Hugh Jones Rites Held Last Friday

Funeral services for Hugh Jones, 64, who was killed in an accident in Mississippi, were held at 2:30 P. M. last Friday at the First Methodist Church here in Burkburnett. Short services were held at McComb, Mississippi before the body was brought here for burial. Burial was in the Burkburnett Cemetery under the direction of Owens and Brumley Funeral Home. Jones, a retired drilling contractor, helped in the development of the Burkburnett oil fields in the famed oil boom days. Mr. Jones' body was not discovered until some time after his death since he was alone when the accident happened. He was clearing trees from the old homestead of his parents when the fatal mishap occurred. It was decided after the investigation that a tree had swung around after Mr. Jones had pushed it with the bulldozer and struck him in the chest, thus causing his death. Jones came to Burkburnett as assistant superintendent for the Humble Pipeline Company and worked here for them for many years. He retired several years ago. Mrs. Jones was in Burkburnett at the time of the accident. He was a member of the Masonic Tremont Lodge, 97 at Florence, Colorado, and had been a member of this organization there for many years. Surviving are his widow, the mother, Mrs. Emma Jones; and a sister, Mrs. Vera Thomas. The Hugh Joneses were very well liked and respected residents of Burkburnett and the community was shocked and saddened with his passing.

Telephone Co. Is Asking For Rate Increase Here

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed a request for higher rates in Burkburnett, Monday, December 1st. R. B. Peterson, district manager for the company, pointed to continued financial losses on the company's operations here in filing the request. "For the six months ending June 30, it cost \$129 more to furnish telephone service for Burkburnett than we collected for the service," he said. Rates requested by the company include \$9 a month for a business telephone, \$5 for an individual-line residence telephone, \$4 for a two-party line, and \$3.25 for a four-party line. "These rates should help us meet today's higher costs of furnishing telephone service," Peterson said. The company last requested an increase in telephone rates here in June, 1951. The application was based on operating results for 1950. "Since that time two general wage increases have been granted telephone employees in keeping with rising living costs, taxes have continued to go up, and the costs of many of the things we use in providing service here have risen," Peterson added. "As a result, present rates are adequate to pay today's costs of furnishing service in Burkburnett," he said.

Point 10 and The 11th Hour

Today, we have more plans in the air than planes. And, declared the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee, headed by Senator Lyndon Johnson, of Texas, in its report of last June: "No aggressor was ever stopped by blueprints."

In case you've forgotten, here's the record: From 1945 to 1950, between wars, approximately 5 per cent of Defense appropriations went for planes, and more than 38 per cent to tear down the most magnificent war production machine the world has ever known. In 1948, Congress boosted plane production in May, but the Administration impounded funds and ordered Air Force and Naval aviation retrenchment in December. In 1950, outnumbered in the air over Korea, expansion was reoriented, 143 wing Air Force authorized. In December, 1951, cut-back ordered to "stretch-out" completion of program from June, 1954 to June, 1956. Such backing and filling, the committee has pointed out, not only stands in the way of victory, in the cold war, but will save no money. The crux of the report is its "Point 10", which asks that Congress be provided with "... recommendations to maintain the aircraft industry in a healthy state in periods of peace as well as in periods of defense mobilization."

The committee's prayer, we learn from Defense Secretary Lovett, is to be answered, and such "recommendations" will be forthcoming from the Executive Department of the Government. And we can pray too, that these recommendations in this eleventh hour, will provide the blueprint Congress needs to put an end to the Stop-and-go production that has wasted critical engineering and technical manpower, lost two to three billions of tax money since Korea.

Perhaps we can finally achieve long-range economy and sustained preparedness in these critical—and costly—years of international tension.

MUDDLE MONEY

Motoring today can be a dangerous, expensive, frustrating experience, in spite of the safety features, the ease of handling and luxury of modern automobiles. The reason is the nation-wide highway muddle. And we're in the muddle because even less than three decades ago, we had no idea that by 1952 we would have to make room on our roads for 53 million cars, trucks and buses.

Maybe you think it could be worse? Well, it will be unless we mobilize an all-out attack on the muddle, and without delay. In twenty-five more years, the experts say, we'll be needing, owning and operating 80 million cars and trucks.

C. E. Wilson, President of General Motors, thinks the way to attack the muddle is to get as many people as possible studying and thinking about the problem, actively, constructively and imaginatively. To do this, he has announced a national essay contest with \$194,000.00 in prizes, probably the largest undertaking of its kind ever attempted. Any man, woman or child in the US may enter, except the contest judges themselves, and their immediate families. There will be 162 national,

regional and state prizes, of which the top award is \$25,000.00.

"Only an informed people can act wisely," says Mr. Wilson. "and although I'm concerned about the highway problem, I am not concerned about the action the American people will take once they understand the facts. That's the way we get things done in this country."

Another curious thing about the American people is that the amateur so often comes up with the answer the expert misses. The professional can be too deep in the woods to see the trees. So, maybe you'd better drop in on a GM dealer, and get an entry blank and the Better Highways Awards Fact Book. The contest runs until March first, but you know how time flies... and somebody has got to help us, and you, out of this muddle. It might as well be YOU.

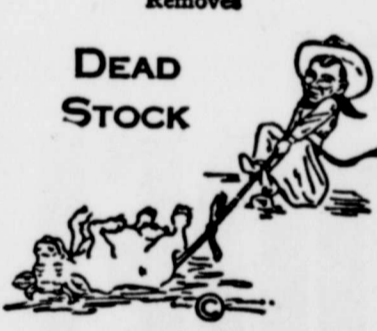
