Home Economist For Lone Star Gas Company

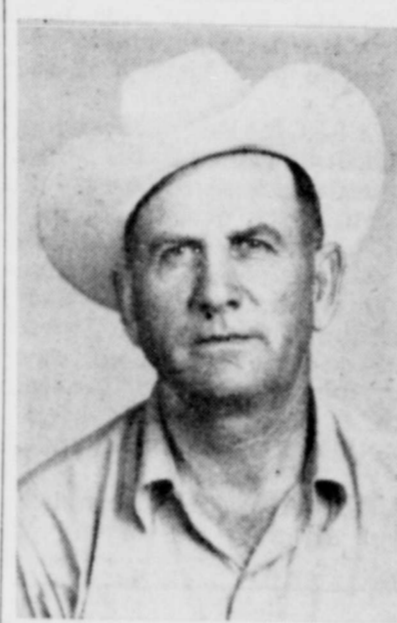

Top price at the Burk Livestock Sales Barn last Saturday was \$35.00 per hundred paid for nice calves. Troy Thompson of Altus, Oklahoma, was the seller, and Paul Pearson was the buyer.

Top hogs brought \$20.10 per hundred lbs. Roy Williams of Randlett, Oklahoma, was the seller, and Darrel Shelton of Vernon was the buyer.

C. B. Bowles and Joe McCluskey of Randlett, Oklahoma sold the top cow at \$19.60, to W. S. White.

Mr. White also bought a heavy bull for \$23.50 per hundred (wt. 1220) from Otis Green of Randlett, Oklahoma.

At a private sale, Ace Reid sold 20 head of high quality White face registered yearlings to Ernest Cornelius of Thornberry, Texas, for \$32.50 per 100 weight. They averaged 464 lbs. per head.

Rodeo Planning Dominates C-C Meeting Monday

Plans for the approaching Rodeo, June 23-26, dominated the business session of Chamber of Commerce members last Monday noon when they met at Town Hall for the regular business luncheon.

Rodeo chairman Buster Morgan reported the new rodeo arena, and stadium would be ready for the opening performance, although lots of work is to be done to bring the project to completion. Work yet to be done includes finishing up the stock pens, painting the chutes, stretching part of the wire to enclose the arena, and painting about half of the seats and footboards.

This year, water for the concession stands and also the livestock, will be hauled out in tank trucks. By next year it is hoped a pipeline can be laid and City water made available.

Temporary rest rooms will be put up this week. By next Rodeo time, permanent, concrete block structures will be ready.

Old Timer Wants To Know Rodeo Dates In Burk

The Burkburnett Star Dear Editor:

I would like to know when Burkburnett has its old settlers reunion, please. I would enjoy coming down and seeing the ones who were there years ago. My mother and father say they would like to meet old friends. My father, Mr. W. J. Sides, who is 81 years old, built the 5th dwelling house there. I can remember so many things. The very first grocery store I remember was owned by a man named Mr. Walkup. And what sidewalks they had were boards. I have been away since 1922, and the folks left about 1924. One thing that is causing me to write this letter, a fellow by the name of Mr. Fleming is building a cotton gin about 3 miles east of us, and seeing Burkburnett on his truck brought back old memories.

I remember the first car I ever saw. A Mr. Wiggins owned it. And when school was out we had a picnic down at the river bridge, and coming back to town the car would get stuck in the sand and he had no trouble getting children to push it out, for the ones who pushed it out would get to ride about 2 blocks and another bunch of kids would push and of course it would be their turn to ride. My, what great times we would have going fishing at Red River. We kids might be in the cotton field working and here would come two or three families going fishing. So we would beg Daddy to go too, so we would all go. The men would seine for fish and we kids would hold on to the seine when the men folks run into a deep hole. The women folks would sometimes send us to a spring to get water. They always caught more fish than we could eat, so they would divide the fish left. They would blindfold a man, pile the fish in stacks. The blindfolded man would call out a name for each stack of fish.

I can remember when we crossed the river in a wagon and had to watch out for quick sand. When the river was up, we had to cross on the railroad bridge. I guess I could just go on and on writing of the memories that crowd my mind. I wish to thank you for any information you can give me in regard to the reunion. Seems like every town around here is having them now.

Ceiling Prices Off White Potatoes

The Office of Price Stabilization announced last week that the regulations governing the sale of white potatoes at all levels of distribution have been revoked. The action was taken, said OPS, as a result of the vote in the United States Senate to discontinue controls of fresh fruits and vegetables.

In announcing the decontrol action, Ellis H. Boyd, district OPS Director in Fort Worth, said that the Senate vote had made effective enforcement of the present regulations virtually impossible. Boyd stated that honest operators would be penalized by violations which might follow the Senate action.

Grass On Vacant Lots Is Hazard For Neighbors

People owning vacant lots in Burkburnett, are in many cases, working a distinct hardship on home owners of adjoining property, by permitting grass and weeds to grow rampant on the vacant lots.

Home owners take pride in the appearance of their yards, but the job of keeping them neat and free from Johnson grass is made very difficult if a vacant lot next door has grass (two or three feet high). Aside from the extra work involved on the part of the home owner, he is faced with a health hazard presented by mosquitos and other insects which find favorable breeding conditions in tall grass and weeds.

In most instances, owners of vacant lots have not realized their neglect was causing someone else inconveniences, and in lots of instances, hardships. If vacant lot owners will see that the lots are kept mowed or plowed, they will have the undying gratitude of neighbors living on adjoining property.

FULL PARTNERS

The head of one of our principal oil companies recently said that American oil operations in foreign lands "have greatly benefited both foreign producer and consumer countries and have gained a lot of good will for the United States."

Today American oil companies have foreign investments valued at close to \$5 billion dollars. They share interests in proved crude oil reserves totaling some 35 billion barrels. They have built refinery capacity of almost 1,700,000 barrels a day. These enormously valuable assets are now one of the mainstays of the free world.

Moreover—despite the usual leftwing charges of "economic imperialism"—the oil companies involved definitely have not followed a policy of getting as much as possible out of the countries in which they operate and giving as little as possible in return. The huge Saudi Arabian oil operations, carried on by the Arabian American Oil Company, are a conspicuous example of the way they work. The government gets large royalties and taxes. Native people are employed at good wages. Towns have been modernized, and transportation and communication systems have been built. Ambitious agricultural projects are being carried on, along with trade school and education programs. Much money and effort has been given to the improvement of the public health. Local customs and traditions are scrupulously respected. The companies regard the countries with which they deal as full partners in a great enterprise, and act accordingly.

The foreign oil operations, in sum, have given us and our allies resources which are vital in peace or war—and they have brought new and far higher standards of living and working to once-primitive regions.

Public Relations In Public Interest

The Public Relations Society of America, Chicago Chapter, and the Medill School of Journalism, Northwestern University, recently sponsored a one-day institute on "Economic Education—or Economic Disaster." A number of distinguished authorities discussed primary economic problems of the day—including business' responsibility as a teacher of economic facts to workers and the public.

One of the speakers was Senator Brewster of Maine. In the course of his talk, he said, "I congratulate the Public Relations profession for recognizing the imperative need for economic education. I congratulate it for taking positive and intelligent action to rally public opinion behind those in Congress who seek to restore sanity and sound principles to the operation of government. The fact that the public at large knows as much as it does about the economic facts of life is due to very large part to the excellent work of public relations men and women, and to the support they are given by enlightened business and professional and other leaders."

"I am told that this Institute is predicated upon a feeling that the Public Relations profession, as the representative of business, industry and the professions, has a great obligation to the public welfare and the common good . . . I consider that the best example of public relations in the public interest I have seen."

Those who still argue that the interests of government, the business community, labor and other groups are basically incompatible suffer from delusions. The future of any group—labor, farmers, industry, and government itself will depend in large measure on the future of the others. If one sickens, the rest will sicken—if one is healthy, the rest will be healthy, hence the need for each to know more about the others problems.

COMMUNIST MEDICINE

In a recent editorial the Washington Post said, "In considering the various proposals before Congress to give government medicine to various segments of the population, we have to keep in mind where such laws lead . . . Our Federal planners are jumping the British stage and moving straight to Federally financed medicine, a la Russia."

The Post then described the experience of a doctor who worked in the Soviet Union for 17 years and is now in the United States. In the average Russian community, he said, patients have no choice of physician—a bureau controls all medical practice and people are assigned to a given clinic. The clinics are further divided into districts each of which has a doctor and a nurse who are supposed to serve 2,000 to 3,000 inhabitants. During his office hours, the doctor is able to give about five minutes to each patient, because of the crowd. On house calls he can spare about ten minutes. Hospitals are jammed. One result of this kind of political medical care is that the tuberculosis death rate in Russia is six times higher than in the United States.

You can say that conditions would be entirely different here, even under the Administration's compulsory

Federal health insurance scheme. But the fact is—and history has demonstrated it over and over again—that a little bit of socialism, a little bit of dictatorship, always leads to more and more. There's one thing the typical bureaucrat can't get enough of—and that is power over the people.

No major nation enjoys health standards as high as the United States. In none is better or more comprehensive medical care available to the masses of people. This is the achievement of free medicine working in a free country. Will we be blind enough to let the politicians force socialized medicine down our throats?

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

ST. LOUIS, MO., LABOR TRIBUNE: "The bona-fide labor paper champions the institution of private enterprise based on private property ownership, and only attacks the abuses in the system which tend to weaken and corrupt it. The good labor paper considers our economic and social system the best ever devised to maintain democratic institutions and give free play to individual opportunity, initiative and talent."

FLUSHING, OHIO, HOME NEWS RECORD: "We believe the trend of our government in recent years has been definitely toward socialism and we view this with alarm . . . the prospect of socialism is frightening. The reason for this is quite simple—the past history of the results of socialism."

BROWNSVILLE, PA., TELEGRAPH: "Freedom automatically entails responsibility. One of the chief marks of the slave is that he does not need to be responsible because he has lost his authority over his own actions. And when the freeman becomes irresponsible, he soon becomes a slave. Today the people of the United States are threatened by actual tyrannies from without and potential tyranny from within. But neither of these menaces so seriously threatens our liberty as our own irresponsibility. Whenever we subordinate the general welfare to self-interest (which is the essence of social irresponsibility) we weaken another stone in the foundation of our freedom."

FRANKLIN, IND., REPUBLICAN: "A government of law should be the friend of all men and enemy of none."



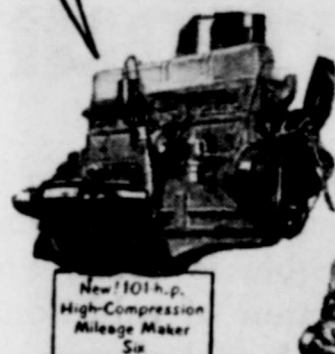

executive secretary of the association, said in making the announcement June 7th in Austin.

"The profession must be made more attractive and Texas faces a critical situation in its schools unless that can be accomplished, Tennyson declared.

The executive secretary of the 52,000 member teacher group which was a big factor in the school system revision campaign three years ago, also recently pointed out that more of the state tax dollar must be allocated to public schools for additional classrooms if children are to continue to get a good education.

"Despite an increase in the pay for teachers granted by the voters and legislature three years ago, the profession is not attractive to young people because the pay is less than the national average for all work-

ers," Tennyson pointed out.

The average salary for all Texas professional public school personnel is \$3,185, but that of the average classroom teacher is only \$2,980. The first year teacher who holds only a bachelor's degree gets \$2,403.

In comparison, the average for all employed people in the United States, including laborers, is \$3,390.

Tennyson presented figures to show that pay of teachers since World War II has not kept pace with that of other employed persons.

In 1939 teachers' salaries averaged \$1,420 and that of all employed persons, including laborers, was \$1,269. Teachers were 12 per cent above the average.

But this year Texas public school professional personnel averages \$3,185 and all employed people in the country, \$3,390. Thus the Texas group is 6 per cent under the national average for workers and the classroom teachers are 12 per cent below the national group.

Since 1939, Tennyson said, the average employed person has had an increase of 167 per cent in his pay, while the Texas teachers have had a 124 per cent hike. If teachers' salaries had increased as much as others, the present average would be up by \$615.

That is approximately what the TSTA will ask as a minimum salary increase.

Tennyson spotlighted the teachers' economic situation another way:

"The average classroom teacher's salary is \$2,980. The Federal government's consumer price index shows that the present dollars will buy only as much as 52 cents bought in 1935-39. Thus we find that the teacher has only \$1,550 in purchasing power

in 1935-39 dollars.

"We must make it more attractive for young people to study for the teaching profession. It takes four years of college work for them to qualify and our colleges are not turning out the 3,500 teachers we need to replace those who retire, die or abandon the profession each year. Let alone the 1,000 or more we will need yearly to take care of the some 37,500 increase in enrollment forecast annually through 1959-60.

"We should at least put the profession on the basis of equal pay with the average employed person in the United States, including laborers."
