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ONE VOTE IS IMPORTANT

"Our forefathers fought for the right to vote—but do we care much for that right today?" wrote Hugh Forster, chairman, Civic Committee, Lancaster, Pa. "Apparently we don't."

Mr. Forster then cited some facts which should make America ashamed of itself. In a recent election, 90 per cent of Belgium's eligible voters went to the polls. Almost as many eligible Italian voters cast ballots in the election that rebuffed Communism, and 82 per cent voted in the last British election. Other nations have comparable records. But only 51 per cent of eligible Americans voted in the Presidential election of 1948.

It's an easy alibi to say that just one vote doesn't matter, so why take the trouble to visit the polls. The fact is that one vote can be overwhelmingly important. Mr. Forster described cases where a very small number of votes made history. As an example, in 1884 James Blaine lost New York State by much less than one vote per precinct. Had he carried New York he would have defeated Cleveland and become President.

Such exceptional cases to one side, every American freedom rides solidly on the right of franchise. The secret ballot is the greatest defense against tyranny ever devised in the tangled history of mankind. No one who fails to vote can call himself a good citizen. He is, instead, a shirker of the worst possible kind.

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER

A formal request for a law to make espionage punishable by death, or imprisonment for life, in peacetime or wartime, has been submitted to Congress by the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Advance warning of this demand was contained in the 1951 annual report of the Committee, submitted last December. The report, entitled "The Shameful Years," covered the Committee's thirteen year investigation of communism as well as specific recommendations for laws to control subversion . . . the infiltration of reds and pinkos into the movie industry, education and labor unions. Hollywood, the report stated, had showered down more than a million dollars in financial support, and the 300 movie industry converts had "done fairly well" in slanting America's film diet to the pinko point of view. It voiced a stern warning to the television industry against similar infiltration.

We do not believe that many Americans will blanch at the thought of executing those who would destroy us . . . especially when it is remembered that many wartime spies were saved by the statute of limitations, which

would no longer apply under the new law. And certainly, these days, the term "peacetime" is a thin technicality and will remain so as long as communism holds half the world in bondage, and gnaws at the roots of the remaining free countries.

Jerry Jack Miller Made Ensign At Newport, R. I.

Among the 550 men awarded ensigns' commissions May 23rd from the Navy's only Officer Candidate School in Newport, R. I., was Jerry Jack Miller, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry W. Miller of 700 Magnolia St., and husband of the former Miss Arnela Muller, all of Burkburnett, Texas.

Ensign Miller was graduated from North Texas State College, Denton, in 1950 with a bachelor of science degree.

Established in June 1951 to provide junior officers for the expanding fleets and to relieve

reserve officers ordered to active duty since the outbreak of Korean hostilities, the school's original enrollment of 500 will swell to 2100 by October. It is currently graduating more new officers than the Naval college NROTC programs combined.

During four months' training, the candidates, all college graduates, undergo intensive training in the basic sea-going skills: gunnery, seamanship, navigation, engineering, damage control and communications. They cover the same ground in 16 weeks that the NROTC students do in four years.

Rules and Regulations For Burkburnett Youth Center

1. There will be no smoking in the building.
2. There will be no gambling on the premises.
3. There will be no drinking on the premises.
4. No one under the influence of liquor will be permitted in the Center.
5. There will be no unruly conduct.
6. The Center shall be open Thursday and Friday evenings, Saturday afternoon and evening, and Sunday afternoon.
7. Adult visitors are welcome at any time to be shown around for a brief time, but are not permitted to remain in the Center unless they have come to work in the stand. Not more than two adults shall work at one time in the stand.
8. Penalty for breaking the rules can be temporary expulsion or permanent suspension of membership. Charges can be brought by the supervisor and acted upon by the Board of Directors.
9. Each member of the Center shall be responsible for any damage he or she does to the building or property within the building during Center sessions.
10. Each member will be allowed guests who are within the age limit, 12 to 18 years, or sixth to twelfth grades, but that member is responsible for the conduct of his guest and shall pay ten cents fee for the guest.
11. During the nights that the Junior and Senior High School members are at the Center together there shall be no bullying around of the smaller boys and girls by the larger ones.
12. The Ex-graduates of B. H. S. that are under 21 years of age will be permitted to attend as a guest of a member of the Center.

The Student Board made these rules with the approval of the Adult Board.

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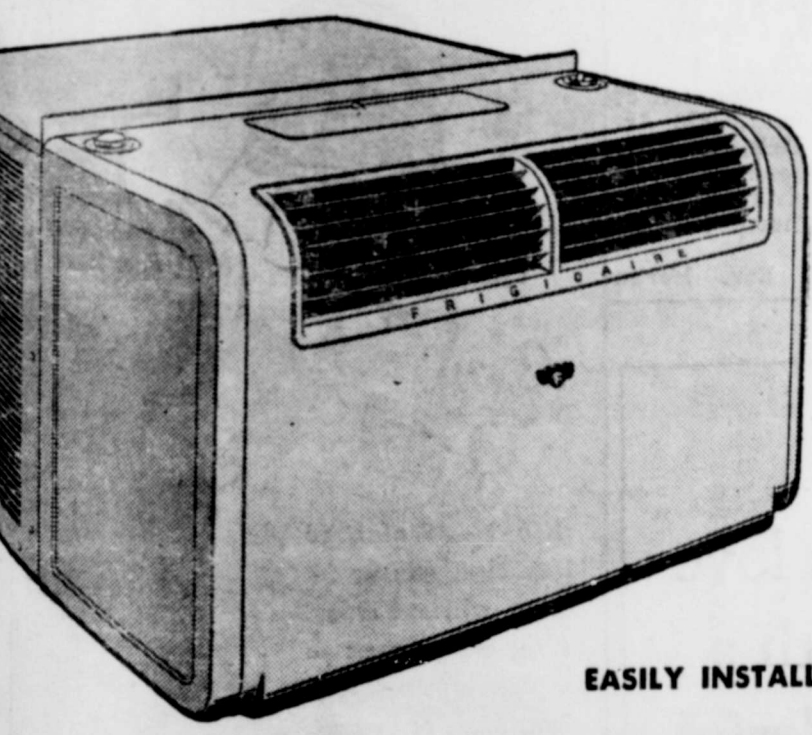
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DEVOL NEWS

Check Held Over Poison to See If It Is Still Good

(Information released by J. W. Bradley, County Agent of Wichita County and George Davis, Extension Entomologist).

Many people that have cotton poisons left over from last year have been wondering whether it was still good to use or not. If you are one of these, here are some tips on how you can check your poison to see whether it is still good or not.

The main way in which a poison may go bad is that it will no longer mix properly with water; however, occasionally the insecticide will also settle out of the solvent in the form of a tarry substance on the bottom of the barrel. To fully understand how these things might happen it is well to have a little understanding of just what our liquid poisons consist of and how these constituents work.

Liquid poisons are composed of three main elements. These are, one or more solvents, and an emulsifier. Naturally the insecticide is the part that does the killing; however, most of these materials are insoluble in water and need a carrier. Oil solvents are used as a carrier since these insecticides are soluble in most oils. The next drawback is, that the oils will not mix evenly with water by themselves, so an emulsifier is added which makes this poison laden oil mix readily with water.

When the finished product will not mix with water, either not enough emulsifier was used or something has happened to it. This will cause the oil, which contains the insecticide, to stick to the spray equipment and be unevenly mixed with the water. A condition of this kind will cause a spotty kill of insects and possibly damage the cotton by burning the leaves because of the high concentration of oil.

The conditions under which poison may go bad are controlled almost entirely by the manufacturer; therefore, most any good reliable firm is willing and even anxious to make bad poison good.

There are a few simple steps to use to determine whether your poison is still good or not:

1. Take a stick and scrape across the bottom of the container to see if a tarry substance has collected there. If it has, the insecticide has settled out and it should not be used.
2. Get a glass container that you can see through and fill about half full of water.
3. Pour a teaspoon or two of poison into the water. You should have about 10 times as much water as you do poison. If white cloudiness forms in the

water as the poison sinks it is a good sign as that indicates that the oil is mixing with the water.

4. Stir or shake the contents of the container well. The water should then become milky white with no black oily layer on the sides or bottom.

5. Allow to stand for about a minute after shaking. If all or part of the oil will not mix with the water and stay in solution this long this poison should not be used.

6. After standing a while a heavy milky layer will settle to the bottom. This is called cream and is expected, but will remix easily.

A few minutes spent checking your poison now may save you a lot of worry and grief later.
