In these days when some people in both high and low positions would sell the United States short for the purposes of promoting restrictive socialism, it is well to pause and take stock of what this country has offered the individual-unlimited opportunity.

Penney, who is now Chairman of the Board of J. C. Penney & Company, has demonstrated what a man can do with opportunity. He started as small as a man could in 1902 with an idea and a little store in Kemmerer, Wyoming. He believed then, as he does now, that what is needed is ability and the will to work hard toward the achievement of a goal—any goal which is right and clean and decent and worth while.
