Sam Koenig Brings In First Bale Of Cotton In County

Wichita County's first bale of 1946 Cotton reached the Farmers' Cooperative Gin in Burkburnett Friday morning in what agricultural authorities estimate as one of the earliest dates on record for area cotton production.

The Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce gives a bonus of \$25 to the person bringing in the first bale of cotton in Wichita County, and also \$25 to the first bale from Oklahoma ginned in Burk.

produced on August 27, two full weeks and four days later than this year's first bale.

The cotton was grown by Sam Koenig on the H. A. Mills farm, one and one-half miles east of Burkburnett. Clasified as low middling with seven-eighth staple and weighed approximately 2,300 pounds before ginning and 564 pounds ginned. It was gathered from 15 acres of Koenig's 200

The honor of gining Wichita County's first bale of 1946 cotton went to T. K. Swinford, manager of the Farmers' Cooperative Gin. Immediately following the ginning the bale was sold for 30 cents per pound to A. G. Earp of Wichita Falls, who outbid C. E. Robertson of Burkburnett in obtaining the cotton.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Arti-cle 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Fund for the appointive officers and employes of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions: prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sec-zion 62, which shall read as follows: "Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and em-ployees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180)

for any such person.



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



Freedom of the press has been talked about more in the last few months than in the previous few years. Comment began when the Supreme Court ruled in favor of an editor who had been hailed into court by a notable who felt (perhaps justifiably) injured by something the editor had published. I would not wish to review the case here, even if there were room for it, but I am glad the Supreme Court surprised a lot of good people and set them studying and talking about this purely American liberty, freedom of the press. Let me say this: You don't publish stories in the old country that hurt the feelings of potentates and get away with it! America Is Different

In this country, it is assumed that a man is not fit for public office unless he can take all the razzing and criticism that goes with it and still hold his temper and do a good job. Think how long a crooked official might stay in office if he could protect himself from criticism all the time, and yet encourage newspapers to magnify the faults of other men who ran for his office.

Editors better not get careless looking after some pack mules, and publish uncomplimentary stateand as we walked up to where ments about their neighbors, or about things their neighbors have to sell; courts make them pay for the damage, if any. Editors dare not facing the general. The Mexican get mean and print malicious lies about people because courts send writers to jail for that. Publishers can't do whatever they please. 



Meanwhile, Ford announced that suppliers, it would be forced to re- ing power. duce operations. Strikes were tying and covers.

In calling for a settlement of the disputes in supplier plants to assure continued high auto and truck output, Henry Ford II took a crack at Walter Reuther, CIO - United Automobile chieftain, who had asked for an industry - wide union-management conference to increase production. The answer for higher output lies in uninterrupted activity, he said.

General Motors, Chrysler, Hudson, Packard and Nash echoed Ford's stand in rejecting Reuther's bid for an industry-wide conference. Of all the producers, only Studebaker, Willys-Overland and Kaiser-

Frazer accepted the UAW invitation. The threatened drop in production came as manufacturers boosted their August goals to 453,148 units. With July output showing a big jump over previous months, the half-year total for 1946 aggregated 1,292,214 cars and trucks, of which 862,628 were passenger autos.

FURLOUGH PAY: In Bonds

G.I.s entitled to pay for unused furloughs will receive their money in bonds if the amount exceeds \$50 under a bill approved by congress. Disbursements in securities was decided upon after the administration warned that payment in cash would have an inflationary effect.

To be issued in amounts of \$25. the bonds will not be redeemed before five years, though they can be applied against U. S. government life insurance or national service life insurance before that time. In cases where excess sums do not total \$25, payment will be made in cash.

Under terms of the bill, G.I.s are to be credited with leave time at the rate of 21/2 days per month between September 8, 1939, and August 31, 1946, with payment for the unused portions. In addition, a buck private would be entitled to a subsistence allowance of 70 cents a day and a staff sergeant to his own subsistence allowance plus \$1.25 for dependents.

Atomic energy, when harnessed for peacetime purposes. may be employed in accomplishing such bizarre tasks as irrigating the Sahara and melting the ice cap on Greenland, according to Harry A. Winne, noted electrical engineer.

Despite his fanciful predictions, however, Winne said atomic energy will not replace, but rather supplement, other sources of energy.

Q. How often should the litter in my broiler house be changed?

A. It should be changed when it becomes damp or when a contagious disease breaks out. Usually additional litter should be added every few days to a shallow covering placed over the floor before the chicks arrive. After each brood of chicks, of course, the broiler house should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected, and new litter should be pro-

Q. Do dairy cows need much salt? A. The amount of salt dairy cows need is almost entirely an individual proposition. The amount will vary with the size of the cows, the type of ration, and the amount of milk produced. In addition, some cows seem to have a special appetite for extra salt. Milking rations should contain 1% salt, but block salt should also be available for the cows to eat according to their individual desires.

Q. What is a two-litter-a-year breeding system in hog production? A. This is the system recommended for maximum pork production from the hog herd. Gives Would-be Dogowner Opportunity to Judge Breeds Side by Side

If in doubt as to the breed of dog to get, go see a dog show!

This is the advice given to would-be dog owners by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New A visit to a dog show is a pleas-

urable opportunity to see and study at close range many of the 110 breeds recognized in this country by the American Kennel Club. Strolling past the "benches" is a fascinating as well as educational experience. Here are dogs from many countries, and dogs which for generations have been bred to fulfill specific purposes or perform highly specialized jobs. Every dog here, from the most diminutive to the largest, is a purebred specimen of his breed, in blooming condition and groomed to perfection. Two or three hours thus spent in enjoyable sightthus spent in enjoyable sightseeing will not only facilitate a decision but in all probability also lead to contacts with those who have dogs of the breed decided on.

The chances of seeing a dog show in one's own community have never before been as good as in this year of 1946, states the

interesting and thrilling—particularly to the seasoned show-goer and fancier—is to watch the actual judging of the dogs.

Often a first-time spectator, after watching from the ringside awhile, will ask, "What is the judge looking for when he goes over the dogs? How does he compare them?" The answer is that each breed has its own official Standard which describes in detail the conformation and qualities that constitute a faultless specimen, and that when the judge examines the dogs in the ring before him-inspects their teeth, feels their muscles and watches them walk back and forth -he is simply trying to determine which dog comes closest to measuring up to this Standard.

Another frequent inquiry from spectators is, "How is the best dog in the show selected? By what procedure is one dog lifted out of several hundred to be crowned

Best-in-Show?'

A dog show is a sort of elimi-nation contest. First, there is judging of various classes in the indi-vidual breeds (Puppy, Novice, American-Bred, Limit and Open), segregated by sex. The winners of first prize in each class then com-pete for Winners Dog (male) or Winners Bitch (female). The winner of this class receives a certain number of points toward his or her championship title, which are figured in proportion to the number of dogs he or she defeated in the classes. Winners Dog and Winners Bitch are now matched for Best of Winners, and the winner of this class meets whatever champions of the breed are entered in the Specials Only class for title Best of Breed. By the time Best of Breed has been chosen for every breed represented in the show, perhaps only 40 or 50 dogs out of an original entry of five or six hundred remain eligi-

ble to contend for higher honors.

Now begins the judging of the
six variety groups, called Sporting, Hound, Working, Terrier, Toy Non-sporting. Only the Best of Breed winners are eligible for competition within their special group; consequently group con-tests are very keen and the quality of the contestants of the highest order. The six dogs that are placed first in each of these groups are then brought together to contend for the final and highest honor of Best in Show. This is the climax of the judging and the most exciting part of the show. Amid tension that almost crackles, the six finalists are coveried. the six finalists are examined gaited and re-examined. Finally one of them is motioned to the center of the ring amid cheers and applause, to take his place in the limelight as champion of champions-Best in Show!



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
