IT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE

The Texas Safety Association asks a pertinent question with your life t That sounds like a foolish question. But, believe it or not, thousands of people take that gamble every year and lose.

Watch people's action in traffic for an indication of the terrible odds they pit their lives against. Perhaps they are dashing off to the office, or rushing home to dinner, or they're late for an appointment. Whatever it may be, they are pressed for time and they begrudge the minute, or the few seconds, it would take to keep them safe.

So to save that minute they take chances, cross against the lights, cross between intersections, dash out into the street from behind parked cars,, gamble on beating an automobile across the street when they know they have barely a chance to make it.

Very often they don't make it. And so the chance takers very quickly become quiet figures on hospitals beds or mortuary slabs.

This isn't a pretty picture, but it's one that needs painting for Texas citizens.

Many pedestrian deaths and injuries would never have occurred if the persons involved had refused to gamble their lives to save a minute.

Think of this next time you are tempted to take a chance in traffic. No matter how important that minute is, it's not worth gambling your life on it.



Night Doubles Traffic Troubles

"Night doubles traffic troubles' Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corp. said today This is more than just another slogan, It's an important truth and one which pedestrians as well as motorists should keep in

At night it often is difficult for drivers to see pedestrians in time to avoid accidents, he said. On the other hand, walkers usually can see the headlights of Herring's Radio & approaching cars for quite a distance. If they are alert, they often can get out of the path of a car before danger strikes.

Col Tilley gave four rules that pedestrians can follow to keep safe when they must walk near traffic after dark.

1. Always walk on the sidewalk, not in the road. If you have to walk on roads that have no sidewalks, walk on the left shoulder of the road facing traf-

2. Cross at intersections whenever possible. At night cross at lighted intersections.

3. Remember, pedestrians in dark clothing are difficult for motorists to see. When walking on a roadway that has no sidewalks, always wear light clothing or carry something white. Better still, carry a flashlight or something made of reflectorized

4. Don't trust your judgment too far in estimating the speed of an approaching car by its headlights at night. Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other

side safely. Col. Tilley's comments were made in connection with the night traffic hazards safety program being sponsored in Texas this month by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the National Safety Council.

Some relatively small steel spite its lack of steel ingot capproducing states are among the leaders in capacity for manufactoring specific steel products, according to American Iron and Steel Institute today.

Texas, for example, has the largest electric-weld-pipe capacity in the United States, although it ranks thirteenth in an nual steelmaking capacity. Texas accounts for nearly 24 percent of this country's 5.5 million ton capacity to produce electric weld

California ranks first of the 19 states with concrete reinforceing bar capacity. It has about 20 percent of the 2 million ton national total

Missouri has the second largest capacity for light structural shapes, although it is sixteenth.

Connecticut, which ranks 22nd nationally in ingot and total hot rolled product capacity, accounts for more than 11 percent of this country's cold rolled strip capacity. In that product Connecticut is outranked only by Ohio, Pennsylvania and illinois.

Every case is an emergency and it is unfortunate that the majority of those with cancer do not seek medical advice early in the first stages of the disease. No hope should be placed in fake cancer cures or treatments. Rather, the annual physical examination and an immediate reporting to your physician of any symptoms which may be suspected to be the beginning of cancer should be relied upon. These symptoms are: any unusual bleeding from any body opening, any lump in the breast or other part of the body, any persistent sore, particularly on the face or mouth, and chronic indigestion. These conditions may not be cancer, but sometimes they are forerunners of the more common types of this disease. Where cancer is suspected, do not delay, but con sult your physician at once.

VETERANS Administration Questions and Answers

Q-I am an ex-WAC, planning to attend school under the Korean GI Bill. My husband is working. Will VA pay me the added GI allowance for a veteran with dependents, even though he is working?

A-No. You could claim the added allowance for your husband only if he were in fact dependent upon you.

Q-As a member of the Reserves, I received pay attending weekly meetings and going on active duty two weeks each year Will this pay be deducted from the monthly allowance I receive as a student in college under the Korean GI Bill?

A-No. Reserves pay will not be deducted from your GI allowance. Neither will any other outside earnings you may receive. Under the law, the monthly allowance for school-going veterans remains the same, regardless of outside income of any kind.

Q-I have a permanent GI insurance policy which lapsed several months ago. To reinstate, I the premiums?

A-Yes. You will be required to pay interest at the stipulated

A-Yes. However, you would not be permitted to convert to an endowment plan while you are totally disabled.

Q-I am a Korean veteran with a service-connected disability rated at zero percent. Am I eligible for the permanent GI insurance available to disabled Korean veterans? Or must I have a disability rated at 10 per cent or more?

A-You may be eligible for the permanent Korean GI insurance even though your serviceconnected disability is rated at
