

### CERTIFIED GOSPEL

It is a noble thing to search the Scriptures, so for this reason we ask you to turn and read Galatians 1:6-12. Now having read the above listed passage, let's notice some things emphasized therein.

In a day when we are keenly aware of the virtue of certified milk, certified cottonseed and certified public accountants, it seems the certified Gospel should be welcomed by us all with open, outstretched arms-particularly since it has to do with the destiny of our never-dying souls. Jesus said: "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." (Jno. 8:32). Error cannot be substituted for the truth in the plan of salvation. It is to our interest, therefore, to consider the certified Gospel.

The certified Gospel is the ORIGINAL Gospel. (Verse 6). In order to have "another Gospel", there had to be the original. In order to have the counterfeit, there must first be the genuine. There were "different gospels" in Paul's day and there are "different gospels" today, but it remains true that only the ORIGINAL Gospel can save. How may we know the difference? Any Gospel that had its origin this side of the New Testament or outside of the New Testament is a human product and is not the original gospel. Every creed written by man falls into this category, for they are of necessity substitutes for the New Testament.

The certified Gospel is the PURE Gospel. (Verse 7). The Gospel is declared to be God's power to save (Rom. 1:16), but power can be perverted. A perverted Gospel cannot save the soul. For example: food is God's power to satisfy hunger, but a measure of poison mixed with it will destroy that power. Just so, the Gospel is God's power to save the soul, but when human opinions and the doctrines of men are mixed with it, it becomes perverted, and, as a result, it loses its power to save. (Matt. 15:9).

The certified gospel is the SUFFICIENT gospel. (Verses 8, 9). The certified gospel, that Paul preached, is sufficient for all times and all peoples. Accursed is the man that doesn't preach the same gospel.



trout fishermen, or the musky fisherman and the bonefish fisherman boils down to the fact that it is not so much the species of fish you may catch, but how light the tackle you use.

No man will ever derive the utmost fun from fishing until he has reached the point where he considers the battle far superior to the catch. It is very encouraging to see the trend in recent years toward lighterweight fishing equipment.

The tarpon fishermen have discovered that a splittail fly streamer tied on a 2-0 O'Shaughnessy hook will usually drive these small 8 or 10 pound tarpon crazy in their mad rush to strike this tantalizing lure. You decide if this is equal to catching a bright salmon. Here both anglers use a 6 ounce fly rod for their sport.

It can be truthfully said that more tarpon are lost than salmon. Of course, we must grant the bonelike construction of the tarpon's mouth makes hooking more difficult than gently taking up the slack line when salmon fishing.

Hall asserts that fresh-water fishing can offer nothing comparable to stalking a bonefish in the crystal-clear waters of the Florida Keys with a 4 oz. tip rod and 150 yard reel, loaded with 6 thread line.

But the real fascination of salt-water fishing lies in the uncertainty of the size of your catch and the type of fish. This great uncertainty of the catch makes it superior in many ways to the angling in freshwater lakes and streams. So claims Mr. Hall.

1. I have a young Jersey cow that sucks herself. Is there any preven-

The question of cows sucking themselves is a serious problem but so unusual that not many animals are affected. The best plan would be to keep the animal tied or send her to the butcher. If the cow is valuable, you might try a harness, made somewhat as follows: Fasten a rope or strap back of the front legs, around the body, and tie quite tight. Then put a halter on the cow, and from each side of the halter fasten a light rope or strap back to the strap on her body. The ropes should be adjusted so that she can move her head sideways but not clear around to her body.

2. What is the best type of hog for marketing?






