Implicates Accomplice

Under questioning, Bishop, a 17 year old former football player at the Washington High School, Wichita Falls, implicated a 26 year old Burk Negro as being with him and taking part in the assault. The Negro was picked up and along with Bishop, was taken to Austin by Sheriff Ham Vance and Deputy Charlie Sells, for lie detector tests. The lie detector showed Bishop was lying and the other Negro was telling the truth in his denials of participation.

Mrs. Dalton was beaten with a length of 3-4 inch pipe. The pipe was left on a refrigerator in the store. Mrs. Dalton, who has regained consciousness for short intervals since being in the hospital, said she had about \$100 in the store. About \$25 in silver was left untouched in the cash register. So far \$38 in bills has been recovered from its hiding place at the dump yards.

Burk Woman Severely Beaten In Grocery Store Robbery

Robbery Intent of Assaulters

Marlin Wayne Bishop Held Under \$10,000 Bond

One of the most brutal attacks ever to occur in Burkburnett, happened last Saturday morning when Mrs. May Dalton was unmercifully beaten and her grocery store at 424 W. Main Street was robbed.

Mrs. Dalton is reported to be slowly improving at the Wichita General Hospital, but her condition is still very serious. Her injuries include a compound skull fracture, severe head cuts, fractures of both arms and a broken right hand.

Bishop is held in the Wichita County Jail under \$10,000 bond on charges of robbery by assault.

Big Man Hunt

According to best reports the attack occurred about 10:30 A. M. About 10:50 Mrs. Mark L. Lahm went to the grocery store and was met at the door by a Negro, whom she later identified as Bishop, who told her Mrs. Dalton was gone, the store was closed and he was cleaning it up.

At 11:00 o'clock Mrs. Dalton managed to work her way to the front porch of the store and called for help. The driver of a passing Hampton-Vaughn ambulance noticed her condition and brought her to the Burkburnett Clinic for preliminary examination, and then rushed her to the Wichita General Hospital.

When the report was spread approximately 50 men armed with shotguns and pistols started combing the area. Someone reported they had seen a Negro wearing a yellow shirt leaving the store just before 11:00. The hunt spread to the Negro section and the City dump grounds. In the meantime Chief of Police Willis Bartley called the County Sheriff's Department, and a number of deputies from there joined in the search. A number of Negroes were questioned at their homes by the local police and County sheriffs.

Bill Morris, with the local police, and Oscar Cantrell, a pumper, were sitting in Bill's pickup in the Negro section when they saw two Negroes running from the dump yards. They noticed one of them carrying an object behind his back. When he saw the men watching him from the pickup he threw the object in an old tin building. Morris called to the Negro to come to him, which he did. They asked him what he threw in the building and he said swimming trunks. When a search of the building was made, the men found a yellow shirt with small blood spatters across the front. Bishop, who had thrown the shirt in the building, and a brother of his, were brought to the City jail, and later removed to the County jail. The brother was released after extensive questioning by the County Sheriff's Dept.

Carl reports witnessing a Spanish bull fight, which to their party was quite repulsive.

At a later date they joined an escorted tour for sightseeing in England, Scotland, Holland, Belgium, parts of Germany, Switzerland, Italy and France. Visiting many places of historical interest and seeing many beautiful sights.

They report the highlights of the trip were: the shopping in Paris and the swimming in the beautiful Mediterranean for Kay.

Carl states that the meeting of the International Dental Congress which he attended in London will be a long remembered event for him. Members of the Dental profession were there from all countries of the world.

And for Mrs. Morrison, who is an ardent flower enthusiast, the flower auctions in Holland, the Kew gardens near London and the Black Forest in Germany will be a long cherished remembrance as well as the operas they attended in Paris.

For all three of them, the old Cathedrals, the beautiful stained glass windows, the profusion of flowers everywhere, the French cooking, and eating in out door Cafes and many, many other items and events will be recalled with pleasure many times over.

MORE CATTLE COMING

The American Meat Institute reports that consumers will have the largest supply of beef in our history in 1953, if producers continue to build up their cattle herds as they have during the first six months of this year.

The nation's cattle population is expected to increase by 4,000,000 or 5,000,000 head and to reach a total of as much as 93,000,000 by the time the curtain comes down on 1952. During the first half of this year there was an eight per cent cut in cow slaughter, as a direct result of the herd building program, yet producers were able to market about five per cent more cattle than during the comparable period last year by offering a larger volume of steers and heifers.

This is good news to a nation of hearty meat eaters. Our meat consumption has been tending upward and we eat much more of it, on a per capita basis, than any other nation with a minor exception or two, such as Australia. Even so, experts in nutrition believe that our consumption should be greater still. Science has proved that beef and the other meats contribute very greatly to our mental and physical health. They create strength and stamina. They are of major benefit in aiding recovery from a long list of diseases—including some for which meatless diets were once prescribed, until medical discoveries proved the fallacy of that.

From the viewpoint of farmer and rancher, meat is one of the most valuable of all crops. It's good to know that we'll have it in abundance.

TIME TO HOLLER

A recent editorial in the Portland, Oregon, Journal cited some facts that should make the weary, beaten taxpayers of the country sit up on their hind legs and holler.

There is a schoolteacher for every 132 people in Oregon—but there is a Federal civilian employee for each 85 persons.

Total government payrolls—Federal, state and local—came to \$1,895,000,000 last April alone. This was a rise of 16 per cent from the same month in 1951 and marked the biggest April-to-April jump on record.

In that month, the number of public employees, all supported out of Federal, state or local taxes, was just under 7,000,000.

The Journal said: "No wonder the taxpayer groans." He's going to groan a lot louder unless drastic action is taken to cut out government waste and extravagance in every department of government.

The demand for that must have its origin in the

Soil Conservation NEWS

John W. Wesley, P.M.A. employee and conservation District cooperater, grew and ginned the first bale of cotton in Wichita County. John is an example of a farmer obtaining increased yields from the use of alfalfa and winter peas in his rotation.

Kilpatrick, and Earl Denney, Jr. The following is a list of services available to district cooperators which they receive: first, an inventory of their land which shows the land capability classes.
