MAL-DE-MALIK

Jacob A. Malik, Russia's chief delegate, and long the sharpest thorn in the side of the UN, is going home. But don't cheer. Valenian Zorin, the man who put Czechoslovakia behind the iron curtain, will take his place. There is no reason to suspect any change in belligerency or obstructionism.

We have not been told why we are losing Jacob. He probably hasn't been told himself. Stalin may not consider his 333 batting average good enough. He failed to prevent the signing of the Japanese Peace Treaty. He failed to hang the germ warfare charge on the UN. He succeeded in initiating the Korean truce talks.

It has been said he has wanted to go home for some time because he has heart trouble. We can't imagine it's his own idea. Moscow is often hard on people's hearts. They've been known to stop—cold. Jacob is on the ladder, but we don't know which way he's going.

NEW BROOM

Ellis Arnall, the price stabilizer who was always positive and seldom right, has finally quit. Tighe E. Woods, the former rent controller, who has stepped into his shoes, intends to look before he leaps. After a month of studying his new job, he says, he will go out and hire halls around the country so he can talk to lots of housewives. If he finds out people don't want price controls, he'll ask the President to remove them.

Such an approach is doubtless against the rules. It makes too much sense. And it might even save us a lot of money.

Jet-Propelled Drawing Boards

The British are maintaining their traditional modesty about that jet bomber that flew across the Atlantic and back in a little over ten hours. "It wasn't so fast," they tell us. "Just wait till you see the new one we'll uncock next week." Meantime in Washington, a Senate Preparedness sub-committee says our military and civilian air-planners have "failed miserably."

OUT-OF-BOUNDS AGAIN

For the third straight time in as many years, The American Legion has gotten exactly nowhere with its resolutions demanding the firing of Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

The day after the 1952 convention adopted the resolution without opposition, and in which it stated "Our patience is exhausted", the Legion had its answer. President Truman, in his Thursday press conference tossed it aside as balderdash composed by some young boy. To make his position entirely clear, the President added that Dean Acheson was the best man in the country for the job.

Mr. Truman's devotion to his cronies is by now legendary. But the fierceness of his continual defense of Acheson is puzzling to mere observers unschooled in psychiatry. Acheson is no crony, no rough-and-tumble ward politician. Mr. Acheson is very polished, very elegant. He has had all the advantages. He knows instantly which fork, which pair of pants and which smile to use in any situation. He holds a honorary degree from Oxford University. 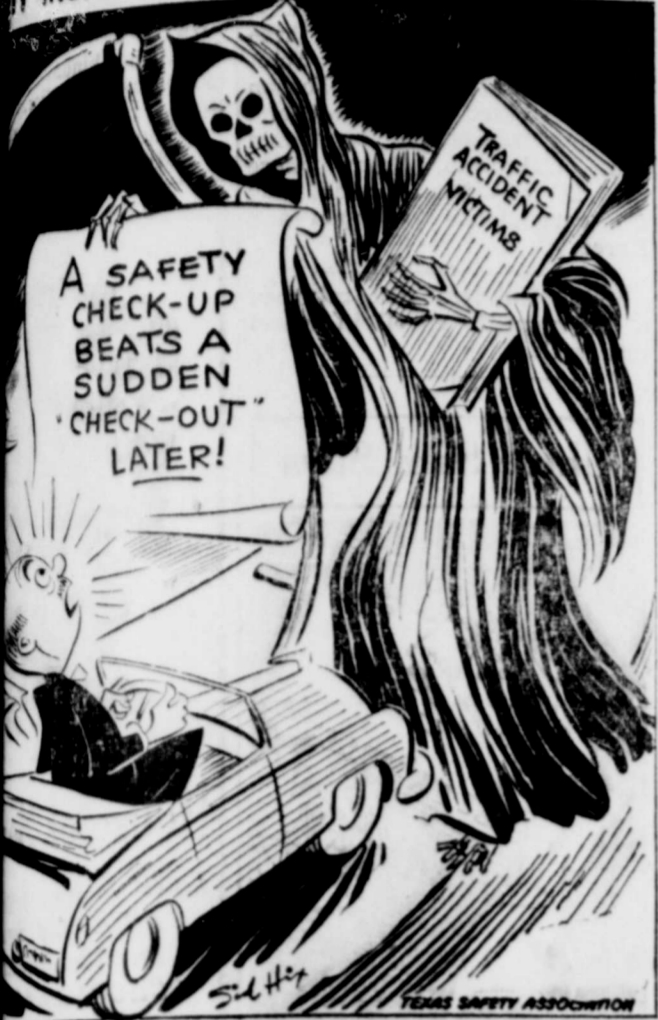

Necchi Company Sues Competitor, Gets Injunction

New York, N. Y.—Justice Eugene L. Brisach of the Supreme Court of the State of New York today issued a pendente lite injunction, charging unfair competition against Joseph Rosenthal and Nathan Weiss of Famous Brands Appliance Co., Inc., 390 Bridge Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., as a result of a suit brought against that company by the Necchi Sewing Machine Sales Corp., of 164 West 25th Street, New York. The local Necchi dealer is Boyd Bros.

The eight-point injunction restrains the Famous Brands Appliance Co., Inc., and all other defendants from using or referring to the name "Necchi" in any advertising matter, from selling or dealing directly or indirectly with the Necchi machines or products, from passing off imitation machines for genuine Necchi machines, from using the name "Necchi," "Necchi Sewing Circle," or the words "Authorized Necchi Dealer," from falsely branding the name Necchi on imitations of Necchi, and from trying to deceive the public with simulated Necchi products. Counsel for the plaintiff was Samuel B. Herbst or Herbst and Herbst, and counsel for the defendants was Samuel J. Stoll.
