The Board has used this survey as a guide in setting ed an unlucky day by many, but up and posting evaluations. With this survey it will be possible to really equalize the tax burden. Every building in town was measured, and building material in each structure noted. It is known almost to the dollar just what it cost to build each building. The values are based on 1941-1942 construction costs, not building costs today.

For instance: You may own a home built in 1941 at Those making contributions a cost of \$3,600. The Board has set your valuation for tax purposes at \$1,800. Today, your \$3,600 home in 1941 may \$100 bring \$7,000 at current prices. Instead of listing 50 per 10 cent of present value, which would be \$3,500, you will be paying on only \$1,800 worth of property.

In past years valuations have been very low here. By this time you should have received a card Leon Carver notiyfing you of any raise on your property. When you get your card, look at the value placed on the property by the Board. If it is not more than 50 per cent of the 1941-42 construction cost, you will be paying

only your fair share of taxes. The Board knows what your valuation should be, and one of the men who made the survey will meet with the Board at the hearing and back them up. Ninety per cent of the property owners will accept the valuation placed on their property. Probably ten per cent will appear before the Board and argue against their fair share. The Board is composed of men who have one purpose in mind: To do their very best to place values so that each property owner will be paying his fair share of taxes and no more. These men are giving freely of their time. They serve without pay. Don't take up their time arguing for a cut invaluation if you are not entitled to it. They have no favors to hand out. NO BONANZA

Do you think that high prices are a bonanza for retailers? If so, a recent factual report on the experience of American Department stores for the first quarter of this year will be enlightening.

In that period, the stores' dollar sales were six per cent better than during the same months last year. But net operating profits-the money the retailer has left after the bills are paid-declined. This was due to a very heavy increase in expenses, including payrolls. Net profits from merchandising operations amounted to only 1.9 per cent of sales.

Other types of retailing have had a similar experience. er shop Sunday afternoon from Inflation has hit retailing all along the line. In many instances it has been impossible to raise prices sufficiently to offset the higher costs. Tate, Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Administration office said today Regular hired help is defined as a worker on a farm or in a farm household who meets both the following conditions:

1 He must have been employ ed by the farmer continuously for a full calendar quarter. No tax is due for agricultural labor performed in this qualifying quarter.

2 In the next quarter he is employed by the same farmer in agricultural labor on a full time basis for at least 60 days, and his cash wages for these services are \$50 or more.

REDUCE POULTRY MORTALITY RATE

Although considerable progress has been made in respect to poultry health the past few years, the average poultry flock continues to have a high mortality rate. Too many chickens are getting sick and too many are dying. As a result, it remains for the poultry-raiser to adopt even more rigid diseas: control measures and enforce still better management pro-

Failure to follow such a plan can cause large losses to a poul tryman. His income can fall well below the amount which his flock, if properly cared for, is capable of earning.

Consider, for example, the loss of a single layer. When a layer producing ability. This situation puts more of a burden on the other layers and forces them to share more of the costs.

Control Number of Deaths The job, or goal, of the poultry raiser is to control the flock death rate. Some deaths, of ourse are unavoidable. But for the most part, a raiser can do great deal to keep the death rate low. The objective should be: low (below average) mortality rate and good egg produc

There are many obstacles to overcome if the objective is to be realized. But a poultryman vho observes sound managemen practices and watches his flock carefully should have little trouble in realizing consistently




