



1. Young disabled workers who previously didn't qualify for disability insurance payments because they had insufficient work credits.

2. Disabled widows and dependent widowers age 60-62; 3. Children of women workers who were insured at the time of their death, disability, or retirement, but who did not meet the former recent work require-

Tuley said he is sure that there are some people in the Abilene area who may be in line for payments under the 1967 Amendments, but who have not yet applied for them. He said that despite extensive publicity given to the Amendments, some people still may not have heard about the changes in the law. Tuley urged those who believe they or a member of their family might qualify for these social security benefits to get in touch with the social security office before the end of February. 




