Talented Dancer Visits Burkburnett



Miss Wiletta Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Smith of Wichita Falls, has been visiting in the home of her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Smith of Burkburnett. She is the granddaughter of Mrs. Hattie Smith, also of Burkburnett.

Wiletta is well known in Burkburnett, having attended school here and in Wichita Falls. She graduated from the Wichita Falls High School with the class of 1944. During her school days, she was known as one of the areas most talented dancers. She received private dancing tutorage in Wichita Falls while a child and in the summers studied in Los Angeles and New York City.

Following her graduation she joined a USO touring group which brought her back to Wichita Falls to entertain soldiers at Sheppard Field in August, 1945. After leaving the USO in September, 1946, she enrolled at Los Angeles City College for one semester, where she studied dramatics. When she received her first call from Warner Brothers, however, she was forced to drop out of college to accept the roles.

Within the last few months, Wiletta, has played dancing roles in two pictures, "My Wild Irish Rose," starring Dennis Morgan and Andrea King, and "Sweet Genevieve," starring Jean Porter. In the first picture she was one of a group of 12 couple in a finale dance scene of authentic Irish jig and reel number, and in the latter film she did a boogie and waltz number in a six-couple group.

For her part in the "Sweet Genevieve" film, Wiletta was given her first "ad lib" speaking part, through which she moved up from membership in the Screen Extras' Guild to qualification in the Screen Actor's Guild, a difficult bridge, which, when crossed, is often the first link to stardom. She has several new parts lined up on her return to Hollywood next week.

Wiletta's father is owner of the Holiday Pipe and Supply Company. The young dancer lives with her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas D. Smith of Los Angeles, who also are visiting here this week.

Lutheran Centennial

The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio, and other States, usually referred to as the Lutheran Church of the Missouri Synod, will celebrate its Centennial next Sunday. This church body completes one hundred years of activity in April 1947. The Missouri Synod was founded in April 1847, at a meeting of 22 Lutheran pastors held in Chicago, then a little town of 16,000 population. It was organized with 16 congregations, numbering less than 4,000 souls as charter members. It now has 1,564,000 members and is the largest individual synod of the Lutheran faith. While its present numerical strength is concentrated in the Central and Midwestern states, it has churches and mission stations in every state of the union, some over 180 in Texas as well as in Canada, Alaska, Mexico, Cuba, the Hawaiian Islands, England, Panama and South America. Foreign mission work is carried on in India, China, Africa and the Philippine Islands. Lutheran churches throughout synod, including Grace Lutheran Church will observe the Lutheran Centennial Sunday, April 27.

EVERYTHING CHANGES

The common opinion is that everything changes, that nothing stays the same. This may account for the statement that the Russian policy is either going to get tougher than it is now or will be nicer. People or things, getting better or worse, is usually the natural course of events. If a change is due in the Soviet's treatment, we pray it is towards relaxing opposition, being more agreeable, less addicted to expansion. Getting tougher would but unite the Western world against them through sympathy and this wouldn't help the Russian policy. To gain their aims by being friendly or undermine countries by spreading Communism to attain their goal, is the question.

A NATION OBJECTS

The radio and movies help contribute to youthful delinquency, with programs that are objectionable, dramatizing killing and injuring humans, depicting acts of violence such as shooting. These publications impress youthful minds, since children are imitative and act out what they see and hear. We must present them with the type of story that builds character and ideals. There is so much influence brought to bear by both radio and motion pictures that they are of priceless value when they set out to aid youth.

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Action is being taken, in a number of places to ask for censorship of children's radio programs. The parents of Burkburnett appreciate and endeavor that will reduce child delinquency.

TAKING FOR GRANTED

When suffering a shortage of our natural resources we are face to face with what life would be without them. Water, soil, minerals, forests, wild life, have been granted this country in abundance. These have been accepted with no thought of a future when they would be depleted. In order to keep these natural bounties it is vital that they are conserved. As a nation we have not learned the lesson of conservation. Accepting water, trees and soil as something that has always been ever will be, we dismiss them from our mind. The farmer knows that without proper management, without protecting and restoring soil, the country could become a waste land in not too many generations. There have been times when cities have to curtail their use of water, such as summer sprinkling, due to shortage. Some areas have polluted water and all towns should watch the underground water levels carefully. The necessity of conserving forests is as important as protecting the Constitution, to keep a nation as ours. Wildlife is so important there is a special week set aside for the instruction of its importance. There is a wide range of study on the subject of the science of conservation but we need no text book to prove the good and bad that comes with preserving or neglecting man's natural resources.

Mr. Jefferson voted instead for Adams, or Jefferson would have been elected. However, the two remained friends, and when John Adams died on July 4, 1826, his last words were, "Jefferson still lives." As a matter of fact Jefferson had died some hours earlier. On July 3 preceding his death, Mr. Jefferson had rallied and ask what day it was. Upon being told it was the third he expressed keen desire to live until the Fourth, and was doubtless happy that he could expire on the great anniversary with which he had so much to do.


KEEP YOUR BABY CHICKS HEALTHY

Ordinary baby chicks reach the poultry raiser in good health. The producer's problem is to keep them this way through the brooding period and growing season, bringing them into maturity as a healthy thriving flock.

What are some of the obstacles the grower must anticipate in his effort to maintain this good health?

Clean Adult Stock

First, are the baby chicks

clean? That is, do they come from healthy parent stock from which all upplorum reactors were removed?

Another obstacle is contaminated soil. The brooder house should be placed on clean ground on which there has been no poultry or poultry manure for at least a year.

Poor sanitation is a principal cause of disease. Keeping the brooder house sanitary requires preparatory cleaning and disinfecting before chicks have arrived; continued cleaning and disinfecting of feeding and watering utensils after chicks are started; frequent stirring and raking of litter and removal of damp litter as it appears; the elimination of the cause of dampness, such as leaking roofs, sifting snow, or worn out litter; and such other tasks as will serve to keep contamination out of the house or yard.

If sickness develops, remove the sick and dispose of the dead birds either by burning or burying them.

Have Good Litter

A poor litter may cause trouble which the grower has not bargained. The litter should be clean and highly absorbent. The use of straw by itself as a litter is one common source of trouble. Peat moss, tanbark, peanut shells, shavings, oat hulls are some of the suitable kinds of litter.

Poor ventilation is a common cause of respiratory disease. When walls are sweaty, the ventilation system is not adjusted properly and should be set right. Overcrowding is responsible for heavy chick losses. Separate cockerels and pullets early.

Permitting young and old birds to range together is a bad practice. The adult stock, while apparently free of disease, frequently carries infection and spreads it to the younger, less resistant growing birds.

100 acres of land out of the Oscar Farris Survey, Abstract 363, said 100 acres being described by metes and bounds as follows: Beginning at a point in the East Boundary line of said Survey 332.8 varas North from the Southeast corner of said Survey; Thence North with said East boundary line of said Farris Survey 1176.5 varas to the Southeast corner of a 60 acre tract of land in said Farris Survey owned by O. L. Clark; Thence West with the

South Boundary line of said O. L. Clark 60 acre tract 479.8 varas to a stake for a corner; Thence South on a line parallel with the East boundary line of said Farris Survey, 1176.5 varas to a stake for a corner; Thence East 479.8 varas to the place of beginning.

Plaintiffs further allege that on the day and year aforesaid the defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiffs therefrom to their damages in the sum of \$1000.00 and that the reasonable annual rental value of said property is \$1000.00. Wherefore plaintiffs pray that defendants be cited to appear and that they have judgment for title and possession of the above described land and premises, for writ of restitution, for rents, damages, cost of suit and general relief. And on second count plaintiffs further allege that on April 24, 1917 they executed oil and gas leases on each of the 100 acre tracts described above to A. G. Ilseng, W. L. Mann and N. A. Dodge; that each lease was let to the lessees for the sole and only purpose of mining and operating for oil and gas and for laying pipe lines, building tanks, power stations and structures to produce oil and gas, and that said leases should remain in force for a term of one year and as long thereafter as oil and/or gas was produced by lessee sand provided that 1-8 of the oil should be delivered to the lessors as royalty and that if gas was discovered and used that \$100.00 per year per well was to be paid to lessors; that said lessees agreed to develop said premises with reasonable diligence; that said leases were given for the real and true consideration that said leases should be developed with reasonable diligence by lessees or their assigns; that lease agreements ceased upon the failure of lessees or assigns to carry out terms of said leases and ceased also upon abandonment of said leases by lessees or their assigns.

Plaintiffs further allege that defendants are assignees of the original leases by mesne assignments to certain portions of the lands herein-before described as will be hereinafter set out and that they have wholly breached the terms and conditions of said leases and have wholly abandoned the obligations thereof; that a few small wells were drilled but no oil produced from them for more than twenty years, no additional wells drilled in more than twenty years and no wells drilled to a depth exceeding 580 feet; that sufficient wells have not been drilled to determine if there is oil in paying quantities on lands assigned to them and that defendants have long since abandoned said leases and have no intention or plan to drill said land and that their assignments constitute a cloud on title of Plaintiffs' land.

Plaintiffs further allege that the defendants hold by mesne assignments from said original lessees, certain parts of said original leases as herein set out, to-wit: John F. Weyand, or his unknown heirs, legatees and devisees, or his independent executor, Charles B. Weyand, holds an assignment on the north 28 acres of the north 56 acres of the two 100 acre tracts hereinbefore described; F. E. Butler, L. F. Smith, S. H. Smith, Goldie or Zoldia Persky and husband, I. B. Persky, R. E. Fisher and W. W. Chambers claim an overriding oil payment in the amount of \$1000.00 payable out of one-fourth of the oil produced therefrom; and that further W. W. Chambers holds an assignment of the South 28 acres of the North 56 acres of the two 100 acre tracts hereinbefore described and that New Tex Oil Company claims an oil payment or overriding royalty out of 1-8 of 7-8 of the oil produced therefrom and H. D. Smith claims a right to develop the oil and gas under said lands by virtue of a contract with the New Tex Oil Company dated July 10, 1922 and recorded in Volume 193 page 438, Deed Records of Wichita County, Texas and John F. Weyand whose independent executor, Charles B. Weyand also claims some interest in this tract.

Plaintiffs further allege that defendants have not used due diligence in developing said leases assigned to them and that title and estate of each of these defendants has long since terminated and that their legal remedy for damages against these defendants is totally inadequate as some of their residences are unknown. Wherefore plaintiffs pray that defendants be cited to appear and that they have judgment cancelling the leases hereinbefore described in so far as said leases pertain to the North 56 acres of land described in the two 100 acre leases hereinbefore mentioned; and in the alternative Plaintiffs pray for an order of the Court requiring defendants to reasonably develop said leases in so far as it may be assigned to each of said defendants and that

Blind since he was shot down in one of the early Fortress raids over Germany, John Paul Moriarty has returned to work at the Timken Roller Bearing Co.'s Canton plant, thanks to a war-time developed electronic gauge which enables blind workers to inspect precision parts as rapidly and efficiently as a sighted person.

Timken officials said they began working on the development as part of a plan designed to provide postwar jobs for handicapped veterans. Leaders in rehabilitation work hail this as a far reaching step in their program to make the handicapped independent and self-supporting.

The gauging machine now operated by the veteran uses sound as a substitute for sight. By distinguishing between oscillating notes from a small loudspeaker, attached to the machine, the blind operator is able to tell whether the bearing being measured is proper or defective.

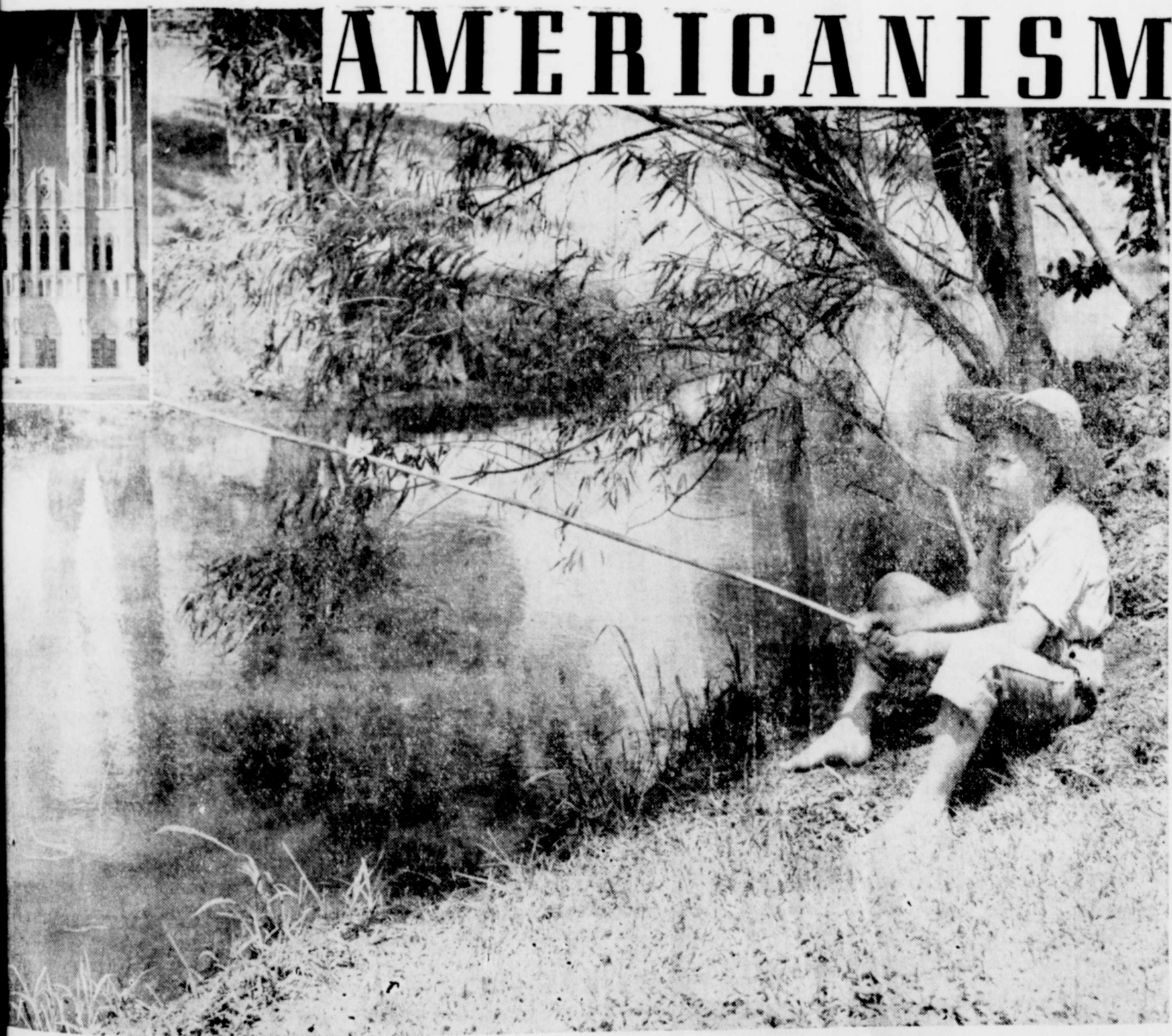

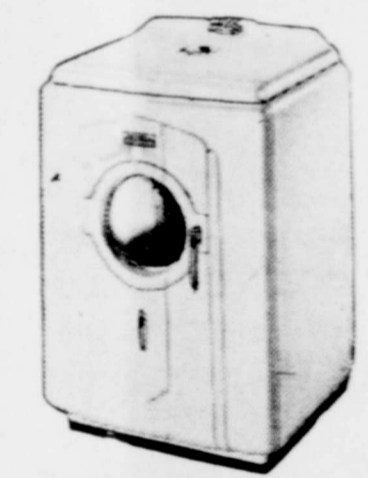
