### Stitching And Stewing

When bonded fabrics came to the market a few years ago, they presented many problems.

Dry cleaners got complaints on separation of fabrics which were bonded together. Problems of puckering, bubbling and peeling resulted.

Manufacturers of bonded fabrics now are setting standards for performance in bond and wear as well as performance in washing and dry cleaning. Trade associations are helping set up tests and product specifications.

The standards of bonded fabric are:

1. Must hold up under a reasonable number of washing and/or dry cleanings.
2. Won't shrink beyond a certain acceptable limit.
3. Won't crack, peel, pucker or bubble.
4. Will retain drape and ability to breathe.
5. Won't stiffen.
6. Won't absorb odor.
7. Will resist discoloration.
8. Will have no "strike-through" or surface evidence of adhesion.

Researchers predict that these industry standards can be expected to upgrade the quality of bonded fabrics. These higher standards may mean the biggest future for bonded fabrics is in untapped fields—men's wear, home furnishings and industrial goods.

### Barbecued Broilers

- 3 broiler-tryers, halved or quartered.
- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard.
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoon tobacco
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1 1/2 cup vinegar

Place chicken, skin side up, on grate, set 12 inches from heat. Combine mustard, sugar, salt and tobacco. Stir in catsup, oil and vinegar. Brush chicken with barbecue sauce. Cook slowly until tender, turning and basting frequently. Allow 1 to 1 1/2 hours total cooking time. To test for doneness, leg should twist easily out of thigh joint and pieces should be fork-tender. Makes 12 servings.

BENEFITS UNDER '67 AMENDMENTS MUST BE FILED FOR SOON

R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, said today that anyone who first became eligible for social security benefits under the 1967 Amendments to the law stands to lose some benefits if not applied for before March 1, 1969.

Under the 1967 social security changes in the law, benefits may now be payable to the following: 1. Young disabled workers who previously didn't qualify for disability insurance...

2. Disabled widows and dependent widowers age 60-62; 3. Children of women workers who were insured at the time of their death, disability, or retirement, but who did not meet the former recent work requirement.

Tuley said he is sure that there are some people in the Abilene area who may be in line for payments under the 1967 Amendments, but who have not yet applied for them. He said that despite extensive publicity given to the Amendments, some people still may not have heard about the changes in the law.

Lone Star Gas Company Seeks Gas Rate Hike

Lone Star Gas Company, which serves Haskell and about 300 other Texas cities has announced Lone Star has commenced preparation of an application which it expects to file with the Railroad Commission of Texas in early summer to adjust upward the company's intracompany city gate charge for gas delivered in Texas.

R. W. Philpot, of Haskell, manager for the company, said he could not make any prediction how the action of the company might affect local gas rates in any of the towns in his district.

Present local gas rate is 35.4c per MCF. It was set by order of the Commission on February 15, 1960. Prior to that, in 1942, the gas rate was actually decreased from 40c to 30c per MCF. Thus, the currently planned application is only the second increase requested by Lone Star in its city gate rate in over 26 years—and the existing rate is lower than that which was in effect as long ago as 1942.

Here is what the Lone Star Gas Company office in Dallas had to say about a change in transmission city gate rates: "In most towns, a change in the transmission city gate rate has no automatic effect on rates actually charged by (the) Company to residential and commercial customers. The gate rate is only an intro-company charge, which would when increased cause our Distribution Divisions to pay more for gas 'at wholesale'. Obviously, this would serve to reduce our earnings in each town in which we operate."

"When the Railroad Commission approves the gate rate change, we will calculate the return in each of our towns, based on the current operations and the new rate in each town. In those towns where earnings so computed are inadequate, individual rate action will be pursued with each town's ruling body."

Field of Bluebonnets Enhances Cover of 1969 Highway Map

AUSTIN—a field of bluebonnets beside a Central Texas stream enhances the cover of the 1969 Official State Highway Map released by the Texas Highway Department.

Like the bluebonnet, the map is a perennial favorite of Texas motorists. Approximately 1.2 million maps were distributed last year and projections for 1969 call for distribution as high as 1.5 million.

Added this year are 127 miles on the Interstate Highway system. They include important links on IH 40 from east of Amarillo to the New Mexico border and 20 miles of IH 635 in the Dallas area from IH 35E eastward to IH 30.

Almost 2.1 thousand miles of Interstate highways in Texas are now open to traffic. Reflecting rapid urbanization of the State, a special inset map of the Longview-Kilgore-Tyler urban region is included on the map. The inset is similar to one added last year for the Rio Grande Valley urban region.

In addition, the Beaumont-Port Arthur inset map has been enlarged to include the Orange area. Texas' new chief executive, Gov. Preston Smith, adds words of welcome to travelers using Texas highways. In his message, he stresses the diversity of the State and invites motorists to use the map in tours on the unexcelled Texas highway network.

Visitors will find expert assistance in planning travels in Texas at 11 tourist bureaus operated by the Highway Department, including the newest at the Roy Bean Visitor Center and Cactus Garden at Langtry. Ten bureaus are marked on the map. The eleventh is in the Capitol Building in Austin.

Three additional pairs of safety rest areas are shown along Texas Interstate routes. Each new safety rest area includes a comfort station, drinking fountains, fireplaces, special travel displays featuring both Statewide and local points of interest and handy map dispensers. Motorists will appreciate the familiar shaded picnic tables and fireplaces.

Altogether, the Texas Highway Department has provided approximately 1,100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and scenic turnouts for the safety and convenience of highway users in Texas.

Safety rest areas are designated on the map with a small green square, roadside parks with the familiar green dot symbol. Other helpful information on the map includes listings of Highway Department district offices, Department of Public Safety offices, Highway Department Tourist Bureaus and Visitor Centers, and State Parks.

Back again this year is a handy conversion table in Spanish for the benefit of Latin American visitors. The table converts kilometers to miles and liters to gallons.

The Official State Highway Map is one of the most popular of more than 7.3 million pieces of travel-oriented literature distributed each year by the Texas Highway Department. Copies of the map are available at Department District offices.

Tourist bureaus and visitor centers are located in or near Anthony (El Paso), Laredo, Orange, Texarkana, Denison, Gainesville, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Langtry and in the State Capitol at Austin. Trained travel counselors in these bureaus and centers assisted almost one million tourists last year.

### COMMUNITY PROPERTY AND RETIREMENT INCOME CREDIT

The Texas community property law is very important to retired Texans if they are married. The law can give your spouse a share of your retirement income credit worth an additional \$228.60 on your 1968 tax return. On the other hand, if you are working, your wife's community share of your earned income can cost her \$228.60 that she would have been entitled to as a retiree in non-community property states.

First, let's consider an example of earned income eliminating your retirement income credit:

You received a taxable pension of \$3,000 in 1968. In 1968 your wife received earned income of \$8,000. This constitutes community income and you, therefore, have received \$4,000 earned income in 1968. This must be considered in computing your retirement income credit. If you are at least 62 but under 72 years of age, 50% of earned income in excess of \$1,200 but not in excess of \$1,700, plus the total amount over \$1,700, must be used to reduce the maximum amount upon which the retirement income credit may be based (\$1,524). Thus the excess earned income (\$2,550) will eliminate any retirement income credit for you.

Now for the benefit side—retirement income, which is community income, is considered as having been received half by the husband and half by the wife. Half of such income is taken into account in determining

to what extent you or your wife may be entitled to retirement income credit. (This could be worth a maximum of \$228.60 tax saving for each.) As an example:

You receive a pension under a Public Retirement System. Your wife may consider her share of such community income as retirement income, even though she has not reached 65 years of age. If she is under 65, however, she cannot consider her share of rents.

A second example is:

Your wife is paid a pension not under a Public Retirement System. If she has not reached 65, her share is not retirement income. You, however, do have retirement income with respect to your share of such pension, if you are 65 or older.

The community property law also has the effect of giving retirement income credit to wives (many years below the normal retirement age of 65) of some public system retirees (usually military). Public system retirees should check the instructions carefully to determine whether they are entitled to additional or any retirement income credit on this basis.

If you have a problem in determining whether you are entitled to a retirement income credit your local office of the Internal Revenue Service will be glad to help you.

### DPS In Need Of High Caliber Young Men

An invitation has been issued to any high caliber young men of this area who feel that they can compete for the position of patrolman with the Department of Public Safety. "The opportunity exists for several men to meet the challenge of the rigid qualifications for patrolmen—Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers License, and Motor Vehicle Inspection," Major Luther Moore said.

"The DPS Commander stated, 'If you are good enough, we can use you; however, we do not want anything but the best. If you cannot meet our standards there is no need of applying for the positions.'"

"Assignment to one of the above services will be made on the basis of aptitude, interest and ability at the conclusion of a period of intense basic training. Then specialized training in the assigned service will be given to those that qualify after which a home station will be designated," Moore said.

Applicants must be between 20 and 35 years old, at least 58 inches tall, weigh not less than two pounds or more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height, and be in sound physical condition. They must have a high school education or the equivalent and their record must be able to stand rigid examination pertaining to character and citizenship. Selection procedure will include written and oral examinations.

"The law enforcement field

is a challenge to young men who are seeking a career, and the Texas DPS is rated among the top law enforcement agencies in the world," Major Moore said.

**MEDICARE PATIENTS REMINDED HOSPITAL DEDUCTIBLE NOW \$44**

Increased hospital costs of over 13% have resulted in a 10% increase in Medicare costs to elderly patients, beginning Jan. 1, 1969. This comes as a reminder from R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office.

Tuley said, "The average Medicare in-patient hospital daily costs rose, nationally, from about \$38 in 1966 to about \$43 in 1967 and continued upward in 1968. Keeping pace with these rising costs required that the deductible be increased from \$40 to \$44 in each benefit period.

"The patient's share of the cost from the 61st to the 90th day rises from \$10 to \$11. If he has to draw on his 'lifetime reserve' from the 91st day to the 150th day in one benefit period, his share during that time has gone up from \$20 to \$22. Insured care in a skilled nursing home now costs the patient \$5.50 per day after the first 20 days, instead of \$5.00."

These increases were effective on or after Jan. 1, 1969, Tuley emphasized. A person who entered a hospital or skilled nursing home before January 1 pays the old rate throughout his stay even if it extended into 1969.

### A Picture Story . . . GARDENS ON HIGH



Hanging baskets ornament the facade of this house as they could ornament a similar porch or a breezeway at your home. These miniature gardens, high above the ground, are easily produced.



First step is to procure a basket which may be wire (left), redwood (center) or plastic as on right, but must have sufficient openings for good water drainage. Line with sphagnum moss, fill with rich soil, then plant Cascade petunias, lobelias, browallias — or any flower with downward sweeping stems. Annuals of this sort soon cover the basket with blooms, making it so attractive!

### Community Property, Dividends, Capital Losses, Married Students

If a married Texan receives taxable dividends (not interest from savings and loan associations and similar sources) he may be able to claim up to \$100 additional dividend exclusion due to the community property law in Texas. The state law varies even in community property states on whether dividends are separate or community income. In Texas, dividends are community income, therefore, if you have more than \$200 in dividends, you can claim a \$200 exclusion (\$100 for each spouse) regardless of which spouse owns the stock. If you file separate income tax returns you should split the dividend with each spouse reporting one-half of the total. There were about 200,000 tax returns from Northern Texas with dividends of more than \$250 million according to the statistics of income

for 1966. This is an important community property benefit that can result in saving several dollars in tax for a large number of taxpayers in our area.

Another very worthwhile tax benefit available to Texans that is not available in non-community property states is the tax treatment of a capital loss. IRS's "Your Federal Income Tax" booklet explains...if your capital losses exceed your capital gains, the deduction for excess loss is limited to: (a) \$1,000, or (b) your taxable income for the current year, whichever is smaller...if you and your wife file a joint return, you may deduct up to \$1,000 of capital losses between you both; if you file separate returns and both have capital losses, you may deduct up to \$1,000 on each return. In Texas, where

the capital losses are from community funds, you can file separate returns, and claim \$2,000 in capital losses instead of the \$1,000 allowed in non-community property states. This is an important tax saving for thousands of Northern Texans each year.

Students married during 1968 must also take community property into consideration in filing their tax returns. This is especially true where one or more of the students' parents continue to provide principal support to one or both of the newlyweds. First Internal Revenue cautions students to file a joint return if their parents plan to claim them as dependents on their return.

Here is an example of how community property affects students: You were married in 1968 and you continued to live with your parents in Texas while attending college. Your father provided support for both you and your spouse, and during the summer vacation you earned \$1,000 in wages, which under the community law in Texas, constitutes community income to you and your wife in the amount of \$500 each. You and your wife should file separate returns to obtain a refund of the taxes withheld. Your father may still claim you and your spouse as a dependent provided he meets the principal support requirement, and provided you do not file a joint return.

Additional information on the effect of the on your income tax liability can be obtained from local offices of the Internal Revenue Service. Ask for Document 555, "Community Property."

VIETNAM VIEW

As reported by Marine Corps Correspondents and edited by Sgt. Ed Mitschke.
When 3rd Marine Division bandmen boarded trucks for Quang Tri City they had a two-fold mission. Their trip was prompted by a love of music and a desire to help the Vietnamese.

The band, under the leadership of Capt. Sidney L. Snellings Jr., 1201 Pacific St., Ocean-side, Calif., presented a concert at Quang Tri City and later, during ceremonies at the Vietnamese Information Service compound presented 25 instruments to residents of Quang Tri Province.

The instruments were donated to the Vietnamese Police Psychological Operations Section, a redevelopment cultural drama team, a group from the Army of the Republic of Vietnam and a local high school.

The instruments donated had been used by the Marine band but were replaced by newer ones. They included trumpets, saxophones, clarinets, a drum set, a flute, a trombone and a piccolo.

"All the instruments donated to the Vietnamese were in good playing condition," said Gun-nery Sgt. John Wyman, Rum-ford, Me., instrument repairman for the band. "They were all completely checked. Those found faulty were repaired," added Wyman.

"During our many musical engagements in Quang Tri City and our contacts with various Vietnamese groups, their desire for instruments became quite apparent," commented Snellings. "It is our hope that these instruments will aid the growth of musical groups and increase music appreciation throughout Quang Tri Province."

A platoon of Marine infantrymen is a closely-knit unit - its members eat, live and fight together as a team and all share the hardships and hard-won victories in combat. But Leather-necks of the 1st Platoon, "C" Co., 1st Bn., Ninth Marines have gone one step further - they even write letters as a team.

How? With a "Family-gram" letter written by the entire platoon and addressed to all parents of the platoon members.

SSgt. Earl Wilson, Warren, Mich., the platoon sergeant and originator of the idea, estimated that the letter will travel 50,000 miles and through 25 states and Guam by the time it reaches all its addressees.

"It all started only half-seriously," says Wilson, "but then one of my men said, 'Why not?' and the letter was written and mailed."

The first recipients of the letter will be the parents of LCpl. Charles A. Domicello, Rochester, N. Y. Young Domicello has already written his parents telling them to expect the "Family-gram" and has urged them to forward it to the next parents on the list, with a letter of their own along with it.

"It's not often that all of the platoon can sit down and write letters to our parents. We have written one letter and have included in it the addresses of all the parents of the men in the platoon. We hope that this letter will be forwarded to all of them so they can all learn what everybody in the platoon is doing," read part of the letter.

The letter also explains that the Marines thought it would be a good way for their parents to get to know other parents of Marines serving in Vietnam.

The letter concludes: "We all think of you often and miss you. Please keep the prayers and goodies coming from the home front, and send this letter to the next family on the list."

"Who knows, after this shooting war is over, we all might have a huge family reunion," adds Sgt. Donald F. Meyers, Indianapolis, Ind., the platoon's right guide.

Marine LCpl. Thomas E. Perry 148 1/2 E. 111th St., Los Angeles, Calif., believes it and proves it by spending his off-duty time teaching English to 250 Vietnamese high school students.

Perry had no idea of his "second mission" when he arrived in Vietnam last June. He had been well trained for combat at Camp Pendleton, Calif., and was looking forward to his assignment with the Force Logistic Command's 1st Military Police Bn.

His unit is responsible for maintaining security for the sprawling Da Nang Air Base and the vital Cam Le bridge area nearby.

Just two months after Cpl. Perry's arrival, the enemy struck in force at the Cam Le defenses. The vicious battle lasted nearly three days and when it was over, the bridge and surrounding area remained in the Marines area of responsibility.

However, the battle had taken its toll. A Marine who had spent his off-duty time teaching English at the nearby Thung Hoc High School had been killed. Since teaching English at the school is an integral part of the MP battalion's civic action program, the call was immediately sounded for volunteers.

"I thought that doing something 'extra' for the Vietnamese would somehow make my being here more meaningful," observed Perry. "I couldn't have been more correct."

Perry is now teaching four classes daily, each class lasting an hour and a half. He utilizes several methods to get his instructions across - illustrations, demonstrations, and phonetics.

His methods are meeting with outstanding success a success measured by an ever-increasing attendance. He is now assisted in his work by another Marine and two men from nearby Air Force units.

"Teaching English in Vietnam is a two-way street," declares Perry. "I improve my Vietnamese vocabulary with every class."

He was also named Scout of the Year of Troop 53, where he has served as Senior Patrol leader for the past 12 months.

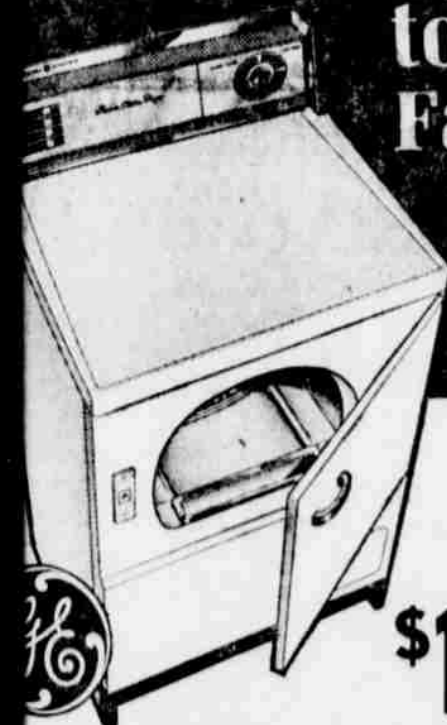

# The Good Earth

Every established yard has a shady spot that can be a problem if one doesn't know what to plant, or which thrives in shade. Annuals that are adapted to shade are: Coleus, Bellis Double Daisy, Nicotiana, Lobelia, Impatiens, Begonia, Cardinal Plant, and Sigot Delight Salvia.

Most every gardener is familiar with Coleus in all its gaily colored dress. Coleus is just the plant to give that just-right color to a shady area.

Bellis double daisy produces a succession of pink rose or deep red blossoms throughout the blooming season.

Nicotiana grows equally well in sun or shade; trumpet shaped blossoms of white, red and lime green attracts bees and humming birds.

Lobelia can be set in clumps or as a border. The plants grow about four inches high and seven inches wide, they produce an abundance of blue blossoms from summer until frost.

Impatiens, another shade-loving flower, comes in shades of orange, red, pink and white.

The tuberos Begonia can also be had in hues of yellow.

Cardinal flowers look like tiny red cardinals clinging to long, green spikes.

While we were in east Texas last week we kept thinking we saw rebuds in bloom but found that it was oak leaves about the size of the rebud blossom, the leaves were a fiery red.



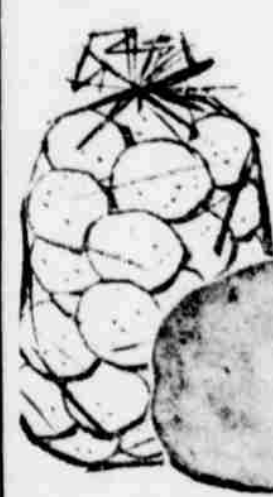
