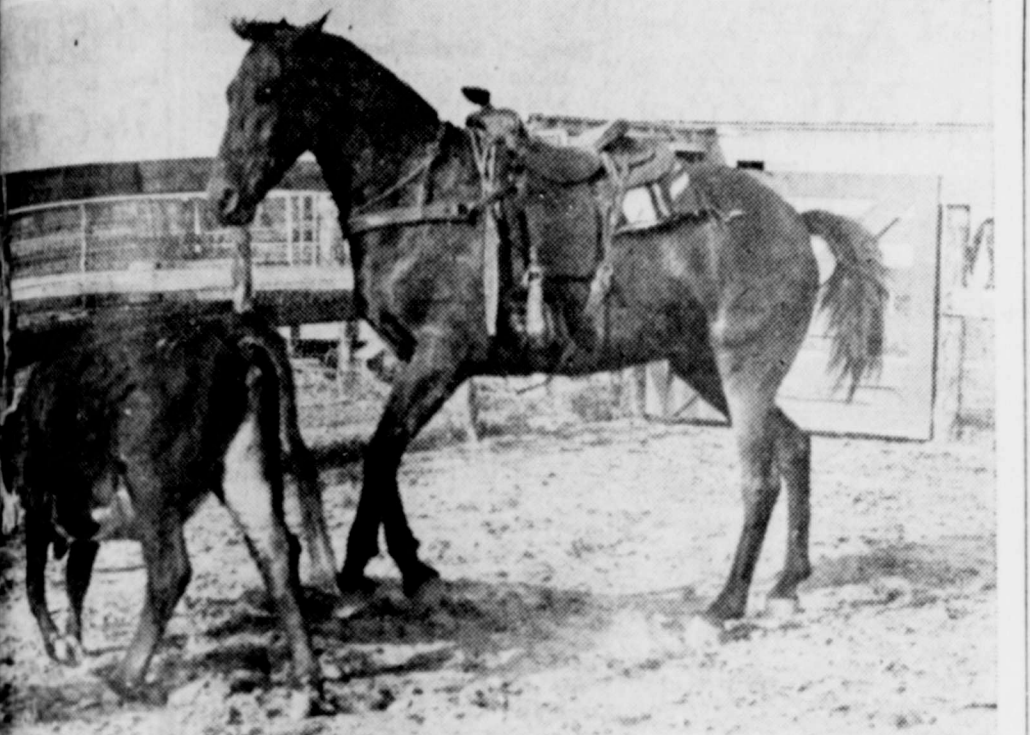

## HOW TO COOK MUSKRAT

The Saturday Evening Post has been running a series of brief articles, written by Sidney Shalett, showing how your tax money is wasted. A recent one dealt with "Uncle Sam's Book-of-the-Minute Club."

The government, it seems is in the book business on a colossal scale. Some 70,000 different books, pamphlets and periodicals are available from the Government Printing Office. Some are given away, and some are sold—usually at a below-cost figure.

One Senator has stated that Agriculture Department publications alone would make a stack 52 feet high. And, among the all-important subjects covered in this mass of literature are: "The Cuban Frog Leg Industry," "The Venezuelan Salt Fish Industry," and the book to end all books, "Recipes for Cooking Muskrat Meat."

This is an example of how the taxpayers' money is spent on projects which are of interest to an infinitesimal number of people.

There isn't a department of government which isn't honeycombed with waste and duplication of effort. There isn't a department where money couldn't be saved without affecting any essential activity. And the total saving, according to Senator Byrd and other authorities, could be as much as \$10,000,000,000 a year. When will a start be made?

## CONSUMER NOW TOP MAN

For the first time since 1941, retail trade as a whole shows a relationship to the nation's overall economic activity comparable to that prevailing before the last world war.

That's the gist of an analysis recently made by the Institute of Life Insurance. The analysis was based on Department of Commerce statistics showing the relationship between the annual volume of retail store sales and the gross national product from 1929 to now.

The Institute said, "What these figures tend to confirm is what has been becoming apparent for some time—that the war-caused era of shortages has been replaced by a more normal type of demand in which prices and consumer decisions when and whether to buy are of primary importance."

"In essence, therefore, barring unforeseen developments, the American economy has reverted to its traditional competitive basis."

Today's consumer can see plenty of evidence of that fact with his own eyes. During and for some time after the war a great many commodities were in very short supply and some were almost non-existent. It became a truism that anything was salable, no matter how shoddy it might be. The consumer had small choice when he went to market. Today the situation is utterly different. There is an abundance of practically all consumer goods, and in some lines supply is substantially greater than demand.

The result is that every merchant must fight for his trade. He must offer all possible inducements—better stocks, lower prices, more attractive services, and so on. The buyer again calls the tune.

## QUESTION OF HONOR

A new approach to the tidelands controversy is offered by Merritt F. Hines, Midland, Texas, in a letter to the editor, which appeared in the September 5th issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. We believe it worthy of reproduction.

"With all that is being said and written about the tidelands issue, it seems to me that the greatest point of all is not being sufficiently and adequately stressed.

"As for Texas, there exists a treaty, the Treaty of Annexation, between the United States and the extinguished Republic of Texas, by which the new and annexed State of Texas retained and reserved unto herself all of her public land.

It is not just my state's loss of wealth that concerns me in this case. I see my country pursuing a course that is without honor, repudiating a part of a historical agreement in writing with another nation.

"Certainly I, as a Texan, am interested in seeing my state regain and keep the material wealth that is rightfully hers, but I as an American, am definitely more interested in seeing my country regain and keep her national honor.

"President Truman is wrong in the thought and expression recently attributed to you that only a few people in Texas who own oil wells are concerned about state ownership of the tidelands, or would let that consideration influence their voting! I do not own a dime's worth of interest therein, and never expect to have any such interest except as my school children would benefit by state ownership. But I care something about the issue! Texans place some values above that of the dollar; so do other Americans.

"How much better off, morally and spiritually, is the man without a country than the man without a country whose honor and integrity are something he can look up to for inspiration and guidance.

"There's where the real loss is, and every American who has suffered it has suffered one immeasurably greater than the Texans' dollar loss."

Forrest, financial and business editor of the New York Times, recently wrote, in the course of an article on Canada's tremendous industrial development, "Washington could learn a great deal regarding finances from Canada. Henceforth, all Crown companies—which are owned by the Dominion Government—and which in general compete with private business, will pay a Dominion income tax for the first time. And at standard rates!"

In this country socialized enterprise not only is free of all or most taxation—but eats our taxes in tremendous quantities in the form of never-ending subsidies.

Yes, we certainly can learn a lesson from Canada in this respect!

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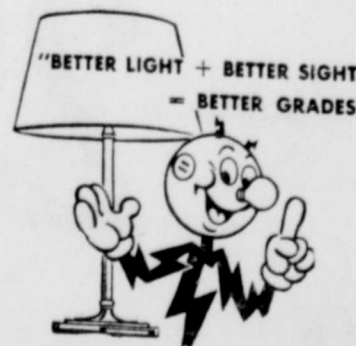
