Competition is far more than "the life of trade." It is the life of this nation, as we have always known it.

Modernize Existing Roads First

In recent national discussions of the need for improving our road system, the major emphasis has been on building new super speedways. Such roads are valuable in getting us safely and quickly across long stretches of country. But even more important are the roads we use every day, roads we travel many times in the course of a week, in the immediate vicinity of our homes.

Improvement of these roads to make daily travel expedient and safe is the greatest need in planning for the handling of traffic.

The President's Highway Safety Conference has pointed out that, "Without question, the most disturbing aspect of the highway accident picture today is the mounting of rural fatalities." In 1953, the National Safety Council reports, 71 percent of the fatal motor vehicle accidents occured in rural areas. Of these, two and a half times as many occured by night per mile travelled, as by day, because the motorist couldn't see the hazards of the road ahead. Roads built during the days when few cars ventured out at night need modern reflectorized signs and markers, fully reflectorized for night visibility, to guide the millions who drive them during darkness.

Improvement of our rural road system right now would cost only a fraction as much per mile as new superhighways.

Highway officials report the most important general improvements needed today are widening of roads, elimination of dangerous curves, resurfacing, and proper and wider use of signs for safest and most efficient guidance of traffic in both daytime and nighttime. Proper signs and hazard markers alone could do much to make our roads safer and easier to travel, for a minimum amount of money. If we can't immediately eliminate the hazards of our roads because of costs, we can at least put up the kind of signs and markings we need to warn of hazards, reflectorized signs that will give us full protection at night as well as during the day.





History Changed By Drake Oil Discovery

In the early 1800's the flickering light of a candle, the crack ing of wooden logs in a fireplace, and the muffled thump of power of the new republic which proudly called itself the United States of America.

The Drake Discovery

Drake, and his discovery was oil - not just oil itself, but proof that it could be obtained in abundant quantities by drilling for it.

The time and place for this historic date were August 27, and the little backwoods town of Titusville, in sparsely settled northwestern Pennsylvania. The dark fluid Drake pumped from the nation's first commercial oil well set fire to men's imaginations, quickened their pulses and spelled out the beginning of a new era of invention and crea-

Oil Centuries Old

In the true sense of the word, Drake's achievement at Titusville was not a discovery, for oil had been known through the centuries and used at various times in limited fashion. The Bible itself notes that Noah's Ark was pitched "within and without" with petroleum; the walls of Babylon were cemented a bitumen mixture; the chariot wheels of the Pharaohs of ancient Egypt were greased with it. History records that the ingenous Chinese as far back as 2,000 years ago, piped natural gas into their rickety homes for heating and cooking purposes The American Indians, long before the white man ever set foot on the soil of the new world, used it as a medicine internally and externally, for man and beast. Washington's soldiers bath ed their weary bones in the restorative waters of oil springs and the early settlers in Western Pennsylvania always had a bottle around for its supposed curative

The coming of the wick-type lamp and the urgent need for a low cost fuel spurred the discovery of oil in Titusville a little village of 125 souls noted for its oil springs and surface seepages. Whale oil and distilled coal oil were the fuels in common usage for the new lamp but they were expensive - roughly \$1.00 a gallon. A Pittsburgher named Samuel Kier worked out a distillation process through which kerosene could be extracted cheaply from the crude oil collected in small quantities from the brine wells and surface oozings. An aboundant supply was mandatory, however and that set the stage for Drake's discovery

Pioneers Cursed It

It is almost ironical to note that in the years prior to the Drake well, crude oil was looked upon by the pioneers streaming across the Alleghenies into the flatfands of Ohio as a curse of the worst sort. As they pushed the frontiers westward, one of their basic needs was salt. This was obtained through evaporation of the waters found in brine wells. When the salt well drillers tapped oil sands instead of water, they blamed the fates for despoiling their efforts. The crude oil contaminated the salt brine, and made it useless for their purposes. Those hardy men of yesterday hadn't the vaguest idea then that this same fluid which they cursed so profanely would become the life blood of civilization itself in less than 100 years.

To realize the significance of petroleum in the year 1954, it is only necessary to look around. Our entire transportation system is built upon petroleum power and petroleum lubricants; to a large extent, the mills, the mines the factories and even agriculture are dependent upon the light, heat and power contained in petroleum, and in the latter-day miracles of petrochemistry. It is not unrealistic to assume that virtually everything the average American eats, wears or does in this year 1954 is related in some way to petroleum.

One third of the states in this country each require more than a billion gallons of gasoline a million a year. year to meet the demands of mo tor vehicles, airplanes, tractors and stationary engines according to the American Petroleum Institute.

Those that consume two bil lion gallons or more in the course of a year are California Texas, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania Illinois and Michigan. California is the biggest user of all, requiring 4.9 billion gallons

Others in the billion plus league are New Jersey, Indiana, Missouri, North Carolina, Florida Wisconsin, Massachusetts, Virginia, Minnesota and Iowa. That makes a grand total of 17 states. In 1953, consumption of gasoline reached an all time peak of 49.5 billion gallons. 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
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

Testing, Testing, Over The 'Lectric Brain

"Piano roll" that "plays" a set of electronic circuits has been developed by an oil company to test automobile engines. The roll is a continuous loop of 35mm film with perforations. The perforations pass in front of an electric eye and activate various circuits. These in turn make the engine start and stop, sets its speed and load and give its oil and water temperatures exactly as they originally happened. Oil companies study and test continually to improve conditions and products for American motorists.

Atomic Watchdogs

Radioactive "tracer" materials are used by the oil industry to follow the flow of oil underground, divide batches of different products in pipe lines, locate difficulties in refinery units, and for well logging. Oil men are quick to use these and other procedures to speed their gigantic task of bringing oil and its products to American consumers.

Structure of Oil Products Studied With Microscope

A microscope that enables oil men to study objects 10,000 times smaller than a human hair is in use by an oil company in the United States. Direct magnification with a special electron microscope is 60,000 times, and by adding a photographic process can be boosted to 150,000 times Oil men, who search for new methods as diligently as they search for oil, use the instrument to study the structure of greases, carbon blacks, petroleum chemicals and similar products. Their discoveries always mean better products at more economical prices for the American

Pipe Lines Move Oil At Low Cost

One of the many systems devised by U. S. oilmen to move oil from the wells to the consumer as economically as possible is the vast network of pipe lines created through years of continuous building.

This network now totals more than 170,000 miles. More dirt has been moved to bury these pipe lines than that required to dig all the canals since the beginning of time. The total mileage is enough to girdle the globe six and one half times.

Pipe lines have many fascinating facets, and one of the more interesting is that different products, such as gasoline, kerosene disel oil and others, can be pumped through, one right after the other, without getting mixed up.

Another is that shipments can be "side-tracked" like railroad trains, to allow "express" or "emergency orders" to rush by. Powerful pumping stations send these petroleum products over mountains, under rivers, and beneath forests and fields. These complex pipe lines operate so efficiently that some products like gasoline and fuel oil, may be consumed without ever being seen or touched by humans.

New Frontiers For Oil Exploration

Offshore geophysical exploration isn't exactly a new enterprise, but its importance has increased as oil men turn to offshore areas in their search for more and more oil. In the United States, the geophysical industry, comparatively young but rapidly growing, has adapted land experience and ingenuity to the new marine area needs. Land crews have been converted to offshore units. Light weight portable equipment has been designed. Recording instruments are completely watertight and buoyant. New equipment and techniques are being developed No problem of weather, water or operations seems too dificult for these people of the progressive oil industry.



The total loss may be slight R. Stimpson. but the expected profit from a small flock is already gone in wasted feed. Fortunately, such examples aren't common in commercial flocks, but are not uncommon among backyard producers.

Commercial producers in many cases, however, are wasting more feed than they realize Most feed is lost by the birds continually "hooking" at it. Some poultrymen have switched to pellets for growing birds and find it helps eliminate waste.

The best method, says the county agent, is to have poultry of the right size, wasteproof type hoppers and do not fill them too full. The "V" shape feeders in general are more wasteful than the square bottom type.

Recent tests of a large feed company demonstrate the value of not filling feeders too full. In







