumps and a supply main. This work will increase pressures in the north part of the City and will improve the fire protection water supply system to such an extent that savings in fire insurance premiums alone should offset the cost of the work in a few years.

It is apparent that Haskell is not in as bad shape as the Millers Creek proponents would lead you to believe. It is obvious that Haskell can obtain a good supply of water, well within State Health Department quality limits for much less per 1000 gallons than proposed Millers Creek water. Tremendous strides have been made in water desalination research in recent months and science may well be on the brink of another major breakthrough. By the time Haskell is actually ready to install its treatment system, the cost may be even less than the present 35 cents per 1000 gallons.

The Millers Creek promoters are running a full slate of candidates in the April 5, 1966 City elections in a last-ditch effort to gain control of the City Council. They know that this is their last chance to get Haskell committed to Millers Creek, and they say that if Millers Creek proponents do not get control this time, they will give up and detach Haskell from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

We believe that the people of Haskell approve of our efforts to obtain a good water supply at a reasonable cost and do not want a city administration which is blindly committed to Millers Creek regardless of the cost. If you agree, it is important that you go to the polls on Tuesday, April 5, 1966, and vote for the members of the present City Council who are up for re-election—Mayor J. E. Walling, Jr., and Aldermen R. L. Stephenson, Raymond Davis and Otho Nanny.

No tax money or other city funds have been used to defray the cost of this statement.

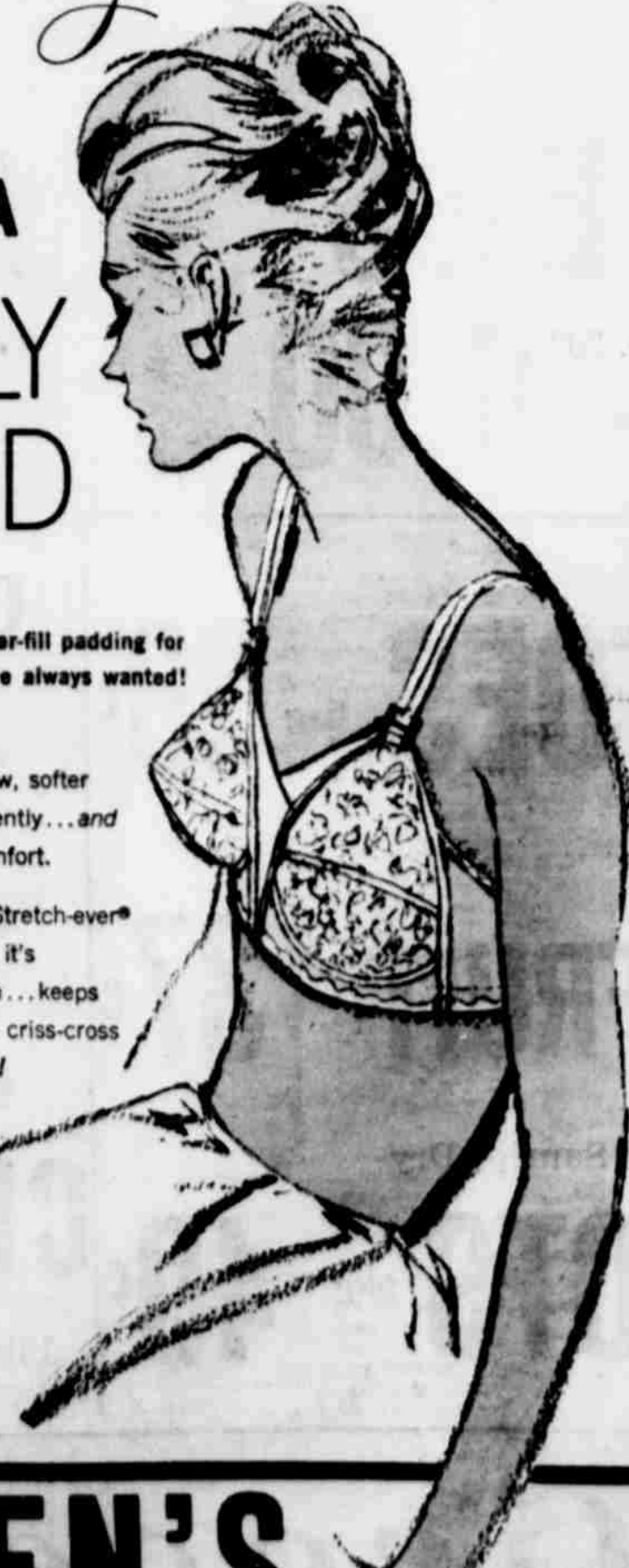
