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**Stitching And Stewing**

Regardless of the state of your financial health now, you can improve it by making and using a spending plan. A budget—or spending plan—is a tool to help you spend money wisely and reach your family goals. A budget can help cut out inefficient spending and give your family more for its money. Of course, preparing a budget takes planning, and following a budget takes determination. You'll need cooperation from the whole family.

To be workable, your budget should be tailored for your own family; it should be adapted to your family's needs and income.

You'll find it easier to keep track of your plan if you keep records of your spending. The record need not be expensive

or elaborate—a loose-leaf notebook is excellent for this purpose. Several types of financial record books are available in variety and stationery stores.

You can make your forms for recording expenses and income simple to your family's needs; then transfer them to your record book.

If you would like more information on how to develop and follow a spending plan that you can use to make your dollars respond to the wishes of your family, enroll in the Management Correspondence Course being offered by the Extension Service before March 8th. For our recipe of the week I have chosen this recipe for Enchilada Casserole.

**Enchilada Casserole**  
 2 lbs. ground beef  
 3 hot chili peppers, chopped  
 1 med. onion, chopped  
 1 clove garlic, crushed  
 Oil  
 1 can tomato sauce

**Salt and pepper**  
 12 corn tortillas, fried  
 1 can cream of chicken soup  
 1/2 soup can milk  
 1/2 cup grated cheese

Brown beef, chili peppers, onion and garlic in oil, add sauce, salt and pepper. Line casserole with 6 tortillas; cover with one-half of meat mixture. Lay remaining tortillas on top. Pour chicken soup over tortillas; pour milk on top. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 300 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 12 servings.

By ETHEL PIEHA What is Community Organization

Community organization is a general term which has been used to describe the process of involvement of people in decision making processes. Group work, community organization, community development, detached social work and community coordination, have all been used to describe attempts at achieving neighborhood and community level involvement in various problems and issues.

What is a group problem-solving effort all about? It is a program in which residents of specific community decide to work together. They meet, talk and plan how to solve problems and needs they share as a community by using their own skills and local resources.

The residents of an area feel, and talk about, the existence of what they consider to be a major community problem or need. Examples of these needs may be streets need paving, signs or lights need installing, a local public health clinic may not exist or if it does it might need to expand its services, juvenile delinquency, narcotics or some

Governor's Education Com. Would 'Phase-Out' County Supt. of Schools

One of the proposals of the Governor's Committee on Education is to "phase-out" the office of county superintendent of schools. This proposal has probably caused a number of people to wonder "Why do we have that office, anyway?"

Actually the office is supported by an allowance from the State Available School Fund, and not by county tax money. What the schools don't get from the State Available Fund is made up to them from the Minimum Foundation School Fund, which is provided from various state taxes.

On the other hand, the rural schools would be deprived of a number of services which they could not provide for themselves without the expenditure of a considerable amount of their own school tax money.

At present the bookkeeping is done in the county school office

for Paint Creek, Weinert and Carney (O'Brien) schools. This involves their handling of four regular funds each for the three schools, or twelve regular funds, showing all receipts properly distributed, and all expenditures in fourteen different budget categories.

In addition to these regular funds, the schools receive federal funds in several different categories, which require extra care in handling and reporting. Each school has a Consolidated Application Fund, which is actually a combination of several different funds, which must be kept as one fund in the bank, but separately in the books.

Other services which the schools receive from the county school office will be discussed in a later issue.

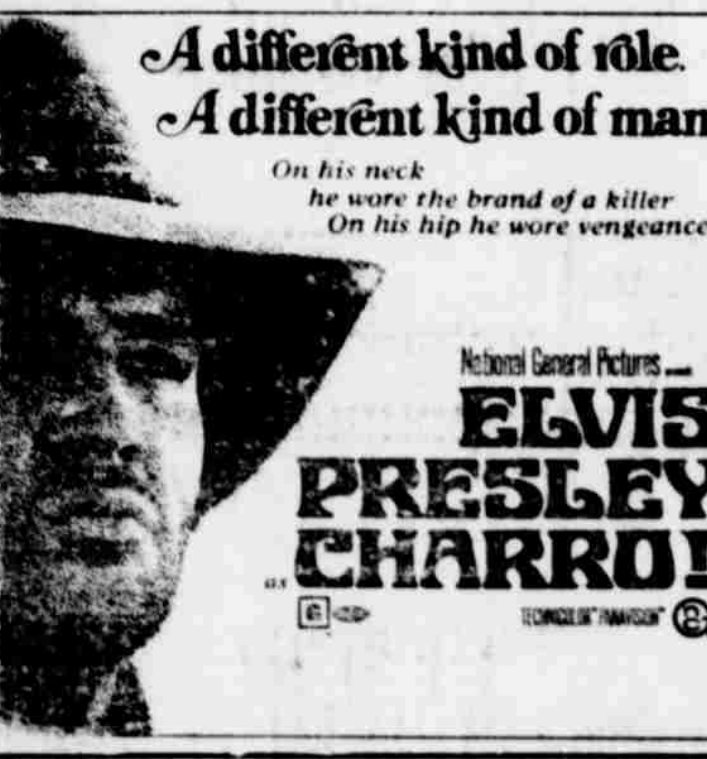

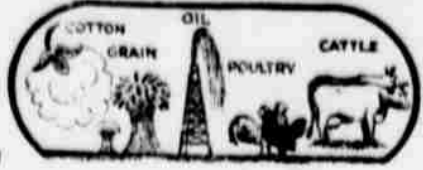

Board President Clyde H. Wells, said the new center will specialize in vegetable production and breeding of special varieties for the Rolling Plains region of Texas. He said the facility also will conduct research covering a broad area of quality and marketing of vegetables.

The Munday Chamber of Commerce will provide a site for the new research center, Wells noted. The facility will be operated by A&M's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. H. O. Kunkel, A&M Dean of Agriculture, and acting TAES director, said vegetable research work for the West Texas area is currently being directed by Dr. Mack Fuqua out of the station's Lubbock facilities.

Testing work in Munday, Kunkel added, began in 1961 when potatoes, cantaloupes and onions were introduced into the region. More recently, he continued, the Munday area received a contract for 200 acres of seedless watermelons as a result of TAES testing.

Dr. Kunkel predicted the vegetable industry could develop into a \$10-million business for the Munday area.

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### April Draft Call Is Up From March

The April draft call for Texas is 1,727, up from 1,572 for March. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

The state quotas for February and January were respectively 1,564 and 1,363. A few of the inductees for February, March and April are scheduled to be selected for the Marines, but most are scheduled for Army duty.

Quotas for physical examination have mounted steadily since the first of the year, the call for April being 7,293 men, while January was 7,206. February and March are respectively 3,371 and 4,387.

Colonel Schwartz also said that Texas had been called upon to furnish 18 doctors of medicine for the Army during the period July 1969 through January 1970, the state's share of a national quota of 437.

He said that the state also had been requested to provide two optometrists during the same period, as well as one doctor of osteopathy, the optometrists for the Air Force and the osteopath for the Army. Nationally, the Air Force is asking for 25 optometrists and the Army is requesting 23 osteopaths.

The national draft quotas for 1969 and their allocation to the Army and Marines are as follows: January: 26,800, all for the Army; February: 33,700, 32,200 for the Army and 1,500 for the Marines; March: 33,100, 31,600 for the Army and 1,500 for the Marines; April: 33,000, 30,500 for the Army and 2,500 for the Marines.
