Most of this latter group were members of last year's "B" squad and will again play the "B" games this season. Coach Richardson will start his Junior High team about September 4. It will include 7th and 8th grade boys.

OVERWORKED DOCTORS

News reports say that Britain's "free" national health service is threatened with a mass withdrawal of doctors. The doctors—20,000 are now enlisted in the service—have many criticisms, including the fact that they are forced to do far more work for less pay than in the days before medicine was socialized.

One need not be overly concerned with the plight of the doctors to understand the significance of this development. The real victims of socialized medicine are the patients. An overworked doctor, forced under the panel system to attempt to treat an excessive number of people, will inevitably make mistakes, and patients who are seriously ill will not, in many instances, receive the character of medical service they need. Moreover, under "free" medicine a dangerously large part of the doctor's time is taken up by people who have little or nothing wrong with them, and simply go to the office for examination because it's something they have coming.

Under socialized medicine, in addition, there has been a critical decline in research and in preventive medicine. Doctors simply haven't the time for it. And the British system offers small incentive to explore new worlds of medicine.

Finally, if the real costs are honestly counted, "free" medicine is mighty expensive in terms of money as well as in terms of standard medical care. The bill is paid in taxes. In Britain's case, the actual cost of the service has run far beyond the optimistic estimates, and has been a major factor in her budget difficulties.

LONDON MIGHT KNOW

Spaniards near Gibraltar observed a day of "National mourning", lit bonfires on the hills around the famous "Rock" while Franco's press demanded the return of the ancient fortress. At the same time, it leaked out that Don Juan, the Pretender, son of King Alfonso XIII (who died in exile, but never abdicated) had demanded the family throne back from the Generalissimo. It was necessary, Don Juan told the Dictator, for him to get that crown back in order to arrange some personal liberties for the Spanish people and to establish cordial relations with the U. S. and other Western Powers. He strongly suggested that Franco was trading heavily on his nuisance value to force aid and recognition from the non-communist bloc, charged flatly that corruption is inevitable under the present regime, but insisted he was not hostile to Franco's principles.

Don Juan also mentioned he had heard Franco was thinking of putting 13 year old Prince Juan Carlos (Juan's son) on the throne with Uncle Francisco as Regent. Don Juan, in the elegant Catalian manner, no doubt, said nuts-to-that. He'd take that crown first, please.

At that, Papa's plan might be a surer way for young Juan Carlos to get the king job. But why is Don Juan, relatively silent for so many years, making his pitch now? Who is pushing him? Would those Falangist fires around Gibraltar, mourning an incident of 247 years ago, have any connection?

Farm Electrification Week is being observed—and it is of great significance this year. Since 1930, farm output has increased 55 per cent, while the number of workers engaged in agriculture has declined seven per cent. 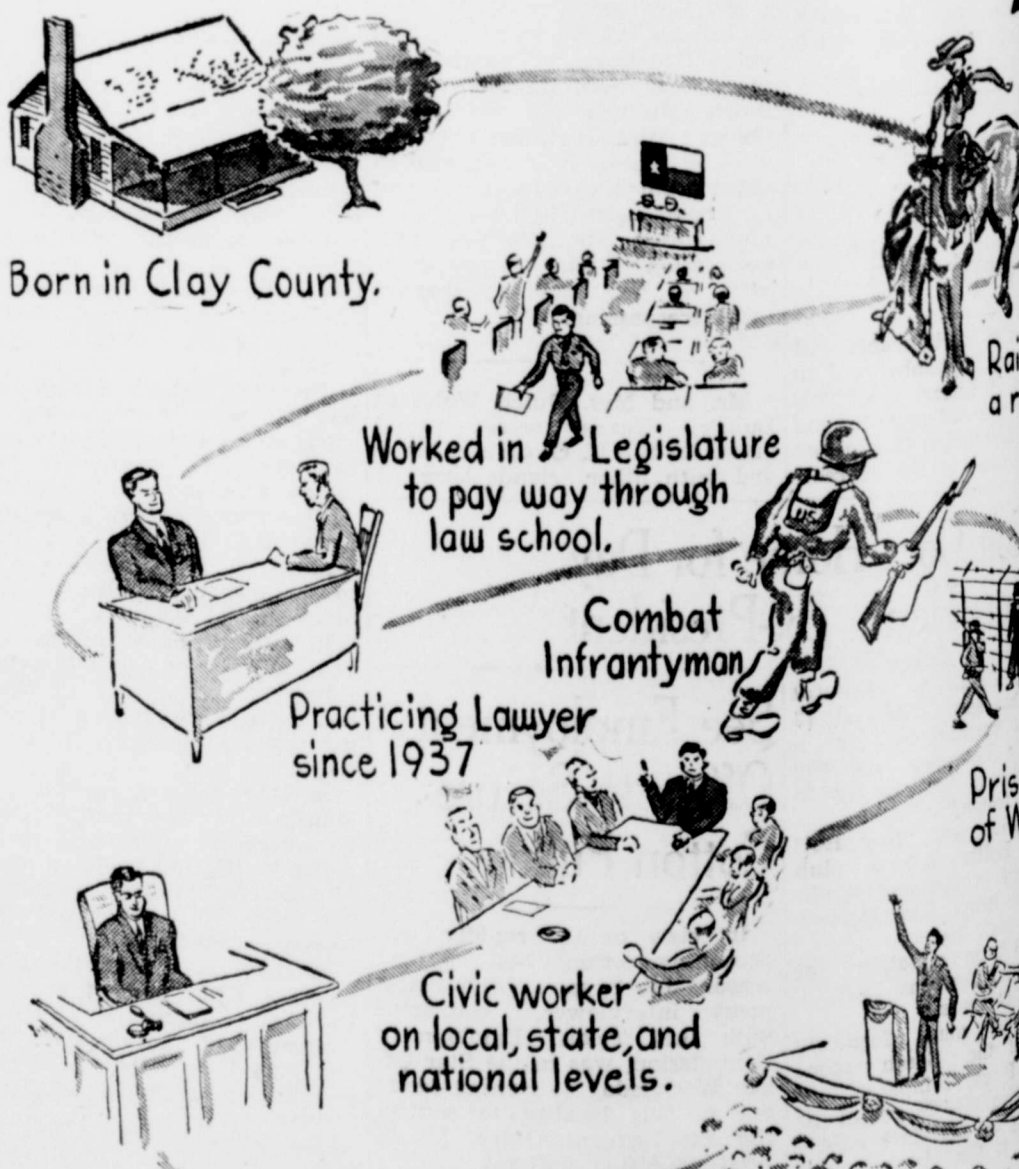

Revenue from Texas poultry was up from \$5,951,000 (mil- lion) to \$27,651,000 in the most impressive gain. Egg profits were up, too, from \$18,595,000 to \$52,481,000. Incomes from grain sorghums and calves both increased more than 100 per cent.

Milk and milk products (up 84 per cent), corn (up 54 per cent), hogs (up 46 per cent) and cattle (up 36 per cent) brought

significantly larger sums to raisers. Cattle and milk and milk products, the two most im- portant commodity classes dur- ing the first half of 1951, gave Texas cattlemen \$183,179,000, and dairymen \$103,957,000.

four such sessions being conducted throughout the State by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation during September. In attendance will be Federation President J. Walter Hammond and State Field Representative Leon Lane.

Loys D. Barbour of Iowa Park, State Director for this district, will preside. The all-day meeting will be held in the YWCA at Wichita Falls beginning at 10:00 A. M.

Purpose of the sub-district conferences is to give officials of the State organization an opportunity to confer with County leaders on present day issues affecting agriculture. President Hammond will discuss the organization's program of work this year and the responsibilities of local leaders. Mr. Lane will present the enrollment plan which has been developed by the State organization and recommended to counties for use in the annual membership enrollment drive scheduled for the week of October 11-18th.

In his report to county leaders and members, President Hammond will discuss the movement led by the Texas Farm Bureau which resulted in the passage of a natural resources tax this year to help defray expenses of State government. The Texas Farm Bureau's successful campaign which saved the rural road program for another two years will also be reviewed. Leaders will be told of the Farm Bureau's intensive program to curb price controls, its efforts to control inflation, work of the organization on the Pogue labor bill which will provide alien labor on the farms of Texas during the harvest season. Hammond is at present urging Texas congressmen to devote effort to eliminate red tape in processing of Mexican Nationals which is causing delay in making labor available to farmers.

Walter Jenkins Favors Sound Farm Program

Walter Jenkins of Wichita Falls, candidate for Congress in the special election to be held Sept. 8, this week expressed violent disagreement with proposals that the government stop doing anything to assure that the farmer receives a full share of the national income.

"Agriculture is the backbone of the 13th Congressional District," Jenkins declared. "What happens to farmers is important to every one of us."

The 33 year old former administrative assistant to Senator Lyndon Johnson then proceeded to compare prices received for farm products today with prices received in the early thirties.

"The total cash income of all the farmers in the country was considerably below two billion dollars in 1932," Jenkins pointed out. "Last year it was well over thirty billion dollars. That's an actual increase of around 1600 per cent. And even when you take into consideration the increased cost of living, the real increase in cash farm income amounts to around 650 per cent."

Jenkins added that farm mortgages have decreased in number yearly since 1932. Eighty per cent of the nation's farms have electricity now, he said, compared with only 11 per cent in 1932.

"It is simply not enough to have a Congressman who promises to be against everything that is proposed for the good of the people generally," he asserted. "I don't believe the people of the 13th District want a hired hand who serves notice in advance that he doesn't aim to do any work for them."

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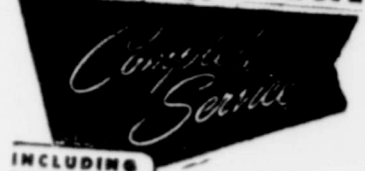

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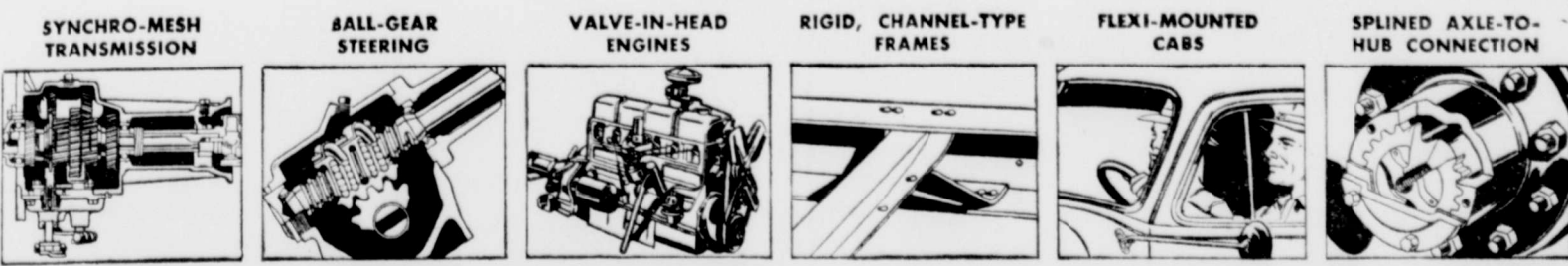

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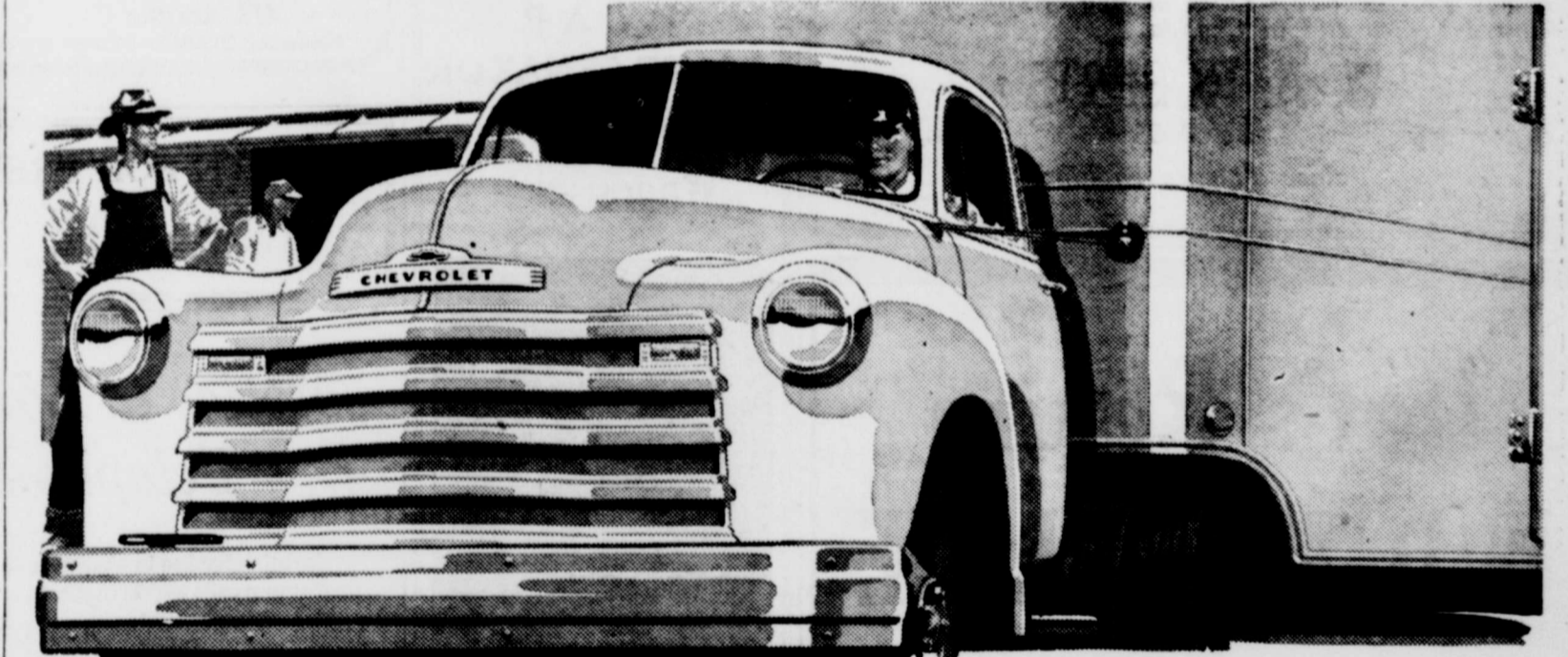

New Notes in Cooking

If you're looking for a new slant on that old favorite apple pie, why don't you omit the butter with which you usually dot the fruit, and pour in one cup thick sour cream before adjusting the top crust . . . or use part brown or maple sugar in place of granulated sugar.

Add ¼ teaspoon Ac'cent (pure monosodium glutamate) to your favorite recipe for meat loaf (about 1½ to 2 pounds uncooked meat) and get the full value of natural flavors. Use all or part tomato juice for moistening.

The "seconds" call will be for cauliflower if you serve it with toasted buttered (margarined) crumbs. One half cup bread crumbs (no crust) with 3 tablespoons butter (margarine) will do the trick.

For a gourmet touch to your meat loaf or meat balls serve them with creamed fried Bermuda onions. Fry onions as usual, sprinkle with flour and mix; add rich milk; heat until thick and smooth; season—and don't forget the pure monosodium glutamate if you want flavor perfection!

Cottage cheese added to the filling for deviled eggs makes for fluffiness. Allow 1 tablespoon cheese per egg.

Hot cooked rice, seasoned with salt, pepper and Ac'cent, buttered, and tossed with a few raisins and a good sprinkling of curry powder becomes "Rice Orientale." It goes nicely with lamb, veal, or chicken. Omit the raisins and the same idea serves for fish or seafood.

Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

Certain changes in charges and practices pertaining to long distance calls within the State of Texas will be made effective September 1, 1951.

Basic Station-to-Station Day Rates

There will be increases on only 124 of the 815 mileage distances. In no case will the increase amount to more than 5 cents for the initial period of conversation on day station-to-station calls. There will be no increases in the station-to-station day rates over 202 miles.

Station-to-Station Night and Sunday Rates

A discount of approximately 20 per cent from the station-to-station day rate will continue to apply on all station-to-station calls costing over 50 cents completed during night hours and all day Sunday.

Person-to-Person Day Rates

Rates for person-to-person calls, which cost more to handle, are based upon the station-to-station rates. The differential will be 50 per cent instead of the present 40 per cent. The minimum differential of 15c will be continued.

Person-to-Person Night and Sunday Rates

The night and Sunday discount on person-to-person calls generally will continue to equal in amount of money the discount on station-to-station calls between the same points.

Slot Machines Drop In Texas: By Jim Sparks. Slot machines in Texas have dropped from 9,555 to 127 in the past year, and Attorney General Price Daniel predicted this week that the 127 slots will be eliminated before the state's new anti-slot machine law becomes effective on Sept. 7th.

Last year Texas, with 9,555 slot machines and gaming devices, led the nation in the number of machines on which

the federal tax of \$150 had been paid. This year's payments, which were due by August 1, 1951, showed that taxes were paid on 120 machines in private clubs and seven machines in public places.

Words of praise for Texas law enforcement agencies from the nation's chief crime buster, Senator Estest Kefauver, and reports of more investigations by the House Crime Committee were in the news of Texas' continued war against organized crime during the past week.

Kefauver and Texas Attorney General Price Daniel appeared together on a panel discussion of control or organized crime at the recent meeting of the National Association of Attorneys General in Seattle.

Before the chief attorneys of the 48 states, Kefauver gave a public expression of praise to Daniel, the Texas Legislature, and law enforcement officers for this fight against crime.

Kefauver said that Attorney General Daniel's conference of Texas district and county attorneys should be followed by other states.

Daniel reported that Texas had ended slot machines and open racehorse bookie parlors, the two forms of gambling branded by the Kefauver Committee as the backbone of organized crime.

Open bookmaking shops have been closed by Daniel's injunction suits against telegraph and telephone companies. The drop from 9,555 to 127 slot machine payments show the effectiveness of the new law passed by the 52nd Legislature.

Meanwhile, Chairman Fred Meredith of the Texas House Investigating Committee was planning new hearings for early fall. Meredith would not designate the places but it was rumored that Dallas and Houston might be on his list.

The majority of Galveston gambling was reported still closed with the local county attorney, Raymond Magee, making nightly raids on those who defied the law.
