61-Lot Addition At Burk Recorded

A 61-Lot addition to Burkburnett was officially recorded at Wichita Falls Tuesday when A. R. Hill submitted the plat to the office of the county clerk.

The property in the addition, a total of 20.56 acres, was recorded in a deed filed from D. D. Vaughn to Hill and is located in the E. Lewis Survey, extending west off South Avenue D in Burkburnett.

The addition includes five plotted blocks ranging from 80 to 100 feet wide and 94 to 135 feet deep with the exception of two oversized lots whose depths are 200 feet.

Clean-up Last Friday Morning A Definite Success

Chairmen Frank Kelley and Roy Magers announce the clean-up last Friday morning a definite success.

Through the cooperation of practically every merchant in Burkburnett, the truck owners and individuals, there was a fast and efficient cleaning of trash and tin cans the past Friday morning when the clean up gang assembled at 7:00 A. M. at Mills and Fleming elevator yard to start their task. Through the efforts of some 66 men and 22 trucks there was some 80 to 90 loads of rubbish removed from the streets and alleys of our city. Through the owners of these trucks, with the time given by those men who were willing to cooperate in this project, there was a grand cleaning job done, removing a lot of disease bearing trash. Due to the large amount of work to be done the "clean-up" was not as complete as it was hoped that it could be. Let every citizen of Burkburnett pledge himself that the job will not be so large next year, by adopting a program of weekly removal of trash from their property.

Once this program is in effect we will have a clean town every week in the year and not just once each year. The city has purchased some new equipment and has a weekly pickup schedule. The cost of this service being only one dollar per month.

The committee wishes to thank the truck owners, the merchants and each individual who made this success possible by their efforts. We want to thank the citizens of our colored addition for their splendid help. Many of them turned out with a lot of fine labor. Everyone was out on time and the work went forward in a splendid manner. This was just another example of what a community can do with a spirit of cooperation.

TWO CENTS IS LEFT

When a store sells you something for one dollar, the article you bought cost the merchant 61 cents, on the average.

That leaves 39 cents to be accounted for. And a good many people may believe that this sum is largely profit.

If that were true, merchandising would certainly be a gold mine—but it isn't! The 39 cents is called markup, which simply means the difference between the price a retailer pays for merchandise and the price at which he offers it for sale. All the expenses connected with operating the store must come out of the markup. These include payroll costs (which accounts for half of the total markup), rent, utilities, supplies, advertising and displays, insurance, special services such as deliveries and alterations—and, of course, taxes. Markup must also take care of markdowns—which are reductions from the original price at which the merchandise was offered, made necessary by competitive conditions, damage, or consumer refusal to buy at the regular figure.

How much of that markup, then, sticks in the merchant's pockets in the form of profit? The answer, based on exhaustive factual surveys covering stores of all sizes and types, is 1.9 cents. In other words, less than two little pennies out of each dollar of sales is left to the retailer, stockholders or investors after all the bills are met. That is certainly modest wage to pay for the essential job retailing does on our behalf.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

PHOENIX, ARIZ., SPARK AND FLAME: "Utility services continue to be economical, despite the upward price curves of other items in the family budget."

SOMERVILLE, MASS., JOURNAL: "The cost of living can be kept from reaching ruinous heights only if we increase our productivity, siphon off surplus dollars, and help stop 'wage-price leap frog.'"

FORT PIERCE, FLA., NEWS-TRIBUNE: "The government clearly is responsible for the present messy steel situation. They have bungled from the start, with a policy for wage increases and against price increases... which doesn't even make primer common-sense."

APOLLO, PA., NEWS-RECORD: "One of the freedoms so ardently pressed by the new deal advocates was freedom from fear. Now that little gimmick was devised in the first place to pave the way for the alleged 'welfare state' envisioned by the master minds in Washington... This nation was founded on the theory that every man would do his part, without the necessity of an overlord to direct his destiny from the cradle to the grave, whether that overlord be an autocratic king, a dictator or a paternalistic government."

WEATHERLY, PA., HERALD: "When the government undertakes to provide a living for any person or a group of people, the cost of that living must come out of the work and the earnings of other people. And that sort of living cost comes high for the people who foot the bill thru taxation."

MOVING OUR OIL

An executive of an Oklahoma oil company, recently made an address on the development of transportation by the petroleum industry. He told a story of progress which has resulted in an invaluable contribution to the national welfare. Oil has made and is making the most efficient and economical use of every form of transportation—the pipe line, the motor truck, the railroad tank car, the barge and the seagoing tanker. Thus our insatiable appetite for oil products of a thousand kinds is met, without delays, shortages, or inconvenience.

Very naturally, the oil industry is vitally concerned with transportation laws and regulations. On this crucial subject, he said, "We realize that something should

be done to remove the onerous burden of excessive regulation of the railroads and some other common carriers. It is my view, as a student of transportation, that all that is needed in the way of Federal regulation today are provisions for fair, reasonable and nondiscriminatory rates, car service, and safety measures... Under such enlightened and limited common carrier service would prosper and expand and this country could be fortified with adequate and economic transportation to meet its ever-expanding needs in time of peace and in time of war."

This illustrates how the consumers of oil, like the consumers of almost everything else, have a compelling interest in sound regulatory policies. In an integrated economy such as ours, anything that affects one basic enterprise affects all others.

VOTE, In Every Election

For the third consecutive year, a national association of retailers has organized a "Get Out The Vote Committee" to encourage greater use of the ballot at all elections primaries as well as general. Various organizations, including the American Farm Bureau Federation, are working in close cooperation. Leading newspapers, the New York Times and the Herald-Tribune among them, have praised the committee's work and objectives. Retail groups of all kinds, including chain store councils, are particularly active.

Here is a campaign which deserves everyone's support. It is entirely non-partisan—the committee is not interested in whom you vote for, but it is vitally concerned that you exert your right of franchise. It is a shameful commentary on America that, in many elections, substantially less than half of those eligible to vote take the trouble to go to the polling places. And when this happens, we have government by a minority.

It is fitting that retailing should take the lead in the get-out-the-vote drive. Most retailers are enthusiastic participants in all manner of activities designed to make America a stronger nation, and a better place to live in. And retailers, in the day-by-day conduct of their business, come into direct contact with tens of millions of our citizens. It is the plain duty of every one of those citizens to make his views known through the ballot. There is no greater privilege—and there is no greater responsibility. VOTE!

Here's Duke's prize-winning frosting recipe:

Schools Compete With Industries For Teachers

The pressing need of public schools to compete with fast growing industries in Texas in securing competent teaching personnel was explained by Joe B. McNeil to members of the District VII Oilbelt Teachers executive committee in Haskell recently.

McNeil, superintendent of Wichita Falls Public Schools and District VII representative to the Texas State Teachers Association executive committee, pointed out that the laymen of the district are entitled to know the crisis which faces the local school boards in securing "top grade" men and women for the teaching profession.

He recommended that superintendents throughout the district schedule a meeting for school patrons and discuss the problem. McNeil also emphasized the importance of gaining the support of candidates who are seeking legislative offices. He suggested that meetings be held in all schools and that teachers be reminded that the need is more for the profession than a personal one.

Superintendent McNeil reported that T. S. T. A. legislative agenda would include the following: (1) a minimum salary to meet a base pay of \$3,000, (2) improvement of teacher retirement benefits, (3) recodification of school laws, and (4) certification only if teachers can agree on professional standards.

Executive committee members present for the meeting were Laura Sheridan of Sweetwater, president; I. C. Evans of Burkburnett, vice-president; J. W. Hamilton of Seymour, secretary; Johnnie Mae Long of Wichita Falls, treasurer; Frank Eitter of Abilene, state executive committee member; A. E. Wells of Abilene and Ralph Davis of Burkburnett, committeemen at

large; Ben Brock, publicity chairman; and McNeil. Guests were S. H. Vaughter, superintendent of Haskell Public Schools; C. W. Tarter, superintendent of Sweetwater Public Schools and P. F. Shores, Wichita Falls teacher.

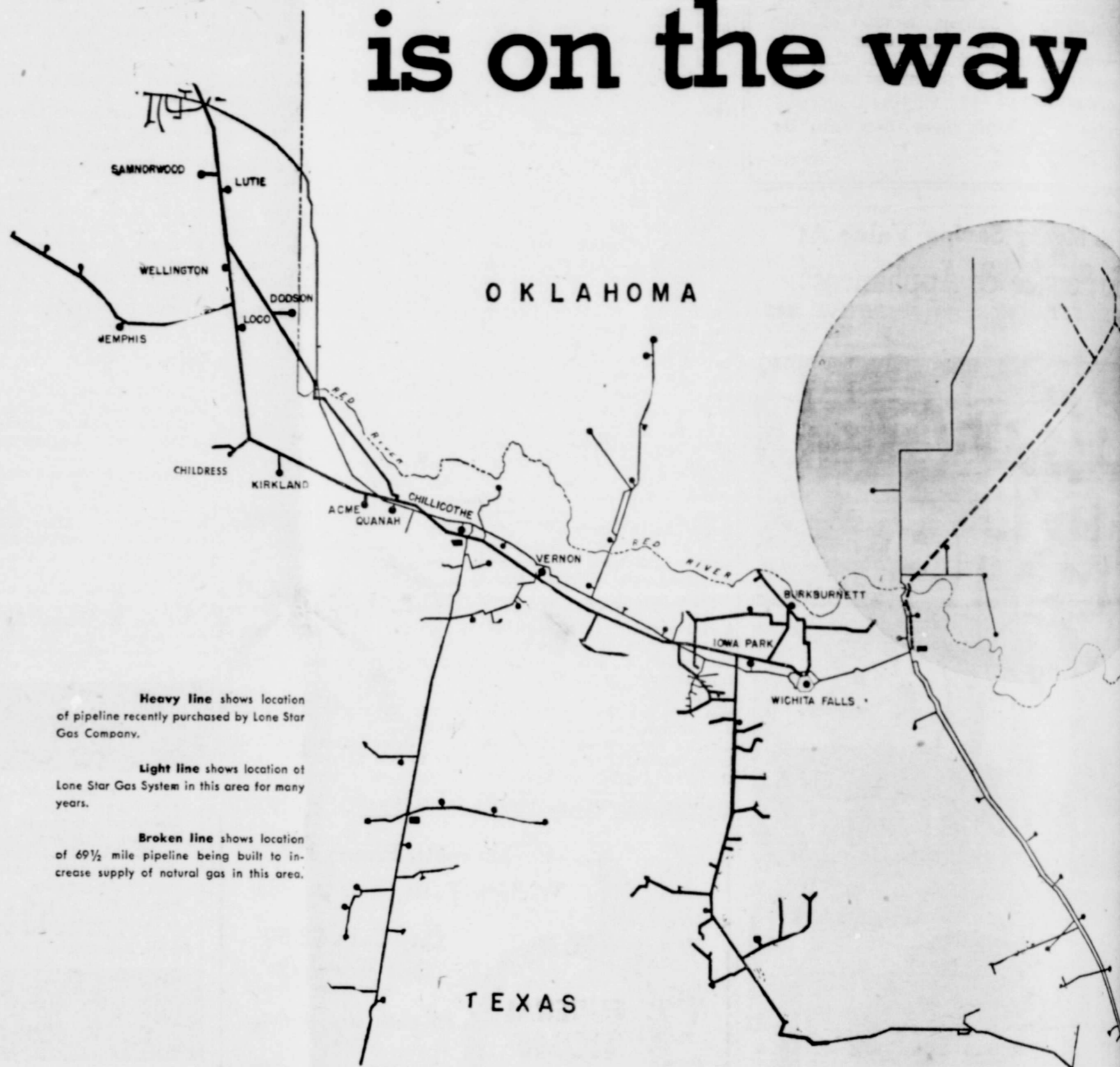

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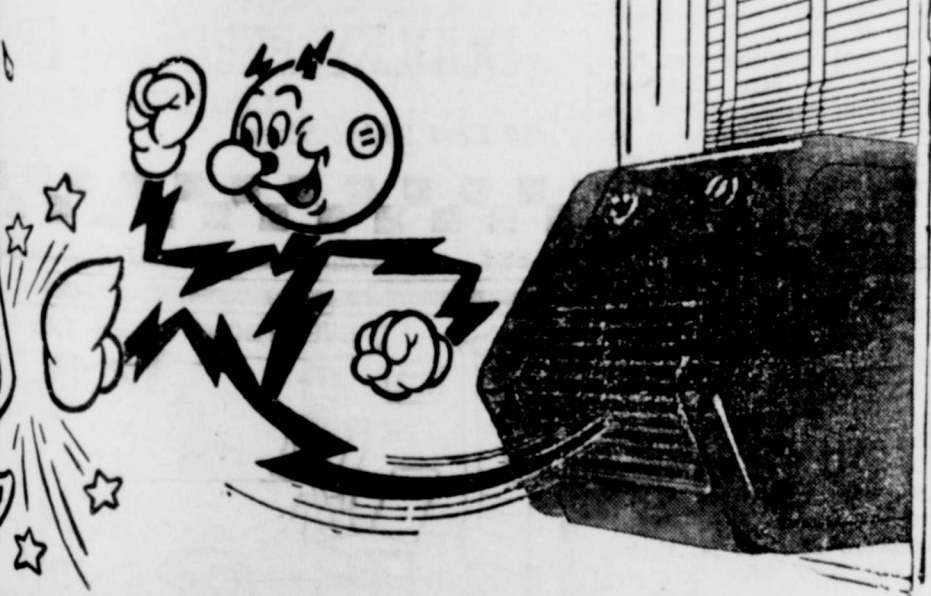
