GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MARENGO, ILL., Republican News: "This year, the electrical industry celebrates it 75th anniversary. In fact the week of August 23rd was Diamond Jubilee Farm Week which was celebrated on nearly five million wired farms."

PETALUMA, Calif, Argus-Courier: "The Argus-Courier could produce a lot more papers than it now does but it would have difficulty selling them. Why shouldn't we continue to produce more papers and let the government pay us to store the surplus? Such a program would make just about as much sense as a continued high price support program for the farmer."

HOLES IN YOUR HOUSE?

It now appears that our ancestors failed to realize what they were doing when they gave up the cave and started the building business, invented mortgages and provided termites with a purpose in life.

We are slightly stunned by the latest discoveries of the Weatherstrip Research Institute which have just been reported to us, and none to soon, if the calendar means anything. Unless a window is properly fitted with metal weatherstrips, they say, the cracks that let the wintry 312 Ave. C blasts through are equal to a hole in the side of the house four inches square — for each window!

And if the wind is blowing only a modest 15 mph. that means 50,000 cu. ft. of cold, dusty air enters the house through every window during a 24 hour period.

But wait, that's only the beginning. These researchers made house heating studies in 12 different sections of the US in order to come up with average figures. In each area they compared a weatherstriped house with one without weatherstripping, but both of them insulated. And when their slide-rule work was done, it appeared the lack of weatherstripping means that poppa has 24 percent more coal or oil or gas to buy - providing he wants to keep the

ACTION AT QUANTICO

Descendants of rebels and damyankees, 120 of them in authentic blue and grey representing six confederate and four Union outfits, met again on a Virginia battleground with their .58 caliber breech-loaders. This time, the 11th annual North-South Rifle Reunion met at the Marine Corp rifle range at Quantico for their target and trick shooting matches—and at last report the rebels were ahead.

We think somehow there's a sermon for all America in this two day bivouac of these prideful contestants who have made the trappings and traditions of a bitter day into symbols of competition and fellowship. They provide assurance that the fighting spirit survives, and that Americans will henceforth fight together.

Ready, Aim, - Don't Fire

In his radio-television report to the people on the Southeast Asia Defense Pact, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said the plans called for "our maintaining" at all times powerful naval and air forces in the Western Pacific capable of striking at any aggressor by means and at places of our own choosing."

It will be remembered that General Douglas Mc-Arthur had such forces in Korea, and so did General James Van Fleet, and both wanted to do some striking "by

means and at places" of their own choosing. But Korea, of course, is not a member of SEATO.

ORDINANCE NO 222 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT

SECTION 1: The State traffic laws regulating speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within this city, except as this ordinance. as authorized by State law, hereby declared and determines upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigations that certain speed regulations shall be applicable upon specified streets or upon certain areas, in which event it shail be prima facie unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed shown on traffic signs erected in compliance with this ordinance.

SECTION 2: Whenever the Chief of Police of Burkburnett, Texas shall determine upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that the 30 miles per hour speed herein before set forth is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist at any intersection or other place or upon any sort of street or highway, said Chief of Police may determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit and the change shall be erected at such intersection or other place or part of the highway or

SECTION 3: THE CITY COUNCIL OF BURKBURNETT HAVING DEEMED THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS, THIS ORDINANCE SHALL TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY UPON PASSED THIS THE 27th DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1954.


