

Community organization is a general term which has been used to describe the process of involvement of people in decision making processes. Group work, community organization. community development, detached social work and community coordination, have all been used to describe attempts at achieving neighborhood and community level involvement in find out who might help and various problems and issues Each approach represents a somewhat different technique. but basically the goals of each of residents in all or parts of are similar. Traditionally, these approaches have been used to resolve problems within community by group of collective action. It can be observed that most of these efforts have "one-shot attempts" solving some problems; consequently, there has been little integration of the groups efforts with other existing problems

What is a group problem-solving effort all about? It is a program in which residents of specific community decide to work together. They meet, talk and plan how to solve problems and needs they share as a community by using their own skills and local resources. When a problem or need cannot be solved by the local residents






