### Construction On WTU Paint Creek Generating Station Begins July 1st

Construction for a \$10 million addition to West Texas Utilities Company's Paint Creek Generating Station on Lake Stamford in Haskell County is scheduled to begin about July 1st, according to R. W. Hardy, WTU President. The general contract for installing a new generating unit has been awarded to Hawkins & Westbrook Construction Company of Abilene. Additional contracts for electrical installations and piping and instrumentation will be let at a future date. John Hutchinson, WTU Vice President and Chief Engineer, pointed out the addition of the fourth unit at the plant, a 107,000 KW steam turbine generator, will almost double the plant's generating capability. When the unit is placed in service in the spring of 1971, the station will have a generating capability of 233,400 KW. This represents a 17% increase in the Company's generating capability. David Craddock will serve as WTU's resident construction superintendent, and Leo Hollon will serve as the Company's electric supervisor for the construction project. WTU's Paint Creek Generating Station is located on a 120-acre site on the north shore of the Paint Creek Reservoir 14 miles southeast of Haskell and 16 miles northeast of Stamford. Initial construction of the plant

was begun in 1952, and the first unit was placed in commercial operation in 1953. Subsequently, generating units were added in 1955 and in 1959. With the installation of the fourth unit, the Paint Creek station will be the largest generating station in WTU's system. On May 16, 1969, the Company placed a new 95,000 KW steam generating unit in commercial service at the Rio Pecos Power Station near McCamey. Hardy pointed out that building to provide generating capability for West Texas was a continuous program and that multi-million dollar construction programs frequently overlapped, even though sometimes it requires from three to four years or longer from the initial planning stage to commercial operation. The Paint Creek Station is one of seven major steam generating plants operated by West Texas Utilities Company. The other plants, Lake Palestine station near Quanah, the Abilene Station, the Oak Creek Plant in Coke County, the Concho and the San Angelo Power Plants at San Angelo, the Rio Pecos Plant at McCamey, and a gas turbine plant at Fort Stockton, are all inter-connected by high voltage transmission systems. These plants provide electric energy for 167 towns and communities served by the Company.

These include The Swenson Land & Cattle Company, The Waggoner Estate and the Four Sixes' along with one Haskell County entry to date in the person of Nancy Cody Morales who will have a cutting horse carrying the brand of her late Father's famous Hackamore. 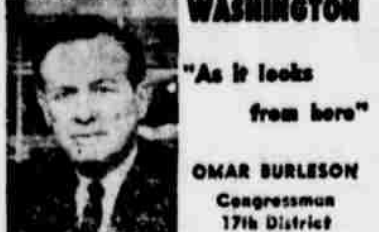

**WASHINGTON**  
"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. - On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating June 14th as "Flag Day." The date chosen by Wilson was not without reason.

On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress adopted a resolution, which for all intents and purposes, originated the official design of our U. S. Flag. The resolution provided, "Resolved that the Flag of the United States be made of 13 stripes alternate red and white, that the union be 13 stars white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

Observance of June 14 as National Flag Day stems from that action by the Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia on this day in 1777.

Many people lay claim to originating the idea of "Flag Day" to be celebrated on June 14th. Organizations of "Fathers of Flag Day" and "Mothers of Flag Day" are numerous. Doubtless President Wilson was influenced by these groups to issue his proclamation but the date itself had been historically established.

A school teacher from Fredonia, Wisconsin probably deserves the greatest credit for his campaign to designate a day to especially honor the Flag. In 1885 Bernard Cigrand arranged for his students in a small country school to put on a program called the "Flag Birthday." It was held on June 14. From then on, both during his teaching and after retirement, Mr. Cigrand devoted his time and energies to having a special day set aside to honor the Flag of our Country.

History is a little uncertain as to who actually proposed the original Flag. There is disagreement on who conceived the design and even whether Betsy Ross, at the request of George Washington, sewed the first Flag together in June, 1776, in her house at 238 Arch Street in Philadelphia. There is even a question about where the Flag was first flown. During the early part of the Revolution, George Washington used the "Grand Union Flag" which bore the British Cross of St. George and St. Andrew on a background of blue with 13 red and white stripes representing the Colonies. It was meant to symbolize unity among the Colonies and to bolster the morale of his soldiers.

The British crosses represented the relationship to the Mother Country and even though the Revolution was on and fighting in progress, the Flag was used as long as there was hope for reconciliation before all ties were severed.

After several months of fighting, hope of averting total war was finally abandoned.

It may have been soon afterwards, that George Washington, Robert Morris and the uncle of Betsy Ross' husband, George Ross, asked her to sew a flag of certain design representing the independent colonies. There seems to be no official data to prove where the Flag was first flown or its dimensions.

The record is made clear some 37 years later when Francis Scott Key, a prisoner aboard a British ship in Baltimore Harbor, wrote a poem describing the attack on Fort Mifflin. He immortalized that particular Flag as the "Star Spangled Banner."

Purpose of the tour is to provide students with a meaningful exposure to European business and economics, particularly as they relate to activities of a similar nature in the United States.
