Veterans' Survivors Qualify For S. S.

Many survivors of World War II veterans who have died since leaving the service will benefit from one of the provisions of the Social Security Act Amendments of 1946, Gordon James, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Administration field office said today.

James explained that the new section of the act provides for the payment of monthly benefits to qualified survivors of veterans who die within 3 years of their discharge and whose dependents are not qualified to receive compensation of pensions from the Veterans Administration. National Service Life Insurance is not considered as compensation or a pension.

In the case of such veterans who died before the enactment of the new amendment, the measure provides for monthly benefits retroactive to the date of the veteran's death if the survivors file their benefit claims with the nearest office of the Social Security Administration before midnight February 10, 1947. Of course, monthly benefits other than retroactive are payable on claims filed at any time by qualified persons.

Cotton Coming In To Local Gins

Several loads of cotton have come into the local gins the past week as the season gets under way with prospects of a crop 'way below average.

Although the dry weather cut the yield down considerably, farmers are reporting the general outlook much better than it was a week ago. Cotton which looks like only one-fourth bale to the acre is turning out almost twice that much lint.

Boll pullers are scarce although cotton growers are paying \$1.50 per 100.

For Expansion of Social Security

Emphasizing what was described as a great need for expansion of the Social Security program to cover presently excluded workers, particularly those in agriculture, Gordon James, manager of the field office in Wichita Falls, said yesterday that the state's public assistance program must at present carry the burden of assistance to old people and dependent survivors in this area, because this is predominantly an agricultural area whose workers are not covered by Old Age and Survivors Insurance (Social Security).

Social Security has no fight with the public assistance program, believing that it is doing a wonderful work, James said, but he believes that plan calls for taxation which puts a burden on public tax resources that could be avoided under the more general plan.

School Time and Safety

Monday morning several hundred school children will be going to school, some of them for their first time. School time puts more responsibility on car and truck drivers who pass our two schools.

The only way the children can reach the schools is to cross one or more streets. Cars and trucks use the streets. Children have been told about the danger of crossing streets, and sometimes they remember to look both ways before crossing. Sometimes they don't remember—until too late. The mind of a little child cannot concentrate on one subject for more than a few moments. It flits from one thing to another every waking hour. One time they may remember to look out for cars at a crossing. The next time they are thinking of little friends in the school room; of a new dress, suit or shoes they're wearing; of pets at home or a bird in a tree overhead or an airplane in the blue; of the books they are carrying or a friendly tussle between two boys; of a picnic trip last summer, or a promised trip to the circus this fall. Their thoughts are usually happy ones—that's why they don't think of things so unpleasant and painful as being knocked down by a car and possibly killed.

Grown-ups must do what the children cannot do—remember to look out for their safety. By slowing down at the schools, watching for the children and protecting their lives will take only 20 seconds more time each time you pass the schools. Isn't the life of a child, or two or three children worth 20 seconds of your time?

Little children believe that all the world is good; that everybody loves them just as their parents do. Don't betray that confidence by crippling or killing a little child. You can't show enough sympathy to the parents of an injured child to console them, or to ease the pain of a suffering boy or girl. But you can do your part to look out for the safety of school children and save your sympathy.

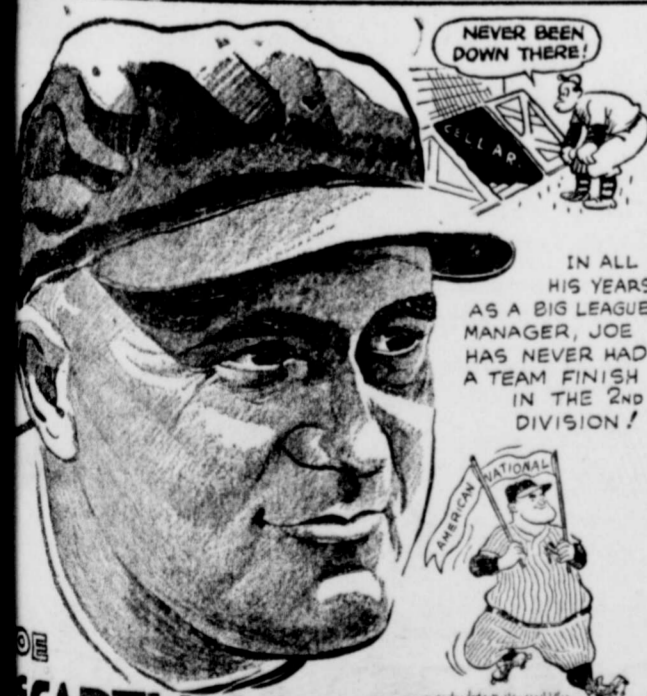

FAIR TIME

Summer brings many things for us to enjoy and as it wanes, the county and state fairs advertise their eye-openers. Not any of us in Burkburnett need be sold on this American entertainment. It is one institution which hasn't changed so much that our great-grandfathers might feel at home there. The manufacturing industry may have modern machinery to amaze grandpa but those prize pumpkins, pigs, preserves and quilts wouldn't startle him. The auto displays might be a treat for us but he would probably be more interested in the trotting horses. The first fair in our history was held in 1810 in Pittsfield, Mass., with the city subscribing \$50 for premiums and the citizens the same. Today prizes run into thousands of dollars and the youngsters of the 4-H Club walk off with a goodly share of it.

The fair sends many a city dweller who attends, back in memory to days when sheep, poultry and apples meant more than symphonic music on electric recorders, airplanes jet-propelled and stock market graphs. The grand stands may be concrete and the side shows stream-lined, but salt water taffy and popcorn still tastes the same.

STILL FLOURISHING

When those who wished to repeal prohibition back about 15 years ago, said it would do away with the boot-legger and moonshiner, some actually believed it. There is no doubt we have an illicit liquor business now if we read the recent report of the U. S. Alcohol Tax Unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue. In 1945 their unit destroyed 7,521 stills, arrested 9,492 persons attending them, attached two million dollars worth of property where illicit liquor was stored and confiscated \$169,000 worth of illegal alcohol. There are alcohol gangs headed by clever managers, with heavy finances and modern equipment, operating with enormous success today in many of the large cities.

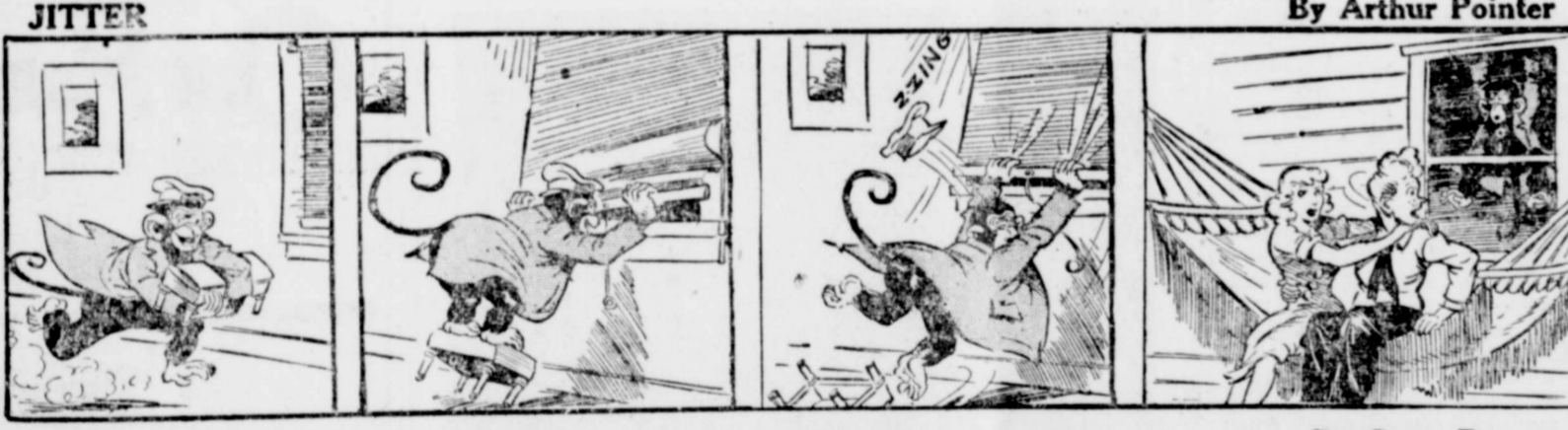

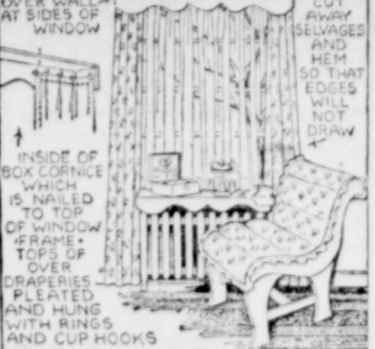

Partnership

Did you ever have a joint checking account with somebody? They can be handy things sometimes. So can a tin of gasoline in the basement, but both are extremely dangerous. All parties concerned must of necessity, have a co-operative understanding about how a joint checking account is to be used, how fast and for what purposes. Otherwise, one party's error might cause the other one trouble, no end.

I knew a man once who had a joint checking account with his son, who was a minor. The father didn't deposit all his money in this account. He didn't use it at all, in fact. It was just his way of guiding his son's early efforts to balance accounts and use money wisely. The idea was to teach the boy to distinguish between investing and just plain spending of money.

A Joint Account
I wish all taxpayers in the United States could realize that they have a joint checking account with Uncle Sam. Moreover, I wish they might suddenly wake up to the fact that everything they have is in this joint account. If Uncle Sam's stubs are not balanced, or if Uncle Sam's checks are not all numbered, Mr. Taxpayer is certain to have to make it good personally when something "bounces."

Government can assess taxes to the amount of what government needs, or thinks it needs, and that's a matter of judgment. During the war our executives spent money faster than it came in, running the country's debt to 268 billion dollars. However wisely the debt was contracted, it will never be any smaller until government officials begin spending less than they collect from the people by taxation.

Balance the Budget
There is considerable doubt whether those who spend and those who pay have a co-operative understanding about their joint account. They ought to see eye-to-eye. Victory was cheap, whatever it cost in money, but the unpaid portion still has to be met. Moreover the country's best economists think now is the time to start paying off the debt, while nearly all of us are earning good pay.

Recently I saw a summary of proposed federal spending for the next 12 months; a work-sheet from the 1947 budget, currently being considered. This budget can be balanced as certainly as figures can be depended upon to tell the truth. It calls for an outlay of 35.1 billion dollars to come from 31.5 billion of revenue—just 3.6 billion dollars in the red. Such a shortage need not exist.

Stay in the Black
The deficit can be offset two or three times by economy. Most of the expense items can be deflated some. Such obligations as social security, veterans' benefits, refunds and the interest on public debt are fixed. They can't be cut. But there are seven other general classifications of expenses that ought to be deflated about 50 per cent, all told. If this over-draft can be avoided it's a duty.

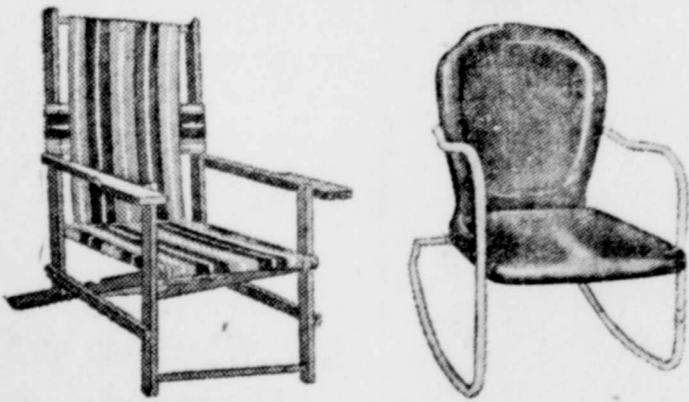

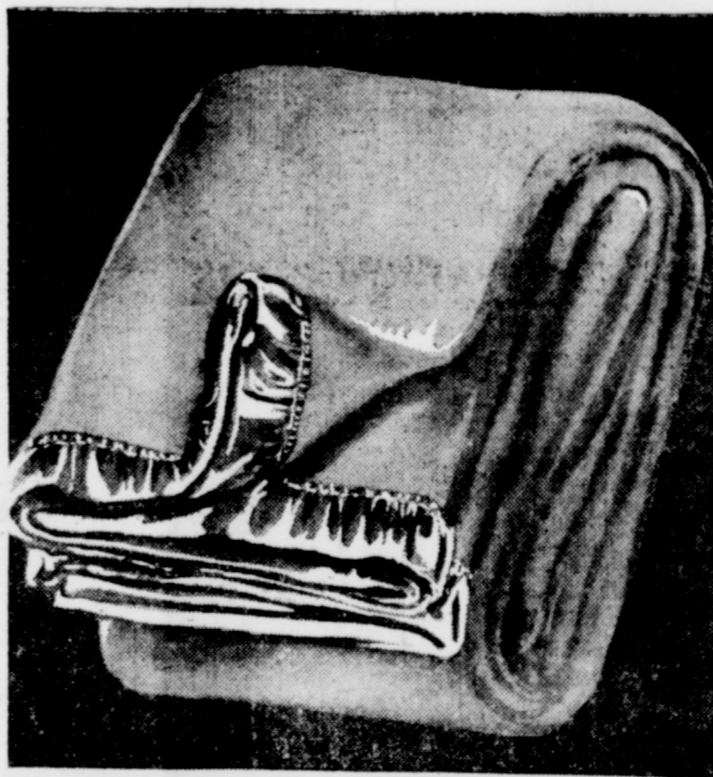

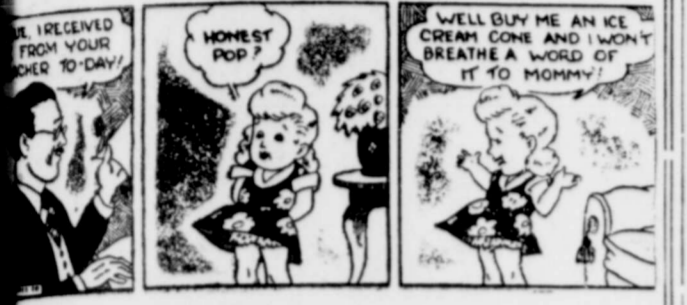
