Alma is the largest trailer manufacturing company in the United States.

Brookshear appointed Walter Riley, Alvin Hill, C. M. Archer and Geo. McClarty on a committee to work with Mr. Warren and try to work out the proposition.

This spraying work is done by equipment furnished by the City-County Health Unit, with the City furnishing the DDT. Burkburnett is a regular monthly contributor to the County Health Unit, and the spraying is one of the services rendered by the Unit.

The City has also tried to keep alleys and other places mowed where weeds and grass flourish. But, it takes some two weeks to cover the town, and by the time the city is covered, the first places mowed are ready for another trimming.

## Definition of Bureaucracy

"This anecdote in a recent sermon by the Rev. Kenneth W. Sollitt, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Mendota, Ill., caught our eye:

"I was once in a small hotel in Vermont when one of the guests, a foreigner unfamiliar with American ways, brought the proprietress of the inn a beautiful bouquet. The proprietress was delighted beyond words—until she discovered that her gallant guest had picked the flowers in her garden back of the inn.

"Whenever government hands you a bouquet, you can be perfectly sure it was picked out of your garden. But we go right on accepting bouquets in the vain hope that some day we will get flowers that somebody else planted and brought to bloom."

"And that is a precise definition of bureaucracy as we see it today."—St. Louis County Medical Bulletin.

## NOT SO SIMPLE

There's nothing very complicated about buying a steak. It's obtainable in various shapes and weights and types, and if you want one all you have to do is go to the butcher, select the cut you want, pay for it, and carry it away.

But to produce that steak, or any other kind of meat, is a complex business that calls for a great many diverse skills and resources.

First of all, most of our meat is raised West of the Mississippi while most of it is consumed East of that river. A very wide chasm must be bridged before livestock running on Western farms and ranges becomes meat-on-the-table in Eastern homes.

A great many people have their hands in the job of turning beef and other meat animals into cuts ready for oven and frying pan. These include the men who look after the cattle, the steelmakers who provide fencing and many other items, the lumbermen who cut the wood used in barns and corrals, the railroads and truck drivers who carry the animals to market, the bankers who finance production, the packers who process and distribute the meat, the retailers who sell it to you, and many, many more.

Incidentally, some fraction of the price you pay when you buy meat may represent money that came to you as a result of the operations of the meat industry because the task of supplying this vast nation with meat, if all its far-flung ramifications are taken into account, involves millions of people who benefit economically in direct or indirect fashion.

So while there's nothing complicated about buying a piece of meat, it's a complicated job to get it ready for you to buy when and where you want it.

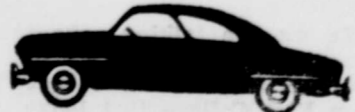
## They Were Wiser In 1788

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MANSFIELD, OHIO, NEWS-JOURNAL: "When discussion turns to 'high prices,' as it so frequently does, it is well to keep in mind the extent to which the tremendous total of Federal spending—and resultant excessive taxes—enters into the price situation. On a loaf of bread the variety of taxes is estimated to be 36 per cent of the price to the consumer, and for gasoline the tax runs to more than half of the retail price paid. It is the same story with telephone service, electric and gas utilities, and whatever you need for convenient and comfortable living, as it is only by such extortionate taxation that the billions of dollars can be provided for Federal government spending all over the world—and it appears that the end cannot be sighted."

MANNING, S. C., TIMES: "In our great country, vacation time reminds even stay-at-homes that they are free to roam at will over a vast area 1,600 sq 2, 800 miles in size. Here are no 'secret police' to demand registration cards—no spies to eavesdrop on our private conversations and file reports. Except for a few quarantine regulations to prevent the spread of plant disease, there are no formalities at state borders. The New Yorker is welcome in Washington state—the tourist from Maine meets a friendly reception in Florida. 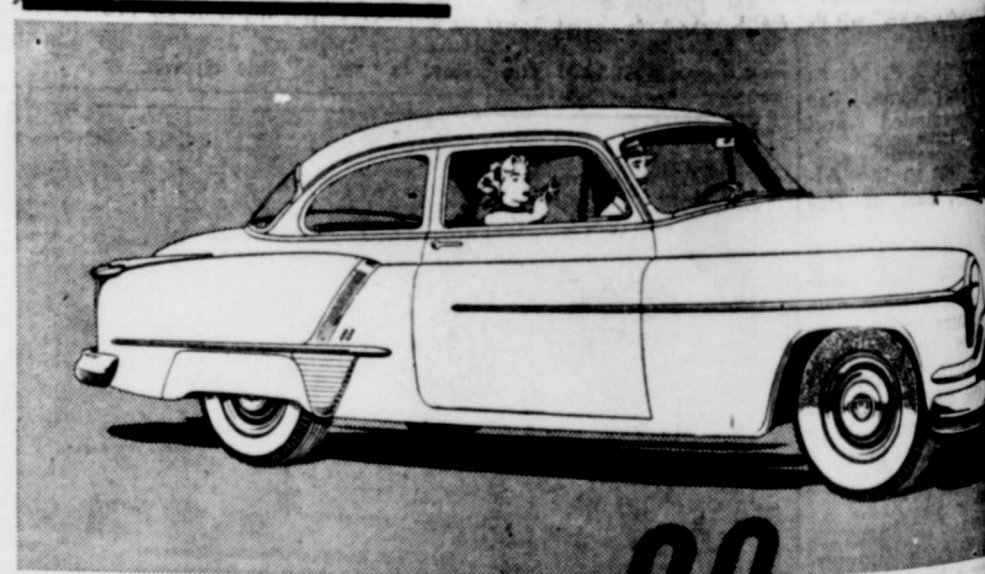

Hardwood Plywood Unique In Cross-Grain Construction

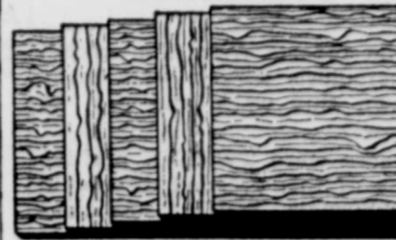
"Plywood" and "laminated wood" are not the same. To use the two terms interchangeably is an error.

Both plywood and laminated wood are made of several wood layers firmly glued together. In laminated wood, the grain of all layers runs in the same direction. But in plywood, the grain of each layer runs at a right angle to the grain of each adjacent layer.

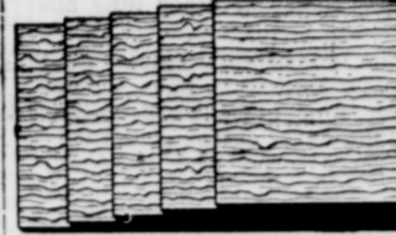
Laminated wood isn't seen very often. Its main uses are in wooden trusses and arches and in the manufacture of some sporting goods, such as skis and tennis rackets.

Hardwood plywood, on the other hand, is a widely used material. There probably is some hardwood plywood in nearly every living room in America.

Hardwood plywood with choice wood veneer as its outside layer is a mainstay in the manufacture of furniture, television and radio cabinets, wall paneling, and flush doors. It also is used extensively for pianos, harps, boats, airplanes, luggage, railway cars, truck bodies, and store fixtures.

In the entire county there were 184 cases revealed. Of these, 95 were proved to be positive cases, with 43 suspicious ones, 34 heart ailments and 12 other cases of lung diseases.

There undoubtedly were several of these cases made known to the person ailing for the first time and therefore proved the point that every one should have one of these films made at least once a year.
