Casey led the scoring with 25 points, Deel had 10, Corn had 4, Mendez had 4, Graham had 2 and Mitchell had 2. The Cubs played very well the entire game. The Cubs are now 4-1 in district play. Next Monday the Cubs will travel to Hawley to play the final district game of the season. The Cubs are currently leading their zone in district. Baird Junior High girls' A-team captured the first place trophy in athe Baird Junior High Basketball Tournament by defeating Moran 17-14 in the championship game. Tresa Hatchett scored 7 points to lead the Baird girls. Tammie Barron added 4 points while Missy Higgins and Beth Ringhoffer each contributed 2 points.

In route to the championship Baird's A-team outscored Cross Plains 29-15 in the first round. Tresa Hatchett scored 11 points in the game. Other scorers included Tammie Barron, 6 points; Beth Ringhoffer, 6 points; Missy Higgins, 2 points; Rhonda Clarida, 2 points; and Rebecca Elliott, 2 points.

Baird's A-team ousted Abilene Christian Middle School 27-2 in the semi-final action. Tresa Hatchett and Beth Ringhoffer led the Baird scoring with 7 points each. The other scorers included Missy Higgins, 4 points; Tammie Barron, 3 points; Rhonda Clarida, 3 points; Rebecca Elliott, 2 points; and Kay West 1 point. The girls' B-team from Baird Junior High won the consolation trophy bydefeating the Wylie 7 grade 13-11 in overtime. Candi Creecy and Doobie Moore led the Baird scoring with 4 points. Donna Defosses scored 3 points in the overtime period, and Leanna Parker's 2 points in the final seconds of the fourth quarter sent the game into overtime.

In the first round of the tournament, the B-team girls were defeated by Moran 23-11. Donna Defosses was the high scorer with 5 points. Candi Creecy scored 4 points, and Marilu Hart added 2 points.

Youth Holds Hostages In Baird Courthouse

Friday, January 18, was not a normal day for Baird. Around 3:45 p.m. a couple pulled up to the Allsup's Convenience Store and got \$6.70 worth of gas and drove off without paying for it. Carl Gunter, manager of the store had someone get the license plate number and then called the police.

The couple, a 16 year old boy and a 14 year old girl, were apprehended between Clyde and Elmdale in a yellow Ford four door with Mississippi plates. They were later to be discovered as 2 runaways from North Carolina.

The couple was brought to the courthouse and taken to the sheriff's office to await Carl Gunter to come down and file charges.

As the officers received information on the teletype, the couple took their chance and ran out of the courthouse.

The girl was quickly recaptured just outside the courthouse by Sheriff Bill Skinner but the boy escaped. Jess Henley ran back to get his car to continue the chase. Henley caught up with him in a house east of the courthouse. The boy was hiding in a closet and Henley pulled him out and reached for his hand cuffs. He had left them in the car so he jerked the boy to take him outside and the boy grabbed Henley's 45 caliber colt automatic pistol. Henley didn't grav for the gun because he couldn't tell if the safety had been removed or not.

The youth then forced Henley back to his car and made him drive to the court-house. The boy then demanded that his girlfriend be brought to him. Henley then explained that she was handcuffed to a chair and that the keys were kept only in the searchroom at the jail. Henley kept trying to get the boy out of the car. He

finally got him out and he heard a gun shot.

Terry Addison shot and hit the juvenile on the right wrist from the top of the courthouse four stories high using only his pistol.

The slug from Addison's .357 Magnum passed through the wrist of the boy so fast it didn't even knock the gun from his hand.

The boy then threatened Henley but he was able to calm him down. They then entered the courthouse and went into the sheriff's office where dispatcher Pat Addison, Carl Gunter and the girl were. The boy told Gunter to leave and kept Henley and Mrs. Addison.

Henley kept telling the boy that he was going to have a heart attack and that he was probable going to kill him that way. The boy then had Henley sit down and held Mrs. Addison as his primary hostage. Henley did have an attack in September that kept him away from work for seven weeks.

Henley finally talked the boy into giving up the gun on the boys terms, which were to be handcuffed to his girlfriend.

The couple was then transferred to Hendrick Medical Center where the boy was treated and were both turned over to the Taylor County juvenile authorities.

Aggravated kidnapping charges were filed Saturday against the boy.

No complaint has been filed yet for the gas theft. There were no charges brought against the girl, who is being held for juvenile authorities in North Carolina.

As the boy is almost 17, and because of the seriousness of the charges, authorities are considering having him face charges as an adult. The decision will be based on several things including a psychiatric examination.

Mollasses Spill, Creates Problems For Motorists

Early Friday morning, January 18, an 18 wheeler had a serious mishap which caused at least one car accident.

The truck, carrying molasses leaked it onto the road for about five miles along the westbound lane of Interstate 20 between Baird and Clyde.

Tammy Boyd of Baird was in Hendrick Medical Center late Friday, where she was reported in satisfactory condition with lacerations after the car she was in skidded in the molasses. Her husband, Glenn Boyd was driving the car and was not injured. The accident occurred about 7:15 a.m. east of Clyde.

The mess the molasses made was difficult to negotiate on. The conditions are similar to that of icy roads.

The molasses was the type used in cow-feed.

The truck has not yet been found and the driver evidently discovered the leak and had it repaired before driving past Abilene.

Sand was spread on the road to avoid more accidents.
