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NEW YORK (ED)-It isn't the spring, the setting, or even the bride's name that makes a wedding. It's the bride herself, and her dress,

If you're the lucky girl this spring or summer, you'll be wearing something as new and tender as a cage of embroidered organza, or a full-length princess dress with a mini lace yoke. Something new may be your high neck-line, ruffled around with narrow lace. It could be tiny sleeves of lace or long flaring sleeves. It could also be an airy vell attached to your headdress, and falling the length of your dress. These veils are usually scattered with lace sprays matching others on the dress.

Most of the bridal dresses are in camellia and candlecreamy white, but something new is a delicate Wedgwood blue. The bride who chooses it might like her bridesmaids to wear white dresses with high waistlines circled by Beauvais ribbon braid in the same blue. It's news that more bridesmaids are wearing white, but of course, with a touch of color.

The fabrics of wedding dresses this season vary from plain and embroidered organza to heritage laces, to allover tucked voile, dotted Swiss, and white pique or white linen.

The long bridal dress may have a detachable panel train or train-in-the-round, called the Watteau train. Or it may borrow a trained effect from a long and sweeping veil. Some of the most formal bridal dresses are a glistening fall" of white textured silk, rimmed around a high neckline and short sleeves with crystals and pearls.

Short bridal dresses are similar in line and fabric to the full length, but are more often designed to wear, as well, as short evening dresses, A charming cage of thick white Guipere lace is typical.
