CAN DO!

One of the best money-saving ideas we have heard of yet is actually to be put into operation by the U. S. Air Force, and practically right now.

By next June 25,000 airmen now serving in depot operations on foreign bases will have been replaced by natives of the various countries and transferred home. During fiscal 1955, an additional 10,000 will be "repatriated," all 35,000 to be assigned to duty with the Air Force wings as they are organized.

Some indication of the potential savings is seen in the fact that the Air Force can hire European civilians for half the Airman's pay, and Japs for less than a third who can do the work of a man training (which is not being used) has cost US taxpayers \$14,000. Savings in Europe are estimated at 36 million dollars, which will be diverted to activating new wings.

Thus, by next June, we will have 116 combat wings instead of the 110, and a year later 120 wings - with 10,000

less men than the authorized strength. We begin to see what Defense Secretary Wilson means when he promises more defense for less money.

IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

Let's take a "new look" at traffic safety this month. In previous years safe winter driving programs have warned motorists, "You can't stop on an icy dime" - have tried to promote operation skill with rules and techniques for safe ice and snow driving - have told both motorists and pedestrians the "what" facts on accidents and the "how" of improving the record by observing the laws and common-senses rules of safety.

These all are important factors in any January safety program, and they should not be overlooked this year.

But the "new look" this month — the approach we all might benefit by considering—is the "why" of traffic ob-

"Why" should you know traffic laws and obey them? "Why" should you learn safe driving techniques such as those discussed in the safe winter driving rules listed by the Texas Safety Association?

"Why" should you, as a motorist or a pedestrian, be alert in winter traffic?

One rather obvious answer is found in the January traffic slogan of the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety: "Stay Alert - Stay Alive in Winter Weather." By getting through winter's traffic without accident you very well may be saving your

Just as important a reason, perhaps, is found in the phrase: "It's your responsibility."

And that responsibility is two-edged. You are responsible for your own safety in traffic - for being accident free yourself.

You also are responsible for others — both motorists and pedestrians - who may be in the wrong, safety-wise, but whom you can save from their own folly if you are alert and careful.

Expert drivers have their cars under control at all times. Expert walkers never take chances in traffic.

So don't blame the weather, or the weatherman, if you have a winter weather traffic accident. Safety is your responsibility.

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

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

VETERANS Administration Questions and Answers

Q-I'm planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. How much will my GI training allowance be?

A-Your training allowance will be computed on the basis of the established charge which the school requires non-veterans to pay for the same course.

Q-As a member of the organized reserves, may I count time spent on training duty - as opposed to regular active duty in figuring how much entitlement I'll have for Korean GI Bill training?

A-No. Time spent on training duty does not count in determining entitlement under the Korean GI Bill. However, if you were recalled for regular Glendenning. active duty - and not training duty that time would count.

Q-I understand that if a Korean GI Trainees entitlement runs out past the mid point of a school term or semester, he'll be allowed to finish that term or semester under the Korean GI Bill. Will entitlement be extended for an on the job trainee whose entitlement expires before he finishes his training?
