## OUTDOORS --IN-- TEXAS

Here are some facts of interest to outdoorsmen.

There are some 2,500 dealers selling hunting and fishing licenses in Texas.

All hunting and fishing licenses in Texas expire on August 31 each year.

A total of 775,000 fishing licenses may be issued this year in Texas.

Texas hunting license sales may hit 736,000 this year.

Some 175,000 hunting licenses earned by Texans are 'exempt' licenses. They are given to persons over 65 years of age or under 17.

Income from hunting and fishing licenses represents more than half the revenue needed to finance the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and its experimental projects.

Even though you are outside the licensing age for hunters (under 17 or over 65), you must obtain deer tags (25¢) to attach to the antlers of any deer you kill in Texas.

Accidental deaths last year reached the highest level in 18 years. But firearms fatalities decreased 11 per cent.

Firearms ranked last in the eight major causes of accidental deaths in the USA last year.

Improper use of firearms accounted for 2,400 of the nation's 105,000 accidental deaths last year. Other causes were motor vehicle accidents (47,700), falls (19,100), fires (7,700), drownings (6,700), poisonings (3,600), railroad accidents (2,600) and all other types (16,800).

Only one death per 100,000 people in the nation is due to improper use of firearms. Automobiles account for 24.5; falls 10; fires, 4; drownings, 3.5; railroad accidents, 1.4; poisonings, 1.8, and all other types, .8.

Most firearms accidents (55%) occur in the home, not on the range or in the field.

Despite a 50 per cent increase in the number of hunters and shooters since 1950, hunting and shooting accidents have decreased 13%.

More than half of the home accidents with firearms were the result of young children playing with guns.

You should store firearms and ammunition in widely separated areas of the home and out of the reach of children.

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## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finance. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members hereafter be fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

### Action By Legislature Helped But Texas Faces Teacher Shortage

Texas faces another teacher shortage this year, but the shortage would have been far worse had there been no action by the Legislature in improving teacher salaries, says the Texas State Teachers Association.

The action by the Legislature in providing an average annual teacher salary hike of \$554 is having an early effect on bringing many better teachers back into the classroom, but more are needed.

The shortage that will affect Texas schools when they open this September is discussed in an editorial in TSTA's official publication, the Texas Outlook.

The basis for the predicted shortage this September, according to the editorial, which was signed by TSTA Executive Secretary Charles H. Tennyson, is the experience being encountered in TSTA's Teacher Registration Service at the Association's Austin headquarters.

Tennyson's editorial said that by mid-July the Teacher Registration Service had fewer teacher applicants for a larger number of teaching positions than at the same time last year.

And last year, noted the editorial, "has been acknowledged as a record-breaking year in the teacher supply drought."

The TSTA office is not the only avenue for teacher job applications, but its work load offers strong evidence of the statewide situation, Tennyson wrote.

Many, though not all, Texas superintendents list available teaching positions with TSTA's Registration Service.

This year 1,951 vacancies have been listed by superintendents using the service.

The Registration Service, however, has taken only 450 applications. At the same time last year there were 100 more applicants and 300 less vacancies, states the editorial.

The only field in which there appears a surplus of teachers for teaching jobs available is social studies.

The dark side of the ledger shows only four math teachers have registered with 198 vacancies listed in that field. There are 30 science teachers registered for 127 vacant positions.

Other short fields include almost the entire spectrum with girls' physical education and Spanish teachers high up on the list of vacancies.

Even coaching jobs are going begging, apparently. TSTA has only 40 hopeful coaches registered to fill 91 available jobs.

Tennyson concluded, "it looks like another mad scramble for teachers this year, without an apparent solution in sight."

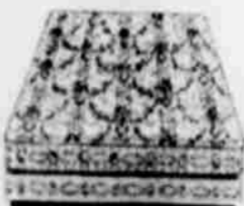

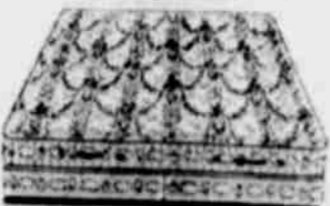

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### Undergraduates Must Request Deferments Under New Act

A new draft form on which undergraduate college students can request deferment has been furnished draft boards, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday.

Undergraduates must request deferment under the new Military Selective Service Act of 1967 after the date of its enactment, June 30, in order to be deferred.

The form, titled "Request for Undergraduate Student Deferment (SSS Form 104)" reproduces pertinent provisions of Section 6 of the law dealing with student deferments.

On the form the student states his understanding of the provisions of law printed on the form, states he is pursuing a full-time college course, and asks for deferment in Class II-S, then signs the form. The blank forms may be secured from local boards.

Colonel Schwartz said that requests for deferment could be made by ordinary letter, too.

"The form is for the convenience of students," he observed, "it will help them understand what the law provides."

Deferment of undergraduates in Class II-S is mandatory if they are full time and satisfactory, under 24 years old, and request deferment.

To be satisfactory, a student must make normal progress toward his baccalaureate degree.

For example, in a four-year course, he will be expected to earn 25 per cent of his credits in the 12 months following the beginning of each year.

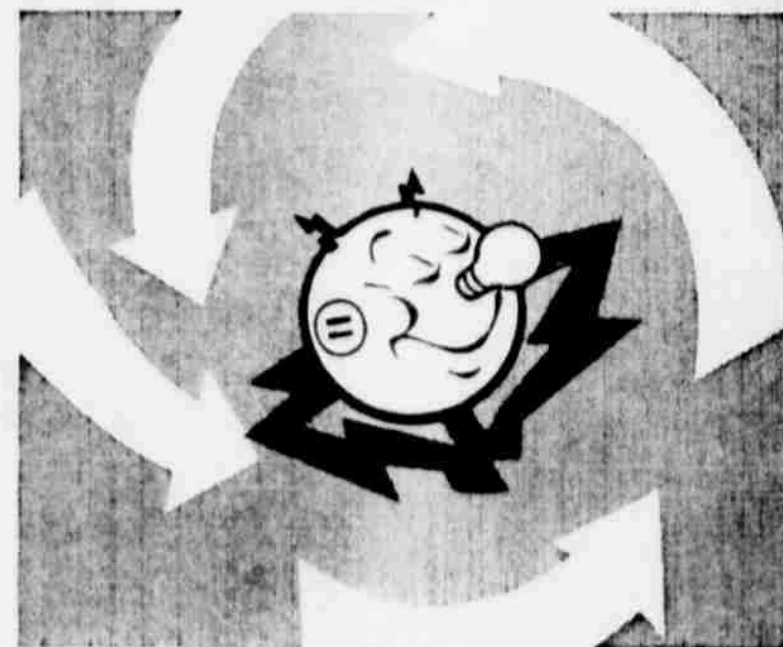
Before his arrival in Vietnam, he was assigned at Wethersfield RAF Station, England.

### PRECEDENT TO BE FEARED

The editor of the Asheville, North Carolina, Citizen has reported one of the most disturbing federal business expansions that has come along yet. It seems that the Office of Economic Opportunity has provided a grant of \$179,000 to Community Action, Inc., of Boone, N. C., to publish a weekly newspaper and distribute it free to everybody in four counties... including those who can't read. Weekly newspapers in the area already cover community news. The official objection is that not enough people subscribe to them and read them.

The Asheville Citizen comments that, "If the OEO can publish a weekly newspaper in Northwest North Carolina... Washington can... develop—gradually, insidiously—a federal press, financed by taxpayers' money and telling the American people only what it wants them to hear. That is not likely? No, it is not likely. It is still possible. That is the prime tactic of dictatorship, with a controlled press the main tool." This is an intolerable precedent in a nation where individual liberty depends to such a great extent upon the independence and freedom of expression of thousands of weekly and daily newspapers. Their role as the public conscience and watchdog of government is absolutely irreplaceable.
