
# **Damages** Denied



This is the considered belief of a scientist who has studied the unequal battle between the human race and starvation-and who has been doing something about it. In an inspiring address to the nations state Agricultural Commissioners, Dr. Robert White-Stevens, a nutrition scientist at Lederle Laboratories, Pearl River, N. Y., lifted the curtain of famine shrouding a world that now produces about 40 percent of minimum needs in food and fibers-and let some light shine through

"Perhaps the County Agents of today," said Dr. White-Stevens, "are the forerunners of a great host of men and women who will go out from America in years to come, not to conquer men of other lands, but to lead them by the hand to conquer their own problems of need and want. They can show the backward peoples of the earth how to help themselves rather than trying to feed them off the farms of America, a hopelessly impossible task on the face of it.

To indicate how impossible, Dr. White-Stevens resorted to Arithmetic. "There are now approximately two billion people on this earth, and despite war and famine, disease and disaster, the number increases by at least 40 million new mouths to feed and new bodies to clothe and shelter each January first."

The farms of the world total two billion acres, and "by present world-wide average methods", Dr. White-Stevens calculated five billion acres would be required to support the present population "at a bare subsistence level."

The solution, he thinks, can only lie in world wide
