

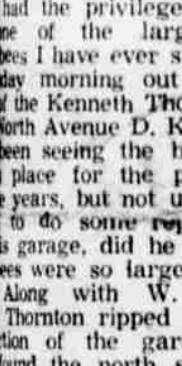

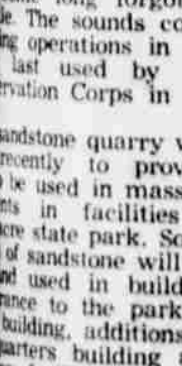

Through the years, he has held several important committee posts, and is currently chairman of Senate committees on Labor and Management Relations and Oil and Gas. He is also a member of standing committees on Contingent Expense; Counties, Cities and Towns; Education, Finance; Game and Fish; Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts; Privileges and Elections; Public Health; Rules; State Affairs; Transportation; and Water and Conservation. Senator Raliff's District 24 is comprised of Borden, Callahan, Coke, Coleman, Fisher, Garza, Glasscock, Haskell, Howard, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Sterling, Stonewall, Taylor, Throckmorton and Young counties.

The Committee on State and Local Tax Policy is requested to study the problems relating to revenue sources and to recommend constructive legislative action on taxation.

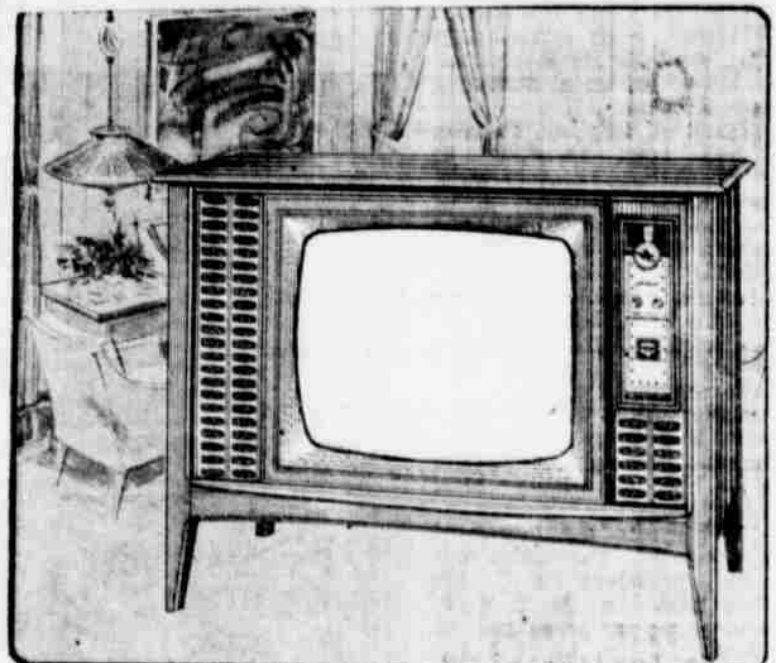
He is receiving six weeks of training in leadership, rifle marksmanship, physical conditioning and other military subjects.

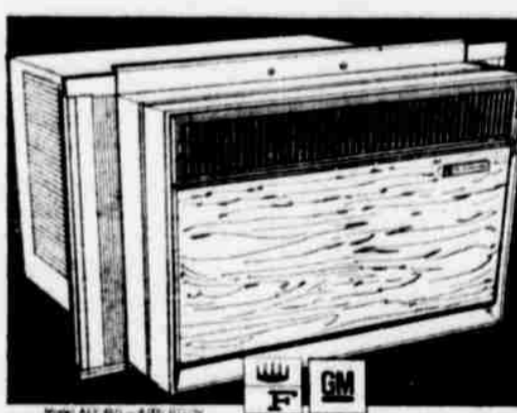

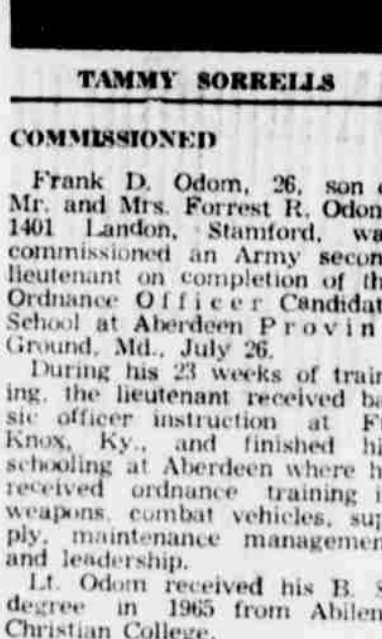

#### Time for Action

A concentrated attack on costly and thoughtless federal fiscal policies was delivered on the floor of the U. S. House of Representatives by Congressman Wendell Wyatt of Oregon. He pointed out that, since 1960, the U. S. population has grown 10 per cent; total federal spending has increased 83 per cent; non-defense spending has increased 97 per cent; the number of federal employees has increased 25 per cent; the cost for federal payrolls has increased 75 per cent and the federal government has rolled-up a deficit of \$50 billion. Congressman Wyatt stated that if the government does not return to a financially responsible outlook immediately we could easily have a \$300 billion annual budget at the taxpayers' expense.

#### Economy Is Not A Bad Word

All over the nation, states are struggling with the problem of bringing their budgets within their income. The alternative is more debt unless higher taxes are to be levied, and the people are emphatically opposing increased taxes. During boom years, tax receipts have been high and public money has been spent like water. Now, as the boom has been "cooled," it becomes a case of debt, economy or higher taxes.

The federal government is in the same position, but according to official statements there will be little or no easing of domestic social expenditures in the face of mounting war costs. So, get ready for more debt, higher taxes or both, and more inflation.

Nothing has been said about what will happen when the tax consumers outnumber the tax earners. With economy out the window one wonders if the countries we have aided will have a foreign aid program for us.
