



The Eastern Little League All-Stars slipped by the Haskell Little League All-Stars 3-0 Monday night at Abilene to eliminate the locals.

Eastern had racked-up the District Five Championship with a 9-2 win over Merkel while Haskell was winner of District Six.

Ron Thomas on the mound for the Eastern Little League All-Stars allowed only three men to reach base during the game, and only one of those was by a hit. Opposing pitcher, Walter Wooten, got a ground rule double in the second inning, but

never got farther than second. Wooten was the only Haskell player to advance that far. Eastern, who usually gets 10
