#### MONETARY POLICEMAN


One of the strongest arguments put forth in support of the 10 per cent surtax recently passed by Congress was the need to put our financial house in order so that foreign nations would regain confidence in the dollar and thus slow the rush to concert foreignheld dollars to gold. There is a puzzling contradiction in all this. For years we have been told that gold is an anachronism that should be done away with in today's monetary picture. U. S. citizens, in fact, were separated from their gold coins many years ago, and the gold backing of our money has gradually disappeared.

The educational process of convincing everyone that gold is playing an impressive part in forcing fiscal responsibility on our own government which, so far as the ordinary person is concerned, has been off the gold standard all these years. Apparently, gold is still a monetary policeman which governments have failed to rid themselves of as yet.
