Why 145 Burkburnett People Are Waiting for Telephones



THE REASON IS that it has not been possible to manufacture and install additional equipment fast enough to keep up with the biggest demand for telephones in Burkburnett's history-despite the most active construction program we've ever undertaken.

On V-J Day, 48 people in Burkburnett were on the telephone waiting list-a backlog equal to more

than five years of pre-war growth. Since then, we have gained 80 telephones in Burkburnett. We have installed nine times as many telephones since V-J Day as we did in an average year between 1935 and

Yet today, 145 people here still do not have service. Many of them are people who were waiting on V-J

ONE BIG REASON for this is the vast number of new applications. Many of them are from returning servicemen who, as heads of families, are entitled to preference, as also are people whose service qualifies as essential to the health, welfare, and security of the community. As lines and equipment become available in a central office, all other applications are filled in the order in which they are received.

WE ARE HARD AT WORK on an expansion program to enlarge the telephone system here, to put in the switchboards, the cable, the wire, and all the other things needed to make service available to those who want it. The job is so big that it takes time.



When these oocysts thickly infest the ground, litter or feed on your premises, they are picked up in large numbers by chicks feeding in the contaninated area A chick which conumes material containing these rganisms becomes infected with oody coccidiosis, and on the fifth day after the onset of the infection the bird will begin to show outward symptoms of the disease In early stages, droppings become bloody, a positive symwhich may often be noted are drooping wings, poor appetites and general signs of weakne often manifested by the huddled posture of the fowl, but it should be remembered that these are common to many poultry dis-


