# **GRASS ROOTS OPINION**

EVERSON, WASH., News: "Tax-subsidized and tax exempt federal power is being sold below production costs under our system of Government in 27 states in direct competition with private companies and it would be one more step that pay all taxes at local, state and federal levels and on the part of the Federal Govreceive no tax exemption.

JUNCTION CITY, Ore., Times: "This newspaper is definitely for high wages, high standards and high quality of citizens. But we would sort of hate to see our public school teachers get into jursidictional disputes between states; that might lead to an organization with subsequent walkouts whenever a 'grievance' could be termed a voilation of contract.

WOODSFIELD, Ohio, Spirit of Democracy: "Political party leaders and representatives of other groups as well as individuals have a right, under our system of government, to criticize the government, also government officials, but no citizen of our country has any legal right to advocate its overthrow by force or voilence or to participate in same."

BLAIR, Wis. Press: "Every government official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar was spent. We hold this to a fundamental principle of democratic government."

"This will be the year of the consumer. This will be the year you, as the buyer of everything from autos to houses, from food to furniture, will come into your own. You will be supreme in the market place.'

That happy prediction was made by Sylvia Porter, a well known business analyst whose syndicated column runs in many daily papers. She also wrote, "Taxes, prices, supplies, quality, research, competition, advertising, salesmanship — all are moving in your favor."

If all that comes to pass, and most observers in and | out of business are in general agreement, it will be for one reason: the working of the supply and demand principle in a free, competitive business world. Due to the unparalleled efficiency of mass production and its equally important ally, mass distribution, practically all shortages have been overcome. Almost everything is available in abundance, as a glance at the advertisements and shelves of stores in every retail field will demonstrate to you. And when that it the case, the consumer is king.

This is true of the free enterprise system only. Every time we make a purchase, we should give that system the tribute that is its due.

# THE LIES CONTINUE

At almost mechanically regular intervals, Communists government make alleged "peace overtures" toward the West, and particularly the United States. It'll be easier to believe there is a grain of sincerity in those gestures when Communism stops its campaign of outright, malignant lies against the free nations.

President Eisenhower proudly wears the old uniform of Hindenburg and the next national figure, Senator McCarthy, has already begun to repair a bloody brown rag worn by Hitler.'

What Edison knew, and perhaps said in an unquoted moment, is that thousands of men would be needed to "start where he left





29-1tP Q-I have a service-connected disability that is rated at 20 per cent by VA. The other day I went to take a physical examination for commercial life insurance, and was told I couldn't get it because I'm considered totally disabled for insurance purposes. Shouldn't my VA rating be increased?

A-Not necessarily. It could be increased only if it is shown that your service-connected disability 29-1tC increased in severity. For insurance purposes, there may have Expert repairing, refinishing been other nonservice disabilfinding of total disability. Also, insurance criteria for determining total disability may not be the same as VA criteria for compensation.

Q-I'm a GI Bill trainee and new address so that I'll continue to receive GI training allowance without delay. I also hold GI insurance. Should I also notify my VA District Office, which is n another state?

A-You should notify your address. All you need to do is write your new address on the flap of the premium envelope you receive regularly from VA. Q-I'm in a VA hospital, and too I want to transfer to another one. Will VA furnish me with kitchen as a work place, you're all ransportation?

A-VA will provide transportation only if the transfer is approved and determined necessary by VA for medical reasons.
