pay 3 cents a day to rent a book. Magazines are bought in every home and add up to the cost of these over a year. Compare both book and magazine rates with your newspaper subscription.

A Wisconsin weekly, which was using some salesmanship before raising their rate to 4 cents a week, figured it this way: you pay more per week for any of the following than for the home town newspaper - 5 ounces of beer, 4 cigarettes, a candy bar, 1 package of gum, a cigar, a cup of coffee. 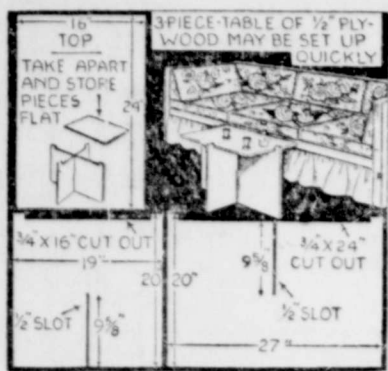

Help For Naval Discharge Men

Twenty branches of the Eighth Naval District's Civil Readjustment Office are located throughout the district to help the discharged naval veteran with problems, before and after, his return to civilian life.

At each separation center, Civil Readjustment officers and enlisted specialists are on duty. As general interviewers they review the past training, experience, abilities and ambitions of the dischargee.

Nine other consultants available to the servicemen at the time of separation are: Educational Services Officer, Benefits and insurance officer, Legal Assistance Officer, the Chaplain and government and civilian representatives from the Veterans Administration, American Red Cross, U. S. Employment Service, U. S. Civil Service Commission and Selective Service Commission.

A month after discharge the veteran receives a letter from his District Civil Readjustment Office. It suggests that the veteran can get prompt answers to problems connected with civilian life from Veterans Information Centers, Veterans Administration Representatives or veteran organizations in or near his community.

However, if an answer cannot be obtained at one of these agencies, he is invited to contact the District Civil Readjustment Civil Office, 302 Balter Building, New Orleans.

Manage Chicks Carefully For Higher Profits

Profitable chick management is very likely the subject of discussion on a good many farms at this time of year along with the many other topics relating to spring farming activities. So let's give a little more thought to our chicks and consider a number of pointers on management that might prove helpful.

First give your attention to the condition of your brooder house. Has it been carefully cleaned and

disinfected? Is the litter dry and clean?

Avoid Crowding

Crowding is a menace that may cause slow growth, cannibalism, uneven development, feed waste and high mortality. Make sure that your chicks have enough room to avoid any of the costly developments that crowded quarters may cause.

Observe your chicks actions to determine if they're comfortable. If they huddle near the hover, they're too cold; if they gather in far corners it's too warm. When the chicks first go into the brooder house the brooder stove should be regulated so as to provide a temperature of 85 degrees to 95 degrees at the hover. Lower this temperature about five degrees each week until 70 degrees is reached where it should be held until heat is no longer needed.

Chicks Need Sunlight

Allow plenty of sunlight into the brooder house. It is a good source of vitamin D as well as an effective germicide.

Be sure the feeders are clean and well filled with starting mash. Adopt and follow exactly the feeding program, recommended by a good reliable feed dealer or other qualified agency.

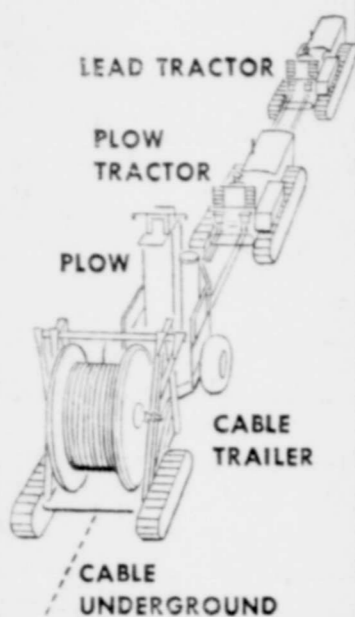
Segregate the cockerels as soon as they can be distinguished.

The hoppers and founts should be placed on wire or slat platforms to prevent contamination as soon as the chicks have learned where to find them.

The habit of roosting should be established early as it prevents crowding and the chicks develop better.

New circuits are on the way

A new coast-to-coast "coaxial" cable now being laid underground across the Southern route, in addition to providing new paths for radio broadcasts and television, will carry more long distance calls than the four other transcontinental telephone lines put together.
