Bill Fouts, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Fouts, who recently returned from South America, where he completed two years as a volunteer in the Peace Corps, showed slides and spoke to members of the Rotary Club at last Thursday's noon-day luncheon meeting at Felker's dining room.

Bill told attentive Rotarians, as he showed the slides taken in South America, of the efforts of the Peace Corps to improve food, production, health, education and the lives of millions whose governments have asked help from the Peace Corps.

"Teaching the people to help themselves" was the main objective of the Corps in Columbia, South America, Fouts said.

President, Bob Greenroy presided over the meeting; Bob Herren gave the invocation and E. C. Couch led the singing, with Mrs. Henry Withers at the piano. Happy birthday was sung to Ed Hester.

Rotarians voted to give \$25.00 to the Teen-Age baseball program.

In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1947, oil and gas operators drilled 84 wells in Haskell County. Of these, 41 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association has estimated that operators in the county spent more than \$1.8 million in drilling last year, of which \$946,385 was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$505,357 in production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners. Crude oil production paid \$61,129 and natural gas production, \$4,228.

Texas Employment Commission figures for 1966 show that some 88 workers directly employed in oil and gas operations accounted for a payroll in excess of \$401,948.

Champions To "Slug It Out" Monday Night

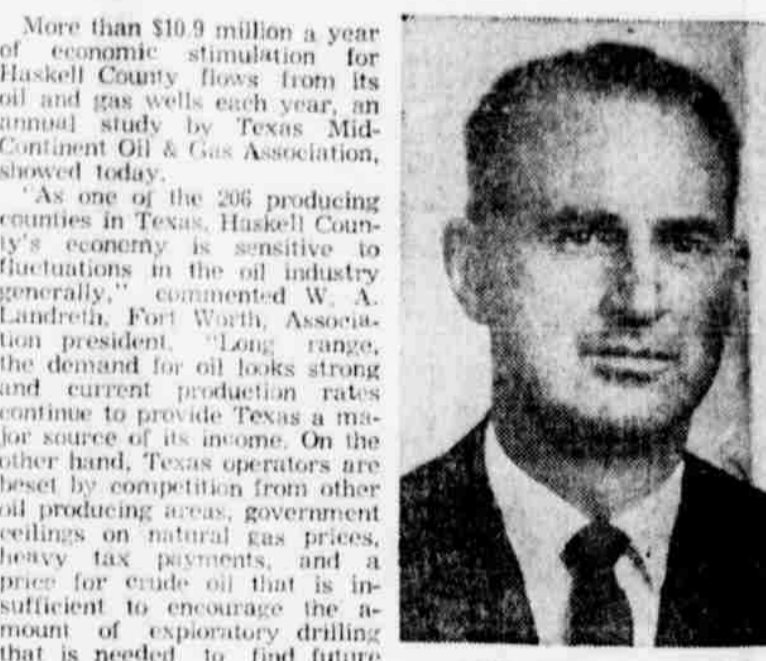

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON RULE'S RECREATION CLUB

Construction was begun Tuesday on the Rule Recreation Club, a one hundred and five thousand dollar project which will consist of a community center, swimming pool, golf course, water course for fishing and boating, picnic grounds and croquet courts.

The site will cover one hundred and two acres located two miles west and three-fourths miles north of Rule. The land was purchased from Jack Wilcox for \$25 an acre.

Contracts let are as follows: Construction of the community center to South Plains Steel Structures, Inc., Lubbock, Frank Donahue. This includes the rest rooms for the swimming pool, kitchen facilities, a dressing room for ladies, a dressing room for men and a lounge.

The large metal construction will also be equipped with a fireplace. All of the floors will be tiled. An awning on the south side overlooking the swimming pool will provide shade for the spectators. Construction on this phase of the project began Tuesday.

Moser Construction Company of Wichita Falls plans to begin construction of the modern swimming pool by July 25th.

Costello Construction Company of Wichita Falls will construct the sprinkling system, underground pop-up, fairways and the greens. All of the fairways will be watered.

Tucker & Stephens of Graham and Herman (Cotton) Williams of Rochester will build the greens, clear the fairways and construct the site for fishing and boating. Plans for two croquet courts and facilities for the picnic grounds are under consideration at this time.

Members of the Rule Recreation Club may participate in all of the activities without any additional charge. Persons who are not members may participate only in golf and fishing providing they pay a nominal fee. Members may bring out-of-town guests.

Certificates and by-laws will be mailed to the 110 members from Rule, Rochester and Old Glory within the next few weeks, according to Pete Eaton, committee chairman.

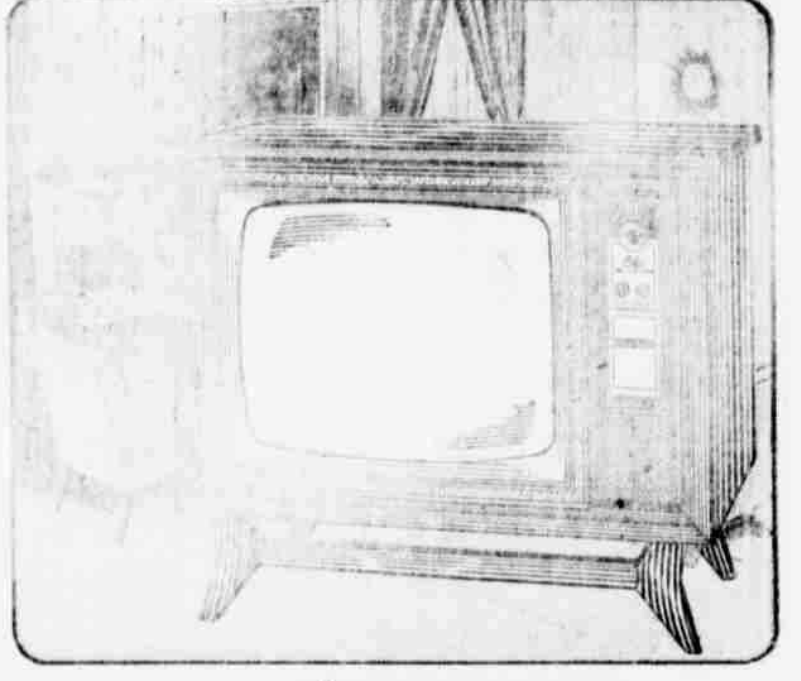

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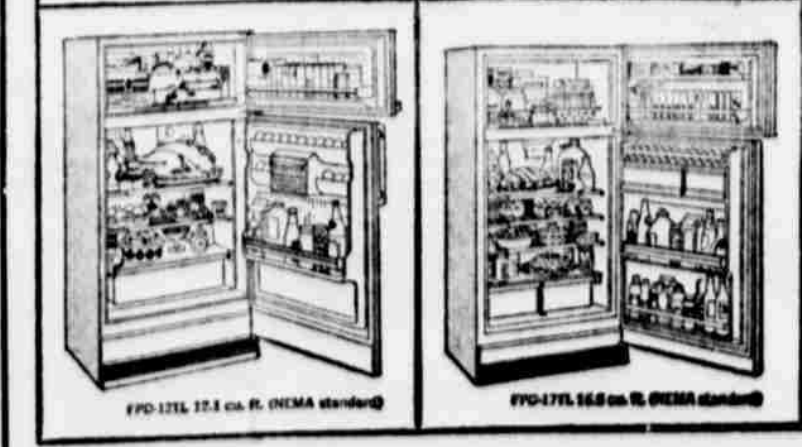
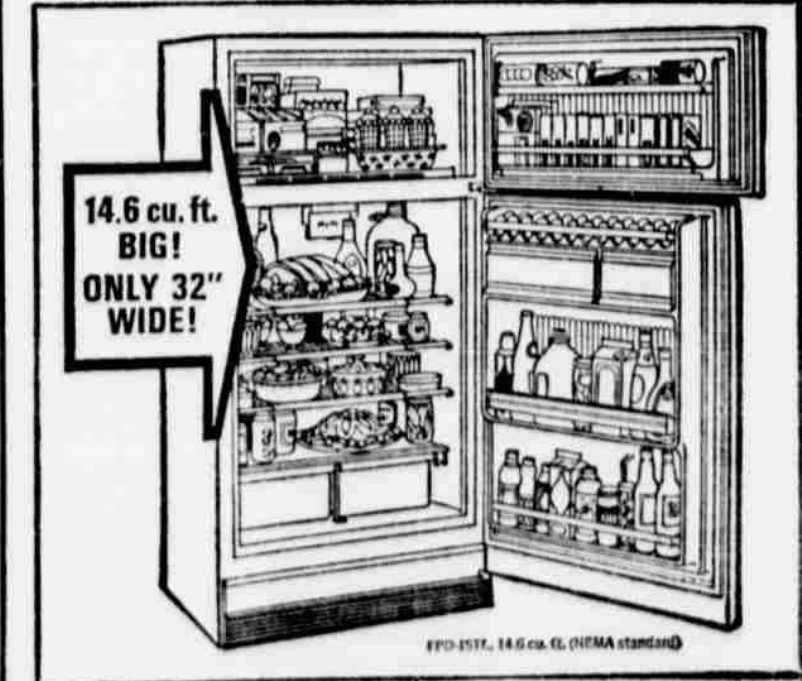

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Progress Report On The Great Plains Conservation Program

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been in operation for nearly ten years now. In fact, the first GPCP contract in Texas and Haskell County was signed in December, 1957. We will sign the 10,000th contract in Texas sometime between now and Dec. 1, 1967, according to J. C. Yeary, Jr., Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Haskell. As of June 1, 1967, Texas had 1,337 contracts since July 1, 1966, covering 1,150,456 acres and obligating \$5,902,579.85. Haskell County signed 31 contracts covering 15,628 acres and obligating \$176,797.

Joe B. King of Munday, Tiffen R. Mayfield, Clyde Mayfield and Walter Bredthauer of Weinstadt, Mrs. A. Penick and E. C. Smith and Jack Kittley of Rule, Brooke Early of Abilene, J. C. Coleman of Stamford and A. H. Becker, Allen Overton, Virgil Sonnemaker, C. A. Wheeler and Chas. E. Swinson, C. G. Burson, Jr., Raymond Burson, Chas. M. Conner, Fred Buerger, R. G. Foote, C. G. Burson, Sr. and Melvin Norman, Willie W. Buerger, Clois Thomas, H. K. Henry, Dale Middlebrook, Leon Burson, Thurman Bynum, R. A. Lane, R. V. and Bob Earles, W. J. Earles, M. F. Wheatley and V. P. Terrell, of Haskell are among those Haskell County farmers that signed GPCP contracts this past year. Predominately these farmers have scheduled installation of Parallel Terraces and Grassed Waterways in their contracts. Over 714,000 feet of parallel terraces were installed the past fiscal year. We are now spending 28 per cent of their money, statewide, on terraces, diversions and grassed waterways.

Interest in the GPCP is still high, and contracts are still being written, according to Yeary. "Several contracts written last year have been carried over to this fiscal year for obligation of funds. This will reduce the amount of funds that we will have to obligate this year. We also have 21 applications for assistance awaiting planning and contract preparation," said Yeary. Yeary pointed out that if interested in securing assistance under the GPCP, applications should be made now, and contracts developed now. Waiting until you are ready to apply conservation after maize and cotton harvest could result in assistance being delayed at least a year, and maybe 18 months. At the present, Yeary stated, the Soil Conservation Service Technicians are several weeks behind in application of practices scheduled to be done this summer. If you are planning to secure assistance through the Great Plains Program, see your SCS Technician now instead of wait-

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Keep Your Sights On Safety

(By J. C. Yeary, Jr., Work Unit Conservationist
Soil Conservation Service, Haskell, Texas)

July 23 through July 29 has been proclaimed by President Lyndon B. Johnson as National Farm Safety Week. In his proclamation, President Johnson stated, "... Whatever diminishes or impedes the efficiency and productivity of our farmers is detrimental to men and women everywhere. This waste of human and economic resources, along with the tragic physical and psychological damage suffered by farm men, women and children, should prompt us to regard the rural accident problem a matter of national concern."

All agencies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture with offices in Haskell County join in urging not just the farm people, but all people, to "keep your sights on safety."

During this season of the year, and especially from now until school starts again this fall, people by the thousands will be flooding the countryside to escape the searing heat of the city. The highways will be extremely over-crowded, and death will run rampant. Every precaution must be exercised by farm people entering or leaving our major highways. Make doubly sure that you have "clear sailing" prior to pulling onto the highway from country roads. Be sure to signal your intentions well in advance before leaving the highway. Do not, and I repeat, do not drive tractors and equipment on the highways unless there is no other route to use. Then stay as far as possible to the side, preferably on the shoulders or in the bar ditches.

Another point to consider is that of swimming. Two drownings have already occurred this season in Haskell County. Let us keep this figure at "TWO." If you have a farm pond which can be used for swimming, make sure there is sufficient life-saving measures such as large rubber tubes, long poles and/or life preservers available. Take precautions, and go to the expense to provide these items. The life saved is far more valuable than the cost involved. Prohibit swimming in your farm pond unless such items are available at the pond site, unless someone will assume responsibility, and the pond is known to be free from snakes, underwater snags and the like.

Accidents Can Be Prevented

A decent harvest was anything but certain for the old time farmer. He was at the mercy of not only the weather but also pests, disease and soil erosion. Though he did his best, he could only wait and hope.

Times have changed. The modern American farmer employs good management, horsepower, fertilizer, chemicals, "can do" crop and livestock varieties, efficient drainage and irrigation systems. Little is left to chance or luck.

When it comes to safety, however, many farmers are still back in the dark ages. They trust to luck and don't plan ahead to prevent accidents. Each year, as a consequence, 8,000 farm people die, an additional 750,000 are injured and more than \$2 billion is lost.

Farm accidents can be prevented ... by farmers themselves. The same concepts you use to assure a successful harvest will work in accident prevention: Good planning, good practices and leaving as little as possible to luck.

Reverend Billy Graham Endorses War On Poverty

Americans have a "moral and spiritual responsibility" to attack the problem of poverty, the Reverend Billy Graham told members of Congress and business leaders at a luncheon on Capitol Hill, recently.

Graham strongly commended the programs of the Office of Economic Opportunity, and said ... "For the first time in 17 years, I have come to Washington to express my support for a government program." He described the OEO and its goal, adding: "I believe in it."

Graham addressed a bipartisan audience of 104 Congressmen and 48 business leaders who are members of OEO's Community Action Committee of the Business Leadership Advisory Council. He told them the poverty program should not "be involved in partisan politics."

Graham said that at one time he had not been sympathetic to the anti-poverty program ... "Now," he said, "I am a convert."

He said early administration problems "have been ironed out." He added: "My beliefs are based now on first-hand knowledge ... and one of the things that impressed me with what the Office of Economic Opportunity is doing is that their programs are not give-away programs ... they are giving people an opportunity."

Graham said he had found 175 references from the Scriptures teaching us that "we have a responsibility as a Church, as a society, and as a people, to the poor."

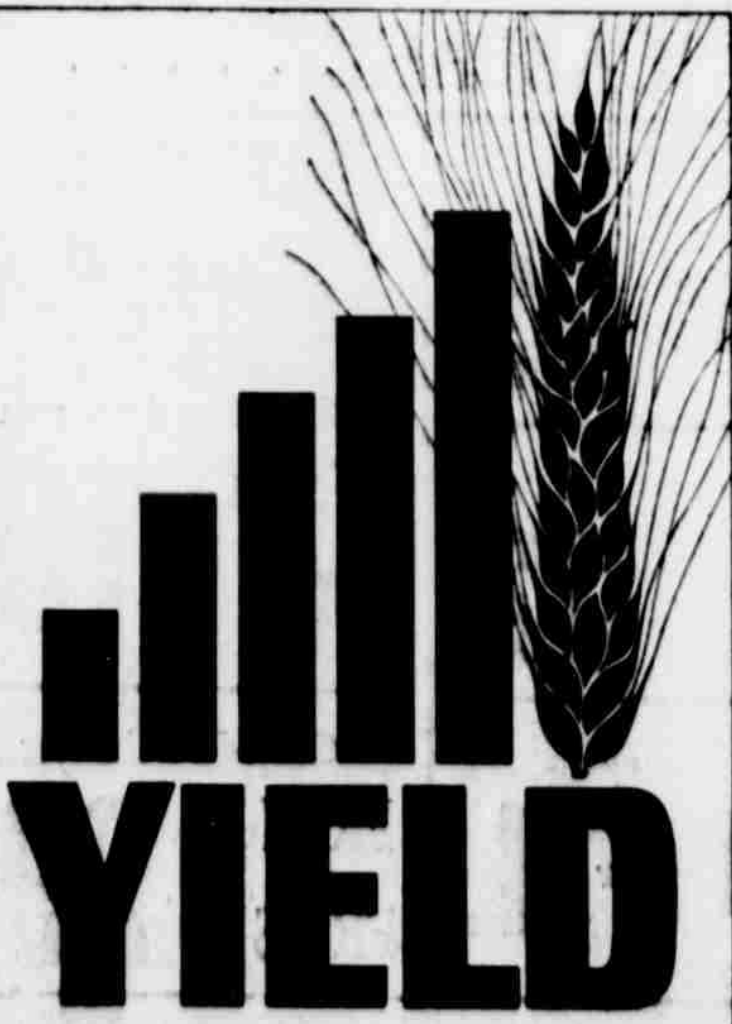
