Water Shortage Partially Relieved By New Supply

The water shortage confronting this city has been partially relieved. Early this week eight new wells East of town were put on the pump. These wells are adding some 25,000 gallons of water to the supply each day.

For many weeks City Manager T. R. McCasling and city employees have been working frantically to get the new wells into production. Soon, one or more other wells will be ready for pumps.

Wells at the pump station, which have lost a lot of their production capacity, will be cleaned out and efforts made to bring them back to their original productivity.

The city has been zoned and limited watering of lawns and shrubs will be permitted until further notice. The zones and days for watering are listed on the front page of the Star this week.

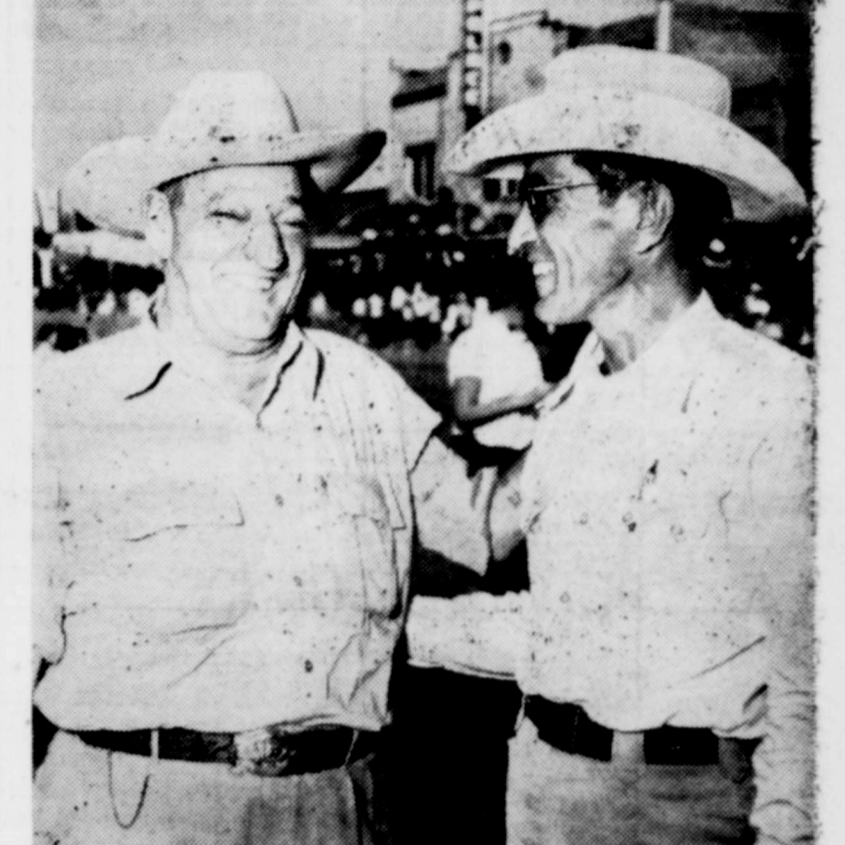

NOTICE

The City Commission of Burkburnett, Texas, sitting in regular session Monday, June 28, 1954, enacted Section Two of Ordinance No. 317.

SECTION 2. The City Council shall have the authority, and does by these presents, have the authority, in order to conserve the shrubs and trees of the citizens of Burkburnett, to zone the City of Burkburnett, and through Proclamation, to allow the people of Burkburnett in those zones to use water for specified purposes set out in the Proclamation.

The zones and the days that each zone may use water for the purpose of watering shrubs and trees are as follows:

ZONE 1. To water on Monday between the hours of 6:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. All of the town West of the railroad tracks.

ZONE 2. To water on Tuesdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad tracks and North of Third Street.

ZONE 3. To water on Wednesdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad tracks and lying between Third Street and Glendale Street, considering Hayworth Street as an extension of Glendale Street.

ZONE 4. To water on Thursdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad tracks lying between Glendale Street and Tidal Street.

ZONE 5. To water on Fridays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad tracks lying between Tidal Street and Sheppard Road, (Wichita Highway).

ZONE 6. To water on Saturdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad tracks and South of Sheppard Road.

This is an experiment to see if we now have enough water to allow limited watering. If it is found that there is not sufficient water, then Section Two of Ordinance No. 317 will be revoked and the new watering Ordinance will be enforced again.

The City Commission has asked me to express their appreciation for the co-operation given in the past and again to ask for your continued co-operation in using as little water as possible under the above plan.

PRECIOUS POUNDS

One of our enterprising soap makers believes the American housewife is worth her weight in gold — with which we hasten to agree.

But the soap people are going to prove it—by backing up their sentiments with the folding equivalent of that yellow stuff at Fort Knox—and at the going rate of \$510.40 per pound.

There will be a contest with the usual gimmick of asking the ladies to tell them — in 25 words or less — why they prefer Product A over Product, or vice-versa. But the prize makes all the difference. If the top winner weighs in at 90 pounds, she'll collect \$45,936.00. But, if she pulls the scale down to 190, her reward will be \$96,976.

The purpose of these soap contests, of course, is to sell soap. But here is one that we predict will boom the chocolate nut sundae market, the restaurant business, the grocery stores and butcher shops. It will put the pie foundries on three shifts, restore the fast fading art of cake baking, and may even take care of that butter surplus.

It ought to be good for the dry goods trade too, for the style designers might as well brace themselves for the "new silhouette" which will require not only new clothes, but more goods to make them.

And if this is what it takes to persuade the girls that it's no longer smart to be undernourished, we shall all be indebted to these soap people for a better stronger America. No fooling.

IT WON'T GET LOST

The problem of world communism, President Eisenhower told his press conference, may last for forty years. And, considering the fact that we have already been confronted with it for thirty nine years— during which time out position has continually deteriorated, this would seem barring a world conflagration, a very modest prognostication.

As for outlawing all trade between the free world and iron curtain countries, the President indicated this would never happen if he had his way. He stressed the need for more liberal American foreign trade policies as an aid in building up allies who can make a living. But he did not mention that there might be room for some cooperation in this direction by the allies also.

Perhaps we should begin to wonder whether America, forty years from now, after forty more years of foreign aid, of giving all and asking nothing, of restricting our own trade with the Reds while our allies expand theirs, will also be able to make a living. It seems unlikely that the problem of world communism would then be any less acute.

ARE YOU A HEEL AT THE WHEEL?

The National Safety Council, which is coordinating a nationwide Fourth of July safety campaign, holds up six mirrors. If you can see yourself in any of them, then be prepared to become a holiday statistic.

The Me Firster — this is the selfish competitive character who must be first away from the traffic light, can't stand to have anyone pass him, and risks the life of anyone who gets in his way.

The Big 1 — this is the fellow who is too big for the rules. Others can obey the law and a code of decent and courteous behavior, but not this selfish inflated big shot. He's above all that.

The Know It All — this driver is good, in his own estimation. He knows just what the other driver is going to do, just how fast he can stop, just how much room he needs to cut in on another car. But the only way this overconfident jerk escapes disillusionment is that the really good drivers give him a wide berth.

The Swashbuckler — this fellow thinks he expresses his masculinity or something by living dangerously behind the wheel. He believes that he who hesitates is lost, and that his luck will hold forever.

The Sorehead — this fellow is just plain hostile. He drives with a chip on his shoulder and is ready to lock fenders for any real or imagined wrong. He's sore at everyone, and very brave while surrounded by a steel automobile with the windows rolled up.

The Show-Off — this is the exhibitionist. He's graduated from no hands on a bike to no sense at the wheel. He just wants people to admire his flashy performance, but most other drivers are too busy getting out of his way.

Take a good long look at yourself in one of these mirrors. See anything?

A heel at the wheel gets by because the good drivers give him the margin of safety he fails to give himself. But the heavy Fourth of July traffic will reduce that margin. Watch it!

Texas Safety Association

"Would you put on your best Sunday suit to go walking in the rain?"

Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corp. put this question to motorists today as he discussed the speed control program which the Texas Safety Association, The Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council are conducting during June.

"Of course you wouldn't," he continued. "And you wouldn't think of serving yesterday's left overs when the boss comes to dinner. There's a time and place for everything, and the sensible man fits his actions to the conditions in which he finds himself."

Col. Tilley pointed out that it's just as foolish to drive at a speed too fast for the prevailing conditions. Here too, the person involved just isn't using his head.

A good driver always uses his head when he's behind the wheel, he said. He doesn't travel at the same rate of speed when driving in snow, rain or darkness as he does when driving on a bright, sunny day. And, when he's not feeling up to par, or when he knows his car is not in top condition, he drives slower than he does when both he and the car are in the pink. He also slows down on rough or narrow roads.

Driving at a speed that's safe for conditions merely means using ordinary good judgment, Col. Tilley said.

Most of us pride ourselves on our good judgment, he said and there's no more important place to exercise it than behind the wheel. It means the difference between safe driving and dangerous driving. Let's keep it safe!

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County, Texas at or before ten o'clock A. M., the first Monday next after the expiration of 42 days from the date of issuance of this citation, the same being the 2nd day of August, 1954, then and there to answer the plaintiff's petition filed in said court on the 12th day of June, A. D. 1954, in this cause numbered 53981-A on the docket of said court and styled R. Lee Kempner vs. E. M. Jones, his unknown heirs, legatees, devisees, spouses, assigns, executors, and legal representatives, Defendants.

This is a suit, wherein the plaintiff seeks to cancel an oil and gas lease insofar as it covers certain property herein-after described for the failure of E. M. Jones, the record leasehold owner thereof, or those claiming under him, to reasonably develop said lease as to such property, and for the abandonment of same; or, in the alternative, to enforce specific performance of the implied obligations of said oil and gas lease to reasonably develop same.

Plaintiff alleges that he is the owner in fee simple of all of the 231 acres of land covered by a certain oil and gas lease dated January 14, 1919 and recorded in Volume 122, Page 149 of the Deed Records of Wichita County, Texas executed by J. A. Kemp and Eliza Kempner, as Lessors, in favor of W. G. Burton, as Lessee, to which lease and its record reference is hereby made for all purposes.

Plaintiff further alleges that on October 29, 1919, by instrument recorded in Volume 141, Page 441 of the Deed Records of Wichita County, Texas, W. G. Burton executed as Assignee of said oil and gas lease to E. M. Jones, as Assignee, insofar as the same covered the following described

land in Wichita County, Texas, to-wit:

All of Block No. 13 and 25 of the W. G. Burton's Sub-division of Blocks No. 45 and 82 of J. A. Kemp's Wichita Valley Farm Land, according to the plat of said Burton's Subdivision of record in Volume 2 at Page 58 of the plat Records of Wichita County, Texas, and containing 14.58 acres of land, more or less;

to which assignment of oil and gas lease and its record reference is hereby made for all purposes.

Plaintiff further alleges that the record ownership of said leasehold estate in the above described 14.58 acres is now in the name of the defendant, E. M. Jones; that there has been no drilling of any kind on Blocks 13 and 25 of said Burton's Subdivision since the year 1920; that E. M. Jones has not been heard of for more than 25 years; that said E. M. Jones and those parties and defendants holding under him failed reasonably to develop the property and drill such wells as a reasonably prudent oil operator, under similar circumstances would have drilled and would drill in the reasonable expectation of obtaining production therefrom; that although production has been obtained upon adjoining tracts within the past year, the defendant E. M. Jones or those claiming under him have failed to reasonably develop the above described property, and have abandoned same. That for such failure to reasonably develop said property and for the defendants' abandonment of same, the plaintiff herein is entitled to have said oil and gas lease cancelled insofar as the above described 14.58 acres of land is concerned.

Plaintiff further alleges in the alternative that due to the fact that the defendants are non-residents of the State of Texas, or in the alternative are transients, whose residences are unknown or who have no fixed place of residence, and that the defendants are insolvent in that they have no assets of any kind or character within the state subject to execution, that damages would be wholly inadequate under the circumstances and that the implied covenants of said lease to reasonably develop said property should be enforced.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff prays that Defendants be cited by publication and on final hearing he have judgement cancelling and holding for naught the above described oil and gas lease insofar as it covers the

If this citation is not served within 90 days after the date of issuance it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

News From The Congress

By FRANK IKARD

One member of Congress recently said that he thought we ought to do away with the last month of every session of Congress. When you see the frantic effort to schedule legislation during the losing days of the session and the effort made to hurry a matter along without being too concerned about what form it is in, one cannot help but partially agree with him. The schedule for this week is a good example of how fast the tempo sometimes gets. Scheduled for consideration in the House this week are the Mutual Security Act (foreign aid), the Agricultural Act, Vocational Rehabilitation Act, the Tanker Bill the Espionage and Sabotage Act, the Harboring of Fugitive Act, and the extension of unemployment compensation insurance. Some of these bills have not even been reported out of Committee and, therefore, as this is written, it is impossible for anyone to know just exactly what provisions the bills will contain. Also, everything on the program for this week is a minor piece of legislation which should be very carefully considered by the House and not rushed through. To say the least, it is somewhat discouraging to sit through two or three days of debate on some bill that is of no consequence, and then to have the time that could be spent in considering something as important as the foreign aid program or agricultural program limited to just a matter of a few hours. This practice, I think, is largely responsible for much of the bad legislation that we get.

This week saw the visit of Sir Winston Churchill, the Prime Minister of Britain and his Foreign Secretary, Anthony Eden, to Washington. Of course, the

decisions that were made at the conference with our President and Secretary of State are of the utmost importance and have been closely watched by everyone; however, almost overshadowing the importance of most people that this would probably be the last official visit of the Prime Minister to the United States. Regardless of what a person might think of him, there is no question but that he has been one of the great men in the world of this century, and one cannot help but feel a touch of sadness in knowing that on account of his age and the condition of his health, within a short time he will have to retire from the world scene. He has certainly served his country well and I know that everyone is hopeful that he realize his last ambition which he has stressed to the establishing of real peace in the world.

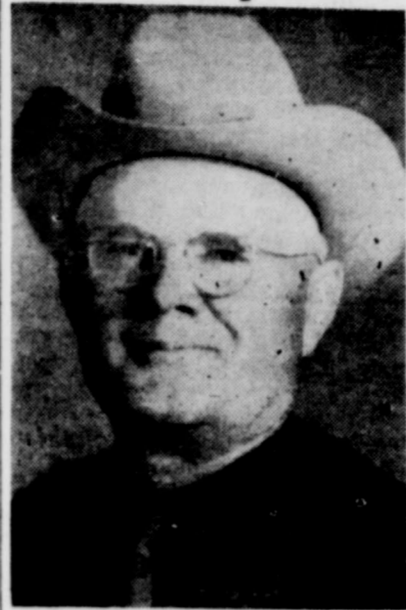
Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, warns that now hot weather is here, everyone should be careful in handling and storing food to prevent food poisoning. The organism grows best in foods that are quite fatty, such as ham, pork, salads or sandwiches with rich dressings, cream pies, cream puffs, or any food with custard filling. Keep this in mind when you prepare a picnic lunch or when anyone in the family takes a lunch to work during the hot months.

Symptoms of food poisoning usually strike quickly and explosively, and those who do not eat the contaminated food do not become ill. Usually from one to four hours after eating contaminated food, victims feel ill. If it is a mild case of food poisoning, recovery usually begins in eight to 12 hours, but victims may feel the ill effects for several days.

Usual symptoms of food poisoning are diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps, and weakness. Whenever you feel these symptoms, be sure to call your physician. Do not wait, hoping it will wear off. Sometimes food poisoning causes death.

Careless handling of food before cooking or serving improper home canning, storing food to long at room temperature, and improper heating of left-over foods are the main cause of food contamination. So, in order not to endanger your family's health, be especially careful in preparing and storing food. Never let a cut or sore place on your hand come into contact with food. Remember, don't take on a picnic or pack in a lunch, fat meats, salads with egg dressings, cream pies, cream puffs, or any food with a custard filling, unless you can keep them properly chilled until serving.

Check Cattle For Screwworms

Wichita County Farmers are advised to lookout for screwworms and to treat all livestock wounds to prevent worm infestation.

Mild winters, similar to the one just past, induce an early worm build up says B. T. Haws County Agent.

To prevent and curb infection Haws recommends EQ-335 smear. It contains lindane which gives a lasting killing effect. One application a week, except in severe cases, will do the job.

Screwworms increase rapidly once present. If headed off from the start, a lot of trouble can be avoided, the County Agent says.

General Hospital School of Nursing

The Wichita General Hospital School of Nursing was established in 1915 by Miss Carrie Webster as its first Supt. There were 16 students in the first class. Since that time 300 young women have been graduated from the school.

Educational facilities are of high quality, consisting of well equipped class rooms, a Nursing Arts Laboratory, Reference Library and a variety of Clinical Services. The daily average of patients afford excellent opportunity for a variety of Clinical experiences. In addition the Clinical experience is broadened to include an affiliation in Psychiatry at the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston and Public Health at the Wichita Coun-

ty Health Unit. Classes in Basic Science and Liberal Arts are given at Midwestern University, in Nursing.

The faculty is composed of the Director of the School of Nursing, The Nursing Arts Instructor, The Clinical Coordinator, Public Health Coordinator, Member of the Medical Staff, Members of the University and Supervisors and Head Nurses of the Hospital.

After satisfactory completion of the third year program of instruction and experience, students are awarded a diploma in nursing and are eligible to take the Examination required by the Texas State Board of Nurses Examiners. A passing grade of 70 must be made on all State Board Examinations. This entitles the Nurse to be a Registered Nurse with rights to practice as such, the State of Texas and by reciprocity in any state in the Union its tentorial po-

sessions. At this time an essay contest is being sponsored for applicants to the School of Nursing and anyone may enter the contest who meets the requirements. Entry blanks may be obtained by writing the School of Nursing, Wichita General Hospital, Wichita Falls, Texas. The contest closes in August.

No Place On Hogs For Lice

Hog prices are favorable and profits can be stretched further if producers will control the lice on their animals.

This parasite constantly irritates the hog, slows its rate of gain, and in turn, raises the producer's feed bill, explains B. T. Haws, county agent. Lice also are a common spreader of swine Pox. A number of swine producers in Wichita County have reported lice on hogs.

Hog lice too often are taken for granted, but they can be easily controlled with DDT, chlordane, toxaphene or methoxychlor sprays at 0.5 percent concentration or with 0.06 percent lindane or gamma BHC. The latter two insecticides give the best results, Haws adds.

Sows with suckling pigs should not be sprayed with any of these insecticides, the county agent precautions.

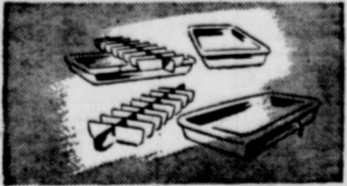
