## VICTORY DAY DREAMS

August 14, 1946 is the first anniversary of Victory Day. One year ago with the firing of the last shot in the far Pacific the great and tragic drama of World War II ended. America, together with her Allies, were on the brink of a new and shining era, an era in which the common man would once again be able to forge his own destiny in the constructive, free atmosphere of peace.

The last shackle of tyranny which the unholy alliance of Nazism, Facism and Nipponism had visited upon the

World for almost a decade was completely and finally broken that August 14. More than 300,000 Americans had given their lives to break it. The signs in the sky pointed to unparalleled opportunity, prosperity and achievement. Hadn't America pioneered the building of a World organization which would prohibit the resurgence of such tyranny for now and for all time.

Twelve crucial months have passed. They were months of admirable effort, here at home and abroad, to save the promise of peace while effecting a recovery from the dislocation of war. They were also months of major frustration in which the ancient enemies of man, greed, selfishness and pride, released from their wartime impotence emerged to pose an alarming peril to peace. In the pell-mell race for the fruits of victory and the blessings of peace in which the black market operator and the imperialistic Nation have been co-sinners man has jeopardized his chances of attaining either goal.

It is this fact that has prompted The American Legion to call for the establishment of August 14 as an annual national holiday when Americans commemorating the memory of our World War II hero dead and the spirit that motivated their sacrifice, may re-dedicate themselves to persevere for peace in the same spirit. American Legion posts throughout the Nation are observing Victory Day with appropriate public ceremonies. It behooves the people of the community to contribute to the success of these programs.

As yet the very words, Victory Day, ring hollow. Therein lies a challenge to every American to help realize the promise of the first Victory Day. This is no time to quite. August 14 is the time to shake off the effects of the disappointments and frustrations, to get up and start swinging anew for that shining "peace and good will" era we envisioned a year ago. Dreams never come true in sleep.

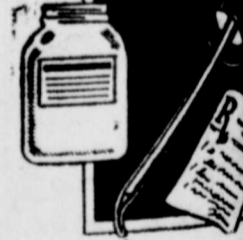

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62. (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees

of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

**Household Hints**  
 Sandpaper is useful in cleaning suede shoes. After a thorough brushing, go over them lightly with fine sandpaper, then follow with a cloth which has been moistened with vinegar.

Late fall is regarded as the best time to do house painting, for by then the long summer sun has removed all moisture from the wood.

To remove dust from wall paper, wipe with a soft wall brush or soft cloth. Hard rubbing will streak and roughen the paper.

Drab-looking flower pots can be brightened by going over them with ordinary wax crayons.

It is easier to iron dresses and blouses in this order; sleeves, back, front and collar.

Heavy roof paint applied to inside of metal gutters will prevent rusting for a long time.

To help restore the original lustre of gilt picture frames rub with a sponge moistened slightly with turpentine.

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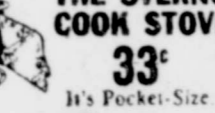

## BOYCE HOUSE "Gives You Texas"

Early days in Texas are described by Mike Campbell of Stamford, well-known newspaperman:

My maternal grandparents settled at Dresden, Navarro Co., in 1844, on land granted them by the Republic of Texas. Our family still has that old document with Anson Jones' signature. The settlers made annual trips to Houston, in wagons drawn by oxen, for supplies, usually taking two months to make the round trip. There was not a fence between Dresden and Houston, except rail and brush fences around small fields and corrals.

In those days, wild horses, cattle and wolves roved over the prairies. Prairie chickens were plentiful.

My grandfather owned a slave who made all the shoes and boots. Cowhides were of the utmost use in the early days. They furnished shoes, harness, bull whips, chair bottoms and hinges for doors; and sometimes vessels for carrying water were made of leather.

The Meltons were also early settlers in that section. Ethan Melton married my grandmother's sister. My great uncle, John Welch, told me of the Battle of San Jacinto, and the capture of Santa Anna. He related:

Deaf Smith and I had been looking after some pack mules, and as we walked up to where General Houston lay, some of the boys led up a Mexican, dressed in the uniform of a private, facing the general. The Mexican made a sign with his hand and General Houston answered with his hand. About that time, some other Mexican prisoners exclaimed, El Presidente, El Presidente. Then we knew we had Santa Anna.

Nestling in a little valley north of old Dresden lies the Melton cemetery, fringed with wild plum and persimmon thickets. There

sleep pioneers, including my maternal grandparents. The song of the mockingbird may be heard in the stately elms but no more do the mournful howl of the timber wolf and the haunting notes of the horned owl boom out in the dark hours of the night. Yes, in North America, frontiers have vanished forever.



Public Good

Freedom of the press has been talked about more in the last few months than in the previous few years. Comment began when the Supreme Court ruled in favor of an editor who had been hailed into court by a notable who felt (perhaps justifiably) injured by something the editor had published. Not everybody thought the case would turn out as it did. Many were surprised.

I would not wish to review the case here, even if there were room for it, but I am glad the Supreme Court surprised a lot of good people and set them studying and talking about this purely American liberty, freedom of the press. Let me say this: You don't publish stories in the old country that hurt the feelings of potentates and get away with it! America Is Different

In this country, it is assumed that a man is not fit for public office unless he can take all the razzing and criticism that goes with it and still hold his temper and do a good job. Think how long a crooked official might stay in office if he could protect himself from criticism all the time, and yet encourage newspapers to magnify the faults of other men who ran for his office.

Editors better not get careless and publish uncomplimentary statements about their neighbors, or about things their neighbors have to sell; courts make them pay for the damage, if any. Editors dare not get mean and print malicious lies about people because courts send writers to jail for that. Publishers can't do whatever they please. That's apart from freedom of the press.

For the Public Good

It is recognized by law in the United States that the people are entitled to know what goes on. Public information is for the public good. In line with this very principle, the Post Office Department will move 60 times more news tonnage for the money than letters which are private, not public. Our government considers spreading news an important public service.

If a publisher makes known things that are true and in the people's interest, it is for the public good and he has the protection of law. When the keen lash of publicity strikes the corrupt deeds of public payrollers, let the hit dog yelp. The press is a vocation of "checks and balances." Publishers have power they don't have to use, but if they use it they must use it for the public good.

A Parallel Case

Some day, I believe, these same checks and balances will control the enormous powers of labor unions which have done more to improve the living standards of the American people than any other organized movement. The right of collective bargaining is as sacred as the right to vote, but some labor leaders have been known to abuse their power. In a republic, power is abused when it is used destructively, in a manner that injures, rather than benefits, the public. The famous Case Bill is dead with all its miscellaneous regulations for labor unions. Many conservative thinkers will concede that it will be better if the unions regulate themselves for the public good, rather than having it done by law. Industrial peace must be achieved. Reform is inevitable. The workers can do it better than some bureau.

### August First Army Air Force Day

President Truman has officially declared August 1st as Army Air Force Day. The proclamation reads, "I Harry S. Truman, President of the United States of America, in order that we may, in gratitude do honor to the men and women of the Army Air Forces and pay tribute to all those who through research and development, in science and industry, have supported the growth of our country's air power, do proclaim Thursday, August 1, 1946 as Army Air Force Day and do invite the governors of the various states to issue proclamations calling for observance of that day."

The Army Air Forces was first conceived in 1907 as a branch of the Army Signal Corps, for the purpose of study of the flying machine and the possibility of adapting it to military purposes; at that time the Air Forces consisted of three men and no airplanes.

Army Air Force Day will commemorate 39 years of skill, genius, effort and sacrifice which produced a force that played a mighty part in winning World War II. The AAF has grown from the first accepted Army airplane which flew at a maximum speed of 40 miles per hour on a 125 mile flight and carried two men. The first Army plane stayed aloft 1 hour, 14 minutes and 40 seconds. The AAF now possesses planes that stay aloft as long as 24 hours on a single flight. At the beginning of World War I, the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps had 1152 men and 55 obsolete planes; at its end under the new name, the United States Army Air Service had 131,000 men. This group had grown, as the Army Air Forces, to 2,411,294 men and 82,936 airplanes at the end of World War II.

Over 200 technical courses are offered today to men of the AAF training in which is given in completely equipped technical schools staffed by expert instructors and based on the trainee's abilities and desire. As always the men of the Army Air Forces are selected from the youth of America who possess the highest intelligence and physical stamina.



### Dogdom To Have Its Own "Fidos"



NOT to be outdone by Hollywood and its "Oscars", America's dogdom is to have its own "Fido" awards for individuals of outstanding accomplishment in the dog field. J., voted respectively "Dogdom's Man and Woman of 1945" by America's dog editors and writers in a poll conducted by the Gaines Dog Research Center. Mr. Horswell, secretary of the Dachshund Club of America, was selected because of his extraordinary contribution in establishing and maintaining the popularity of the Dachshund breed in recent years, and particularly during the war. Mrs. Erlanger, consultant to the Army's Quartermaster Corps, was picked because of her work with the nation's war dogs not only in 1945, but during the entire period of World War II.

**Small Nations Get Voice in Peace; Parts Strikes Hit Auto Output; Vote Furlough Pay in Bonds**

**PEACE PARLEY: Open Discussion**  
Smaller nations won the right to discuss any question pertaining to the peace treaty drafts for Germany's former European satellites at the Paris peace conference in a surprise concession by Russia. The Russian action followed Greece's demand that the conference be allowed to consider any item which relates to a just and durable peace. After hearing Yugoslavia and the Ukraine of the Soviet bloc attack the proposal, Russian Foreign Minister Molotov advanced his compromise. By offering the opportunity for thoroughly discussing the treaty drafts, his plan would permit the molding of a sound peace, he said.

**AUTO PRODUCTION: Face Drop**  
Up to a postwar production record of 312,576 units in July, output of cars and trucks threatened to take another slide this month as strikes at supplier plants cut down the flow of essential materials to booming assembly lines. Because a walkout of 80 tool and die workers at the Dura division of the Detroit Harvester company in Toledo, Ohio, affected shipments of door handles and interior hardware, Studebaker was compelled to lay off 4,000 employees and Hudson 12,000.

**HUNGARY: Riding High**  
Uncontrollable inflation hit Hungary much as it hit Germany after World War I, leaving a stricken populace with bushel-baskets full of money virtually worthless in buying power. As postwar production and distribution collapsed in the face of heavy demand, the government printed more and more currency to meet the need for additional money for the soaring price level. Whereas a clerk or typist earned about 425 pengos (\$85) monthly before inflation, he got 32,000,000 by March. Street car fares went up 210,000 times and flour 2,200,000 times.

**FURLOUGH PAY: In Bonds**  
G.I.s entitled to pay for unused furloughs will receive their money in bonds if the amount exceeds \$50 under a bill approved by congress. Disbursements in securities was decided upon after the administration warned that payment in cash would have an inflationary effect.

**PALESTINE: Plan Partition**  
Unless substantial American financial aid, estimated at 300 million dollars, is forthcoming, British officials declared that they may have to reconsider an Anglo-American plan for partitioning Palestine into four spheres to solve the complex Jewish resettlement problem. Of the 300 million dollars, it was reported, some 250 million would be advanced to the Arabs for self-liquidating projects, if they could not secure a loan from the international bank set up at Bretton Woods. At the same time, another 50 million dollars would be granted outright to the Arabs for economic development.

**FARM PRICES: At Top**  
Sharp increases in prices received by farmers for cotton, grains, meat animals, poultry and eggs and dairy products during the month ended July 15 raised the general level of prices received 2.4 per cent over the preceding month to 244 per cent of its 1909-14 mark. This increase was the largest ever recorded for any single month and raised the index nine points above any previous month in the 37 years of record.

**WAR PROFITS: Garsons Kick**  
Denying the war department's charge that it made excessive profits on war contracts, Erie Basin Metal Products, Inc., asked the U. S. tax court to bar the government's efforts to obtain a refund of \$358,874.58 for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1943.

**PEACE PARLEY: (Continued)**  
Under the partition proposal, the Jews would receive the northeast section of Palestine and the Arabs chiefly the central part. Both would have the right to determine the number of immigrants to be admitted in their sectors. In addition, the Negeb desert area in the southwest would be open to Jews under British administration. Meanwhile, Ford announced that unless labor differences were resolved in plants of seven critical suppliers, it would be forced to reduce operations. Strikes were tying up production of ball bearings, interior hardware, truck wheel rims, bolts and clutch disc assemblies and covers.

**WAR PROFITS: (Continued)**  
The company was an important unit in the Garson munitions empire under scrutiny of the senate investigating committee headed by Senator Mead (Dem., N. Y.). Representative May (Dem., Ky.) was charged with having exerted his influence with the war department for awarding the combine war contracts and high army officers in Washington, D. C., were shown to have frolicked at the Garsons' expense and pushed their interests. Erie Basin asked the tax court to overrule government refusals to consider certain rentals, salaries, maintenance expenses and depreciation charges as legitimate expenses. Further, it asserted that the U. S. failed to consider such factors as efficiency, reasonableness of costs and its contribution to the war effort in charging it with excess profits.

**WAR PROFITS: (Continued)**  
Both of these truths are declared in Scripture in God's covenant with Noah (Gen. 9:5, 6), which was made possibly a thousand years before the Ten Commandments were given to Moses. I. The Prohibition of Murder (Exod. 20:13). The word "kill" in this commandment is one which means a violent and unauthorized taking of life, and is therefore more properly translated "murder." Not all killing is murder. A man may kill another entirely accidentally, or he may be the duly constituted legal officer carrying out the law of the land in taking the life of one who has forfeited his right to live because he has slain another. There is also the right of self-defense, be it individual or collective as in war. But these are the only exceptions; let us not attempt to justify any other. Murder is more prevalent than most of us suppose. In 1944 there was a murder every fifty minutes in our land. Do not forget the deaths, the destruction of life, by avoidable automobile accidents. Some of these were really murder because the one responsible drove with defective brakes, dioxerated tires, or while he was intoxicated. Add to these the deaths in industry caused by failure to provide proper safeguards or healthy working conditions, and by the exploitation of child labor, and we say that we should cry aloud, "Thou shalt do no murder." II. The Provocation to Murder (Matt. 5:21, 22). Murder finds its provoking cause in the heart of man. Our Lord was concerned about correcting the desires rather than to apprehend the offender after the act had been committed. It is the better way, and the more effective one. In this matter of murder, Jesus cut right through the outward aspects of the matter and pointed out that an angry hatred in the heart is the root of all murder. If we hate, we have murder in our hearts. Circumstances may hinder its fulfillment, but the danger is always there until we remove the cause. May God help those of us who have strong feelings that we may not yield them to the devil in such anger against our brother! III. The Prevention of Murder (Matt. 5:23, 24; 10:29-31; 18:10-14). Prevention with God means more than putting up a barrier to try to keep men from killing one another. He deals with the heart of man, and when that is right the whole life will be right. There must be: 1. A Right View of Self (Matt. 5:23, 24). We must learn by prayer and humility of heart to suffer at the hands of others, to keep peace, to seek our brother's welfare. Note that it is not even a question of how we may feel against our brother. If he has sinned against us we are to do all we can to win him. We who believe in Christ are to be in debt as well as word the children of our heavenly Father (Matt. 5:45), loving not only those who are kind to us but also our enemies. 2. A Right View of God (Matt. 10:29-31). He who knows when a sparrow falls to the ground is concerned about the smallest detail of our lives. No man can lay hands of violence on another man without having to reckon with God about his misdeeds. Our God is not afar off and too concerned with eternal affairs to be interested in the sufferings of the individual. He is here now, and should count him into every relationship of life. 3. A Right View of Man (Matt. 18:10-14). Even the little ones, apparently defenseless and at the mercy of a cruel world, have guardian angels who have access to the throne of God. He has a special interest in the lost and rejoices in the rescue of the one who has strayed, so we see that even those whom the world regards as weak and unimportant are in the mind of God for good. He watches over them. The man who sees himself for what he is, and who realizes what God thinks of man, will find that he agrees with the command of God, "Thou shalt not kill."

**FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING**

**Q. How often should the litter in my broiler house be changed?**  
 A. It should be changed when it becomes damp or when a contagious disease breaks out. Usually additional litter should be added every few days to a shallow covering placed over the floor before the chicks arrive. After each brood of chicks, of course, the broiler house should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected, and new litter should be provided.

**Q. Do dairy cows need much salt?**  
 A. The amount of salt dairy cows need is almost entirely an individual proposition. The amount will vary with the size of the cows, the type of ration, and the amount of milk produced. In addition, some cows seem to have a special appetite for extra salt. Milking rations should contain 1% salt, but block salt should also be available for the cows to eat according to their individual desires.

**Q. What is a two-litter-a-year breeding system in hog production?**  
 A. This is the system recommended for maximum pork production from the hog herd. As developed at the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm, this two-litter-a-year system requires that each sow be bred, farrow her litter, nurse her litter, and send her weaned litter to the fattening lots and finally to market twice a year. This high rate of production has been made possible by a fine, well-balanced program of good breeding, sound management, careful sanitation, and good feeding.

**Q. What is the average length of life for a dog?**  
 A. About ten years, although dogs have been known to live to the age of 22 years. One year of dog life is equivalent to about 7 years of human life.

**Q. How much range is needed for growing pullets?**  
 A. Normally about one acre for every 100 birds. That will depend a great deal, however, upon the weather. More range is necessary during wet periods than during dry periods.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—"I want the people of Texas to know there are certain types of taxes to which I am opposed, both personally and as shown by my record of 12 years in the senate," Allan Shivers, who led his runoff opponent in the lieutenant governor's race by approximately 100,000 votes in the first primary, said here this week.

"I oppose a general sales tax, and always have, because I feel that it would place undue burdens on the people. I oppose a state income tax, because that field is pre-empted by the Federal government."

"I have always considered myself a conservative, both in ex-

penditures and in taxation, and on many occasions have opposed appropriations of the taxpayers money because I thought the expenditure was unwise and unnecessary. I have also opposed many tax bills because I thought they were levied on the wrong principle or that they were unnecessary."

"I have had to work hard all my life and that is probably the reason that I am conservative about the expenditure of tax money. I feel the same way about expending my own funds."

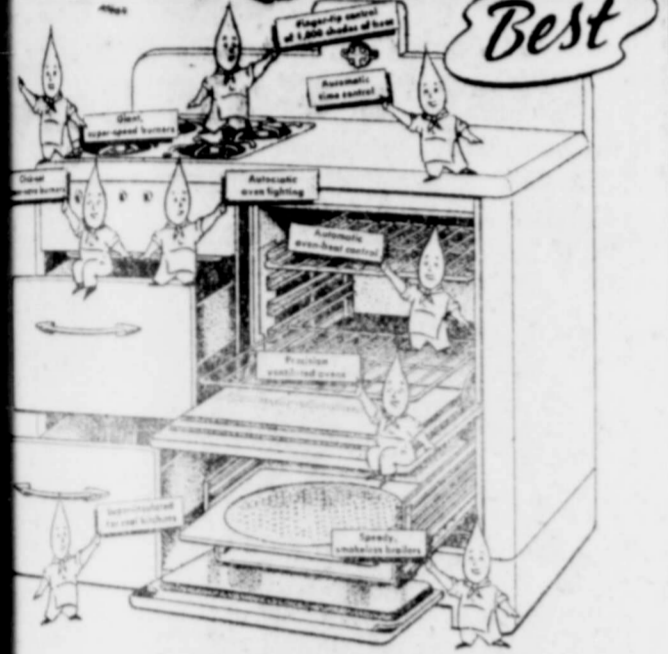

**DOG SHOW GOOD SPOT TO DECIDE ON PET WANTED**

**Gives Would-be Dogowner Opportunity to Judge Breeds Side by Side**

If in doubt as to the breed of dog to get, go see a dog show! This is the advice given to would-be dog owners by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

A visit to a dog show is a pleasurable opportunity to see and study at close range many of the 110 breeds recognized in this country by the American Kennel Club. Strolling past the "benches" is a fascinating as well as educational experience. Here are dogs from many countries, and dogs which for generations have been bred to fulfill specific purposes or perform highly specialized jobs. Every dog here, from the most diminutive to the largest, is a purebred specimen of his breed, in blooming condition and groomed to perfection. Two or three hours thus spent in enjoyable sight-seeing will not only facilitate a decision but in all probability also lead to contacts with those who have dogs of the breed decided on. The chances of seeing a dog show in one's own community have never before been as good as in this year of 1946, states the Center. Figures from the American Kennel Club indicate that during the current year dog shows will reach a new all-time high. The opportunity of viewing dogs on their benches is, of course, not

all there is to a dog show. Equally interesting and thrilling—particularly to the seasoned show-goer and fancier—is to watch the actual judging of the dogs. Often a first-time spectator, after watching from the ringside awhile, will ask, "What is the judge looking for when he goes over the dogs? How does he compare them?" The answer is that each breed has its own official Standard which describes in detail the conformation and qualities that constitute a faultless specimen, and that when the judge examines the dogs in the ring before him—inspects their teeth, feels their muscles and watches them walk back and forth—he is simply trying to determine which dog comes closest to measuring up to this Standard.

Another frequent inquiry from spectators is, "How is the best dog in the show selected? By what procedure is one dog lifted out of several hundred to be crowned Best-in-Show?" A dog show is a sort of elimination contest. First, there is judging of various classes in the individual breeds (Puppy, Novice, American-Bred, Limit and Open), segregated by sex. The winners of first prize in each class then compete for Winners Dog (male) or Winners Bitch (female). The winner of this class receives a certain number of points toward his or her championship title, which are figured in proportion to the number of dogs he or she defeated in the classes. Winners Dog and Winners Bitch are now matched for Best of Winners, and the winner of this class meets whatever champions of the breed are entered in the Specials Only class for title Best of Breed. By the time Best of Breed has been chosen for every breed represented in the show, perhaps only 40 or 50 dogs out of an original entry of five or six hundred remain eligible to contend for higher honors.

Now begins the judging of the six variety groups, called Sporting, Hound, Working, Terrier, Toy and Non-sporting. Only the Best of Breed winners are eligible for competition within their special group; consequently group contests are very keen and the quality of the contestants of the highest order. The six dogs that are placed first in each of these groups are then brought together to contend for the final and highest honor of Best in Show. This is the climax of the judging and the most exciting part of the show. Amid tension that almost crackles, the six finalists are examined, gaited and re-examined. Finally one of them is motioned to the center of the ring amid cheers and applause, to take his place in the limelight as champion of champions—Best in Show!
