FARMERS HAVING WHEAT SPRAYED BY AIR PLANE

Farmers in this area who have detected damage in their wheat caused by cut worms have speeded up the spraying considerably — they are using air planes. Some farmers have not yet had any cut worm damage, while others have experienced considerable damage.

Mr. Betts stated that the cut-worms are in the wheat fields in damaging quantities in at least 75 percent of cases. Some fields are in worse condition than are others—but in all the damage is about 25 to 50 percent already. These worms are rapidly multiplying—hundreds of little ones being found, and they ranged on up to adult size. Mr. Betts said they had sprayed about a thousand acres for Mr. Arnold Holtz and about 100 acres for Arnold Kiesling, using DDT. He has also sprayed north of Grandfield, Oklahoma, and between Iowa Park and Wichita Falls, and in all instances has found that about 75 per cent of the fields are infested. Fields that have been sprayed are practically 100 per cent free of worms and the wheat is coming back in good shape. Not less than one pound of DDT is used to the acre. Should this mild weather continue, Mr. Betts predicts an awful lot of damage to the wheat if these worms are not controlled.

C. E. Betts, who may be contacted at Farmers Co-op. Gin, phone 176, is working in the Burkburnett area spraying with a plane. Mr. Betts tells the Star he has plenty of poison on hand and all work is guaranteed. He says the very day the wheat is sprayed, the cut worms cease their destructiveness.

1952 Car License Plates Arrived at C. of C. Office

Ray Hill, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, reports the new license plates are moving quite rapidly. They have a black background, with orange letters. Passenger numbers start at DS 10. It would be difficult to anticipate the number that will be sold this year, as last year's plates are still selling. Approximately 3000 were sold last year, and there will probably be at least 100 more sold.

Britton Motors To Feature 1952 Fords Fri. - Sat.

The all new 1952 Ford automobile will be on display at Tom Britton Motors Friday and Saturday, February 1st and 2nd. Ford for 1952 offers a more powerful Ford V-8 engine, an entirely new six-cylinder engine, and the widest choice of power train combinations for passenger cars in the high volume field. Ford's Strato-Star V-8 has been redesigned to step up the horsepower to 110 and to increase its torque to 196 pounds feet. Ford has made more than 12,000,000 V-8's and is the world's largest builder of V-8 engines.

The new six-cylinder engine for 1952 is called the Mileage Maker Six, and the Ford Motor Company built a multi-million dollar engine plant at Cleveland, Ohio, to manufacture it.

The Mileage Maker Six, rated at 101 horsepower and 176 lbs. feet torque is a high-compression low-friction overhead valve engine developed during four years of research. It was designed for adaptability to higher compression ratios to take advantage of gasolines with higher anti-knock ratings when the fuels become available.

However, both passenger car engines are designed to operate on regular gasolines. Only Ford in its field offers a choice of six-cylinder and V-8 engines and it also is exclusive in offering the option of three transmissions — Fordomatic, the Ford automatic transmission; the Ford overdrive, and the conventional transmission.

Six power combinations — either of the two engines with any of the three transmissions — are available on all models in the Mainline and the Customline except the Country Sedan.

The Country Sedan is powered by the V-8 as are the Crestline models, the Sunliner convertible, the Country Squire station wagon and the Victoria. Any of the three transmissions may be used in these models.

Suspended power-pivot brake and clutch pedals, another Ford first, are features of the new 1952 Ford car line.

The pedals are suspended from a bracket anchored to the dash and instrument panels, leaving the floor area clear and eliminating holes in the toe-board.

Leverage is increased and pedal action made easier by the new linkage. The master brake cylinder is mounted on the dash panel in the engine department, easily accessible and out of the water and dirt area.

John White Raps Grain Scandals

John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture for Texas, said today that the grain scandals, "breaking out in Texas like the rash" could have been prevented if HB 670 had passed in the last legislature.

He said this new grain warehouse legislation for a stricter program of licensing and inspection. He added that most warehousemen, "who, as reliable business men, are as anxious as anyone else to get rid of the grain bootleggers," are themselves in favor of a law "with some teeth in it."

"I'm going to press for enactment of such legislation again," White added. "With a bill like that, we can get at those unscrupulous storage operators who convert the farmers' grain to their own use."

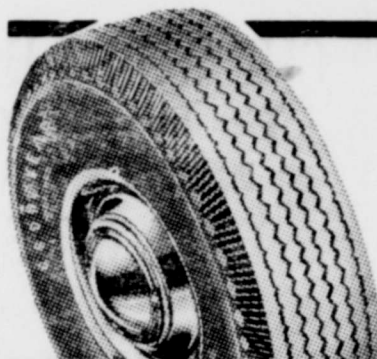

Thornton, Jr., chairman of the highway commission, to a number of audiences, including that at the November convention of the WTCC. Thornton declares \$219 million per year for five years—\$1.1 billion in all—will be necessary to meet the highway needs of the people of Texas.

George Moffett Makes Statement On Auto Law

The Burkburnett Star has received the following statement from Senator George Moffett, concerning the auto inspection law. His statement follows:

"When the auto inspection bill came before the Senate at Austin, I recalled the old headlight inspection law which we had in this state about fifteen years ago. It proved to be unsatisfactory and was repealed. In some respects this auto inspection law follows the pattern of the old headlight law; and I am not surprised at the objections which have been made to it. It has nothing to do with speeds, yet accident records indicate that speed causes about 90 per cent of the accidents."

"While I sincerely favor safety upon our highways, I do not consider that the present auto inspection law is the answer to the problem, and therefore, voted against it. A few other members of the Senate did likewise; however, the bill passed by a big majority in both branches of the legislature. My belief is that it will be modified or repealed when the Texas Legislature meets again."

Rent Stabilization Office Opened 24th

Announcement was made today of the official opening of the local Rent Stabilization Office, Andrew E. Gilbert, Acting Area Rent Director announced that the local Area Rent office began accepting registrations Thursday, January 24th. The office is located at 319 Post Office Building in Wichita Falls, Texas and the Telephone No. is 2-0772.

Gilbert said that all rental housing units are subject to registration including houses, apartments, rooms in private homes, rooming houses, boarding houses, resident clubs, non-educational dormitories, hotels, motor courts, tourist courts, tourist houses, trailers, trailer spaces and individual plots of land used for housing. Gilbert said, further that forms have been received and a ample supply is on hand to register all rental units located in Wichita County. Landlords are reminded of the information needed to file their registration statements which is as follows:

1. The tenant's name and initials.
 2. Address of the rental unit, if an apartment or room and the location in the building.
 3. The amount of rent that was being charged on September 1, 1950.
 4. The number of rooms.
 5. If the unit was constructed after January 31, 1947. The date it was completed and the date of the first renting.
 6. The equipment and services that were furnished on September 1, 1950.
 7. A detail description and cost of any major capital improvement or substantial increase in services since September 1, 1950.
- Landlords will have until February 27, 1952 to file their registration statements but are requested to file them at the

earliest date possible in order to avoid the last minute rush. The base date for rent stabilization in Wichita County is September 1, 1950 and the effective date is January 14, 1952. Landlords are again reminded that they should not accept any more rent after January 14, 1952 than they were receiving on September 1, 1950, and there is a severe penalty for false statements.

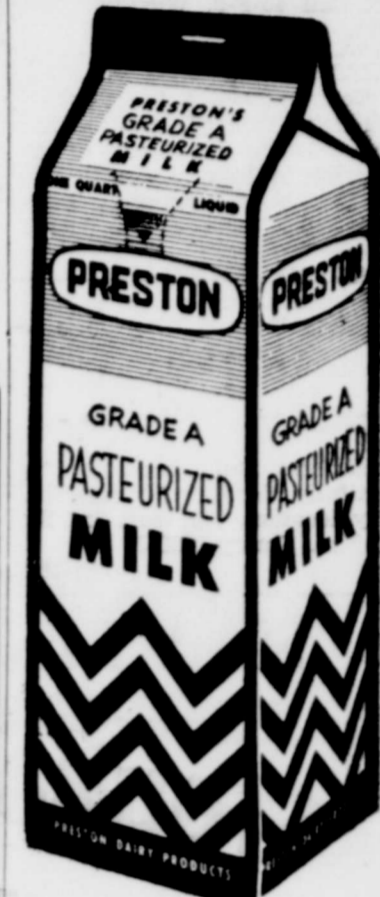

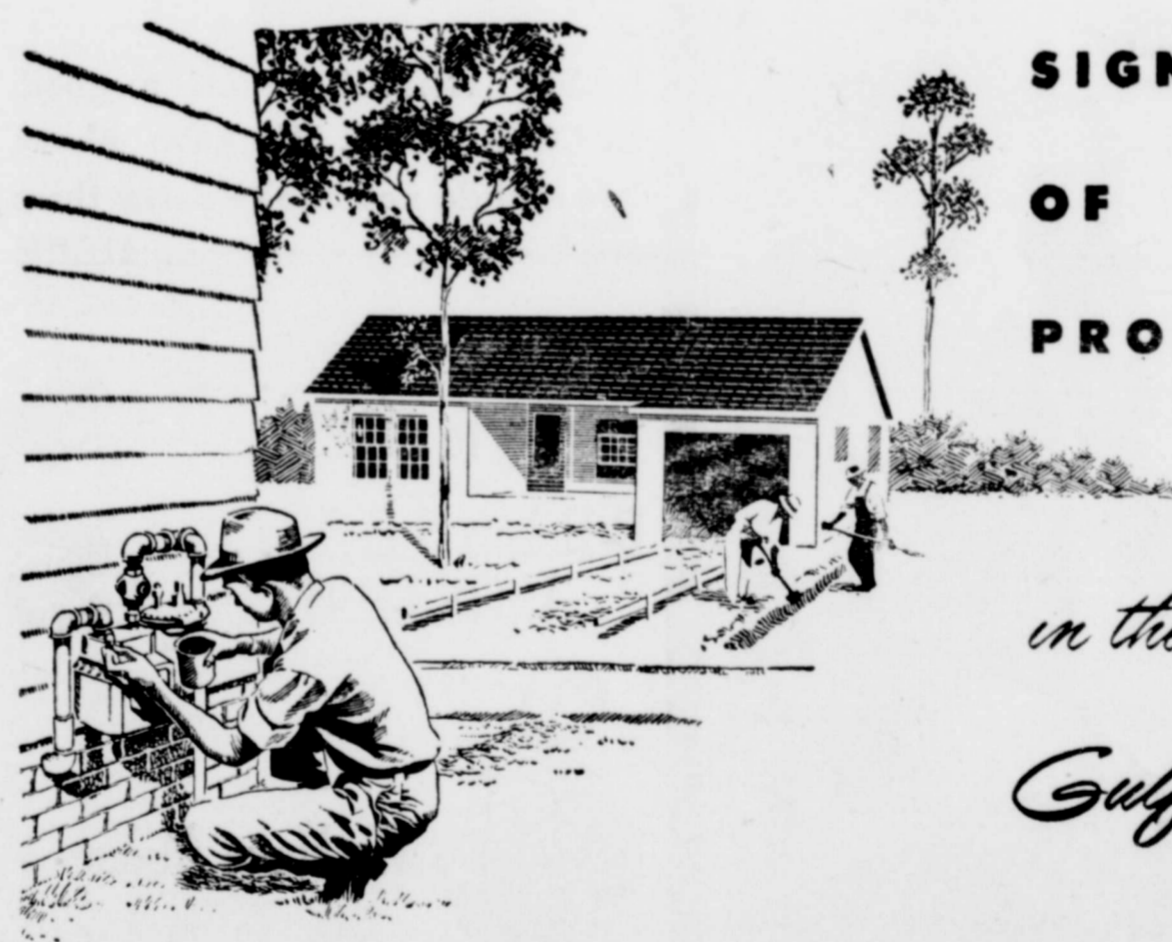
