Congressman Frank Icard was introduced by President Miller. Roy Magers, chairman of the permanent program committee, introduced Senator Geo. Moffett of Chillicothe, who explained the eleven constitutional amendments to be voted on November 2nd.

Following Moffett's explanation, Icard, who has recently returned from a visit of several foreign countries, gave his views about the foreign aid we have been giving a great number of those foreign countries. According to the Congressman, some of the foreign aid is doing good, especially in Turkey, Greece and possibly Spain. In France, Italy and North Africa, the "aid" may be doing more harm than good.

Icard said "We cannot continue to support the free world out of the American treasury." Speaking of Germany, he said, "If we direct their efforts along peaceful lines, we shall have made one of the greatest contributions toward world peace."

Instead of giving billions of dollars to foreign nations, Icard suggested that we bring more students here from other countries, put them in our high schools and colleges. After they return to their native lands they will become leaders in their communities and be able to do more for democracy than all the money we can pour into foreign lands.

## Eighteen Possible Cases of Tuberculosis Found In Burkburnett by Recent X-rays

Miss Margaret Hall, executive secretary of the Wichita County Tuberculosis Association, was in Burkburnett Tuesday to bring the results of the recent free chest X-ray clinic held here. For Burkburnett, a total of 18 possible cases of T-B were discovered. A break down on the X-ray discoveries follows:

**Minimal or early:** Five males and four females.  
**Moderately Average:** Three males.  
**Far Advanced:** None.  
**Suspicious T-B:** Three males and three females.

**Cardiacs:** Thirteen males, eight females and one colored person.  
**Other Pathologies:** Two males and three females.  
**County-wide Totals:** The total cases of minimal T-B for the county came to 107. Moderately advanced cases, 22; Far advanced, 4; Tuberculosis in all stages, 133 cases. Suspicious T-B 63; Cardiacs, 185; Other chest diseases, 24.

Total all diseases, 405. Number of X-rays taken in the county, 16,753.

Miss Hall reported that in the past, Burkburnett has not supported the T-B Christmas Seal Sale as it should. Money to conduct the free chest X-ray clinics comes from the sale of the T-B Christmas Seals. Burkburnett should and will make a greater contribution to that fund this year.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MARENGO, ILL., Republican News: "This year, the electrical industry celebrates its 75th anniversary. In fact the week of August 23rd was Diamond Jubilee Farm Week which was celebrated on nearly five million wired farms."

PETALUMA, Calif., Argus-Courier: "The Argus-Courier could produce a lot more papers than it now does but it would have difficulty selling them. Why shouldn't we continue to produce more papers and let the government pay us to store the surplus? Such a program would make just about as much sense as a continued high price support program for the farmer."

## HOLES IN YOUR HOUSE?

It now appears that our ancestors failed to realize what they were doing when they gave up the cave and started the building business, invented mortgages and provided termites with a purpose in life.

We are slightly stunned by the latest discoveries of the Weatherstrip Research Institute which have just been reported to us, and none to soon, if the calendar means anything. Unless a window is properly fitted with metal weatherstrips, they say, the cracks that let the wintry blasts through are equal to a hole in the side of the house four inches square — for each window!

And if the wind is blowing only a modest 15 mph. that means 50,000 cu. ft. of cold, dusty air enters the house through every window during a 24 hour period.

But wait, that's only the beginning. These researchers made house heating studies in 12 different sections of the US in order to come up with average figures. In each area they compared a weatherstripped house with one without weatherstripping, but both of them insulated. And when their slide-rule work was done, it appeared the lack of weatherstripping means that poppa has 24 percent more coal or oil or gas to buy — providing he wants to keep the family warm.

All of which makes a good, old-fashioned cave seem sort of cozy. But since we don't know of one that's handy to the office and has running water (in pipes, that is), electricity, garage and good TV reception — perhaps we will have to settle for some of that metal weatherstripping

## ACTION AT QUANTICO

Descendants of rebels and damyankees, 120 of them in authentic blue and grey representing six confederate and four Union outfits, met again on a Virginia battleground with their .58 caliber breech-loaders. This time, the 11th annual North-South Rifle Reunion met at the Marine Corp rifle range at Quantico for their target and trick shooting matches—and at last report the rebels were ahead.

We think somehow there's a sermon for all America in this two day bivouac of these prideful contestants who have made the trappings and traditions of a bitter day into symbols of competition and fellowship. They provide assurance that the fighting spirit survives, and that Americans will henceforth fight together.

## Ready, Aim, - Don't Fire

In his radio-television report to the people on the Southeast Asia Defense Pact, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said the plans called for "our maintaining at all times powerful naval and air forces in the Western Pacific capable of striking at any aggressor by means and at places of our own choosing."

It will be remembered that General Douglas MacArthur had such forces in Korea, and so did General James Van Fleet, and both wanted to do some striking "by means and at places" of their own choosing. But Korea, of course, is not a member of SEATO.

### Liquor Advertising

By R. D. LANEY

celebrating the 20th anniversary of the repeal of the 18th amendment. Licensed Beverage Distributors, Inc., is congratulating itself (the liquor industry) for the nation on the blessings that have flowed from that repeal. No doubt there were abuses in prohibition, and certainly there has been progress along those lines. But if the liquor industry is to claim the slice of the blame for some of the ills that haven't gone too well since for those problems should be laid at its door.

were 12,000,000 people out of work when prohibition ended. Prohibition didn't cause the depression, nor did the 1,200,000 jobs the liquor industry says it now provides pull the country out of it. And what else the industry provides and merchandises has made 1,000,000 people into alcoholics and 4,000,000 into problem drinkers. Granted that the industry has paid \$43 billion taxes to all units of government during these 20 years, some of which has gone to build schools and hospitals and to aid children and the aged. How much have these same units of government had to spend in the same period for the courts, police, prisons and support of dependents required to take care, in some measure of the effects of liquor?

Thru experience we know that national prohibition of the sale and manufacture of alcoholic intoxicants would create evils even as it sought to stamp them out. But there is far less pain, through partial solution to this problem which would bring forth other equally odious evils nor interfere directly in the individual's personal freedom to drink

or not to drink. This is legislation to outlaw all forms of liquor advertising. Such legislation would not, of course, remove the evils that liquor bring in its train but it would help to arrest the growth of a habit which is now, thru liquor advertising, being furthered and encouraged.

It is a heartbreaking problem which an alcoholic must face when a ceaseless barrage of liquor advertising assaults him at every turn, in newspapers, magazines, subways, on radio, television, and billboard. There are thousands of alcoholics in this country, and many may not be able to resist such a temptation, confront a truly formidable foe in the form of commercial liquor advertising.

Yet in its efforts to persuade more to seek, to persuade us that such and such a beer or whiskey is for "Men of Distinction" or be longs in our home, liquor advertising concerns more than alcoholics. It directly concerns every man, woman and child in the United States. For it's quite clear that when we seek to promote drinking, we seek to promote crime and corruption, increase taxes to care for alcoholics, high way deaths and shattered lives. We know that drunken driving kills thousands of people every year, that a large part of this nation's crime can be laid directly at liquor's door, that Seattle police recently stated that 85 percent of arrests in that area stemmed directly from too much drinking.

How much longer will the Christian people sit back and let the liquor industries thru their attractive, insidious, advertising lead the youth of our land into lives of drunkenness? Thousands of Christian people deplore the "charming liquor" ads in our leading newspapers and magazines. We may only glance at them ourselves, but what about young people? The beautiful young men in those ads are luring them to become drinkers.

Why should we continue to promote in our midst what is clearly an evil with the most dire consequences? Why should we continue to foster thru commercial liquor advertising the very conditions upon which crime and corruption breed? Why should we continue to spend thousands of dollars to care for

and rehabilitate alcoholics and to educate others to the evils of liquor when a constant voice blaring into every avenue of our life and invading the sanctity of the home continues to mock and nullify a large part of such efforts?

Obviously, alcoholism is no new problem. Nor is it confined to shun areas, to the boweries and skid rows of our cities. It is certain we all know from our own experience and from our knowledge of life in the communities in which we live, that yesterday's social drinker may turn up in the best circles, perhaps next door, as today's roblem drinker, caught in the vicious circle of alcoholism.

The invasion of the home by alcohol is not a natural outgrowth of our American culture. It is largely the result of advertising and sales promotion by the liquor and brewing industries. The poverty which drinkers produce is still another force that disrupts family life. No claim is made here that alcohol is the only factor that produced poverty. We do know that the purchase and use of liquor is a very potent factor in the misuse of both individual and family income.

Finally, we can dedicate our homes to total substance. Even many Christian people consider total abstinence absurd. "It is just plain dumb," they will say. Why do we refuse to learn from history? It is because most of us have a notion that we are different of exceptional? "It will not happen to me. I always have myself in hand." How many of America's four million alcoholics felt that way?

## 1954 Agricultural Census to Begin

When a stranger walks up to your farm this month, act kindly sir, he may be a census taker. The Bureau of Census this month begins its 1954 Census of Agriculture and each Texas farmer will answer about 100 questions regarding their land, crops, livestock, farming methods, expenses, labor and equipment. Mr. Carl Pierce, district director, reports it will require 30,000 enumerators to check the more than 5,000,000 farms and ranches in the United States. And it will all be done during October and November. After the enumeration is complete, the Bureau will total the figures and release them. It keeps individual farms' and farmers' secrets by releasing only totals for a county or larger areas, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. Mr. Pierce will give instructions to census takers in Wichita Falls at the Chamber of Commerce Directors' Room on Oct. 26, 27 and 29. Mr. Pierce is, at present interviewing people for census taking.

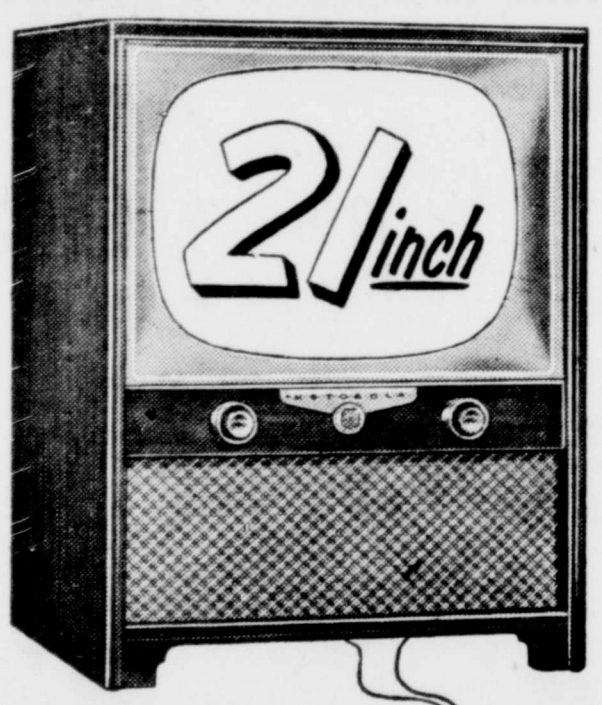

**ORDINANCE NO 222**  
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT

SECTION 1: The State traffic laws regulating speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within this city, except as this ordinance, as authorized by State law, hereby declared and determines upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigations that certain speed regulations shall be applicable upon specified streets or upon certain areas, in which event it shall be prima facie unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed shown on traffic signs erected in compliance with this ordinance.

SECTION 2: Whenever the Chief of Police of Burkburnett, Texas shall determine upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that the 30 miles per hour speed herein before set forth is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist at any intersection or other place or upon any sort of street or highway, said Chief of Police may determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit and the change shall be erected at such intersection or other place or part of the highway or street.

SECTION 3: THE CITY COUNCIL OF BURKBURNETT HAVING DEEMED THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS, THIS ORDINANCE SHALL TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY UPON PASSED THIS THE 27th DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1954.

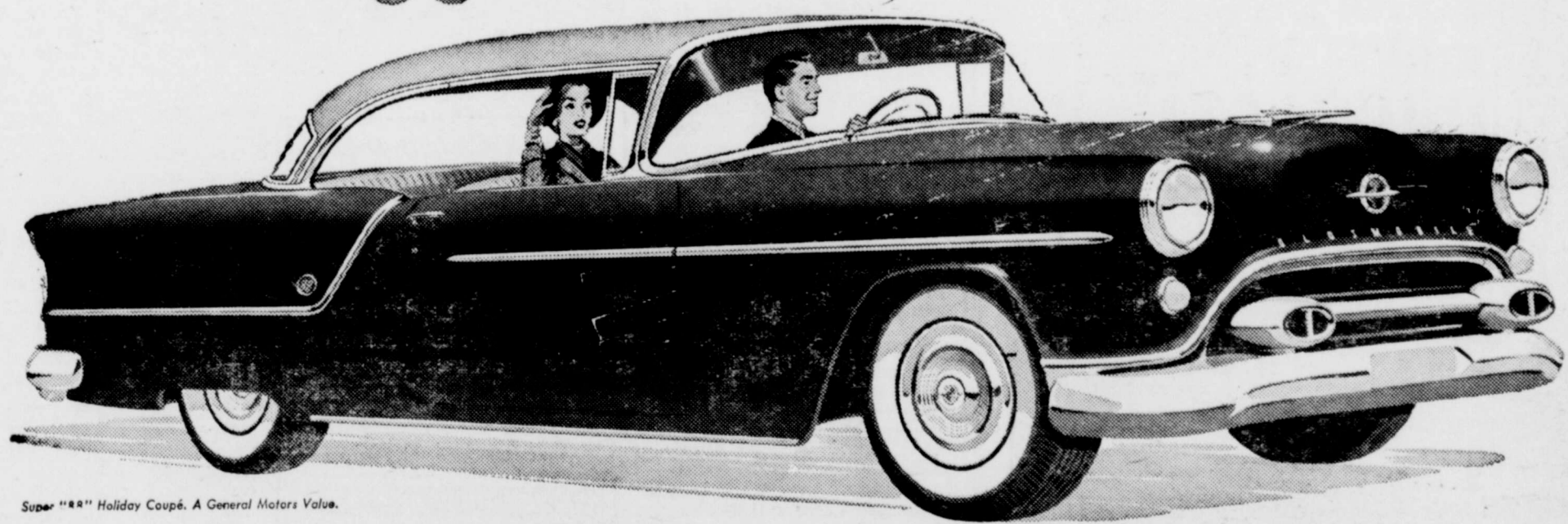

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
