Who Promoted Peress?

Who promoted Peress and gave him an honorable discharge? The army blames it on rules and procedures, now said to be improved. Sen. McCarthy's reaction is that this is not the full story. He says the army still shields a "silent master." Secretary of the Army Stevens showed a nice sense of timing in picking the distractions of the day after the election to respond to Senator McCarthy's demand that he specify what army officers were responsible for the promotion and honorable discharge of Maj. Irving Peress. When Sen. McCarthy had him up in open hearing and Peress resorted repeatedly to the 5th Amendment, the senator demanded that he be court marshalled. The army hastily rushed him an honorable discharge.

Stevens explanation was that no particular officer, or officers, could be held at fault. It was just "the system." Perhaps you have seen a fly ball drop between three outfielders, all of whom thought the other fellow was going to catch it. Or two halfbacks do the Gaston and Alfonso act while the football bouncers dead to the 1 yard line. If you believe Mr. Stevens, this is what happened in the Peress case. Very few people believe him. Who promoted and gave an honorable discharge to this Communist?

The whole nation is waiting for the answer.

As to the motion to censure Sen. McCarthy. The motion was made by Sen. Flanders of Vermont who calls himself a Republican. Mr. Flanders was promptly joined by a number of Democrats who were sharp enough to see that the resolution was going to do the Republican party a maximum or harm no matter how the senate might decide the question of censure. Accordingly, we think that Mr. Flanders properly be called a cross between a Democrat and a Republican, and the same goes for any other Republican in the senate so misguided as to believe that the Flanders resolution ever should have been adopted.

The proceedings is a masterpiece of hypocrisy as participants in the debate and notably Sen. Walker of Idaho, have made clear. He was particularly effective in his attack on the Democrats who can hardly wait for the moment when they will cast their vote against their Republican colleague. Mr. Walker threw in their faces the passage in the 1952 Republican platform denouncing the Democrats for introducing Communists in the government and protecting them. This was the platform on which Mr. Eisenhower ran for President.

The platform said: "By the Democratic administration's appeasement of Communism at home and abroad it has permitted Communists and their fellow travelers to serve in many key agencies and to infiltrate our American life. When such infiltration became notorious thru the revelations of Republicans in Congress, the executive department stubbornly refused to deal with it openly and vigorously. It raised the false cry of 'red herring' and took other measures to block and discredit investiga-

tions." Sen. McCarthy never used stronger language in describing the foul mess which the Republican party pledged itself to cleanse. Sen. McCarthy was the senator appointed by his colleagues to direct the work, and his reward is to be made the subject of a resolution of censure, as if the Demo-Repubs were carrying out the will of the voters and Sen. McCarthy were proceeding in direct violation of the platform pledge.

Nobody has introduced a resolution of censure against Sen. Ervin, Demo., of N. C., who in speaking to a television audience said of his colleague, Sen. McCarthy, is either morally or mentally incompetent. Likewise there has been no censure of Sen. Stennis, D. of Miss., for referring to a speech of Sen. McCarthy as "slush and slime." and Sen. Flanders, the original Demo-Rep. likened Sen. McCarthy to Hitler. These illustrations of rude language can be extended for pages. In the aggregate they prove that Sen. McCarthy is not being prosecuted for the offenses alleged against him, for if these are offenses, that have been committed repeatedly over the years and have gone unpunished. Sen. McCarthy is being given the works because he is no respecter of persons anywhere in the government when he goes out on the warpath against Communism.

One of the charges made in the resolution against Sen. McCarthy is that of Gen. Zwicker. The General being a lifelong member of an organization in which bawling out has developed into a greater art than almost anywhere else in modern life, the General certainly retained an unusually tender hide. The top sergeant has been notorious in every war from the Revolution to Korea for the censorious manner in which he rebuked recruits. Gen. Pershing, a cavalryman, administered vigorous rebukes to officers. Gen. Patton, another cavalryman, was no less eloquent in World War II. And so what was this particular ordeal that Gen. Zwicker suffered at the hands of Sen. McCarthy? The general was asked who had promoted the suspected Communist, Dr. Peress, and given him an honorable discharge after Peress had invoked the 5th Amendment to evade questions about treasonable connections. The general said he had orders not to reply and Sen. McCarthy gave him a tongue lashing. Sen. McCarthy's language might well have reduced a Boy Scout

to confused hsmse, or left a coed in tears. But he was speaking to a veteran of the regular army, who had been catching and dishing out the same sort of stuff for more than 30 years. The deeds for which McCarthy is being attacked are not unusual. Examples of similar or worse language can be found in the army and in the debates of the senate itself. The McCarthy statements are picked up as an excuse to attack him for his exposure of Communists and his labors to protect his country. Those who join in the attacks against him are making themselves the tools of the Reds, whether they know it or not, and some of them do.

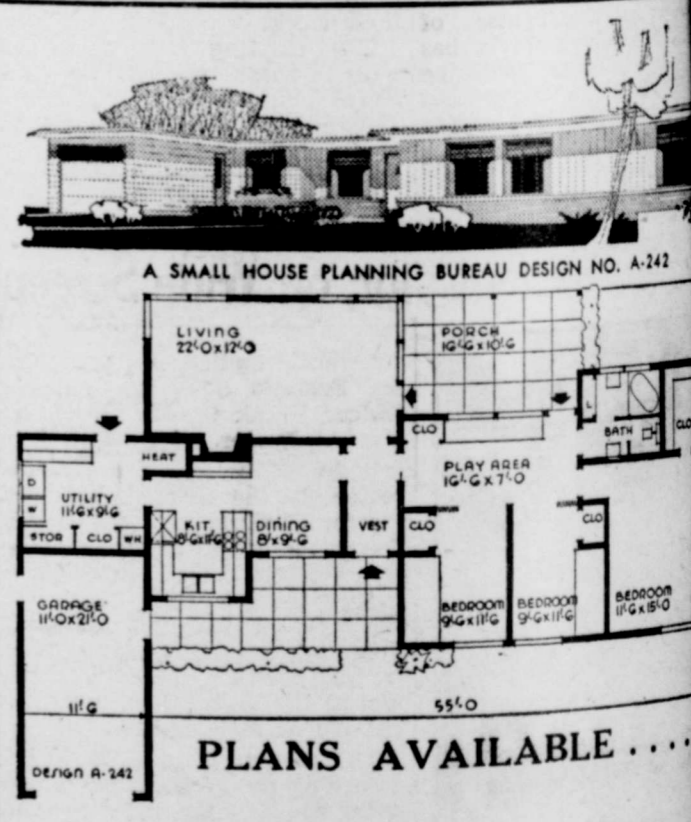

3c Stamps Best On Christmas Cards Says Postmaster

Postmaster Lohofener believes that with a three cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with a two cent stamp.

"First class postage," he explained today, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker, and they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary. This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three cent stamps may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys."

None of these postal privileges are authorized at the third class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 3/4" x 4" or larger than 9" x 12" require cancellation by hand, and must carry first class postage.

The postmaster urges everyone to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles, with each address facing the same way. Then attach a label marked "All For Local Delivery" or "All For Out of Town Delivery." These helpful labels speed the processing in the Post Office, and will shorten delivery time greatly.

Parcell post, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends Dec. 15 for out of state gifts, and Dec. 10 for those with local addresses. But the sooner the better.

VETERANS Administration Questions and Answers

Q—I am studying carpentry in a trade school under the Korean GI Bill. I would like to shift to on-the-job training, also in carpentry. Would that be considered my one and only change of course. Since I still would be training in carpentry?

A—Yes, the switch would be considered your change of course even though your objective remains the same. The reason is that course content and instructional methods differ so materially between classroom and job training that the two types of training could not conceivably be considered the same course.

Q—I have just been separated from service, and I want to apply for Korean GI Insurance. But I don't want to forfeit the free coverage that I have for 120 days following my separation. Should I wait until the end of that period before I apply?

A—No; it is better to apply early. The effective date of your Korean GI Insurance need not necessarily be the date you apply. You can specify that the insurance become effective on the last day of your 120 day coverage.

Q—I spent four years as a cadet in the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. Will that time count in computing my eligibility for Korean GI Bill training?

A—No Under the law, time spent as a cadet or midshipman in a service academy may not be counted in computing Korean GI Bill training eligibility.

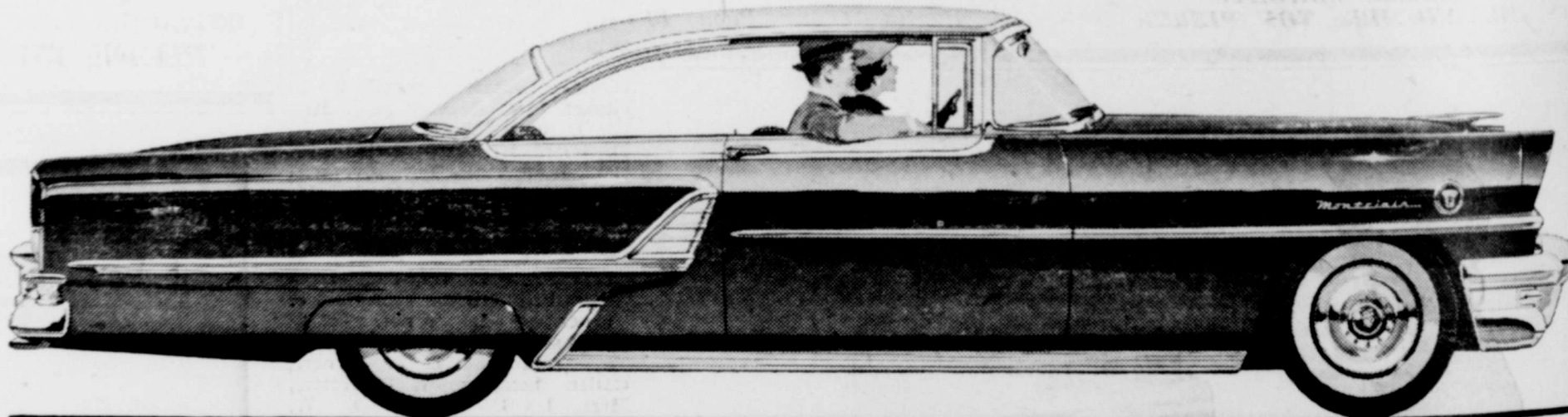

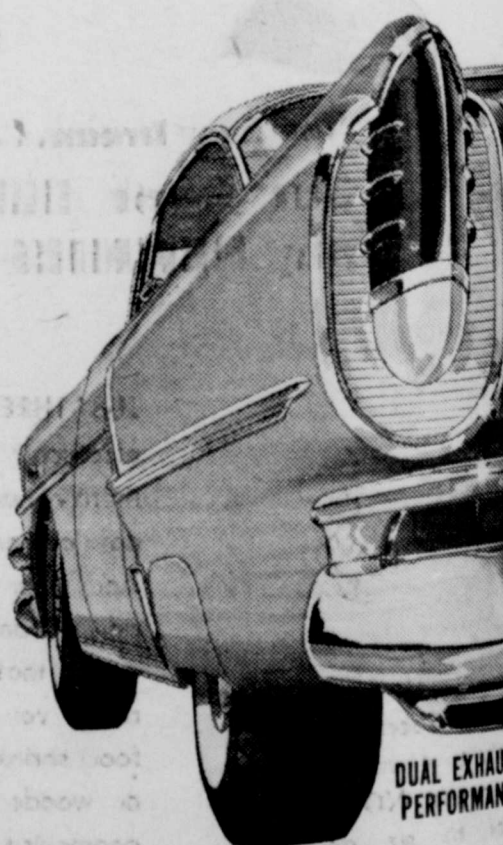
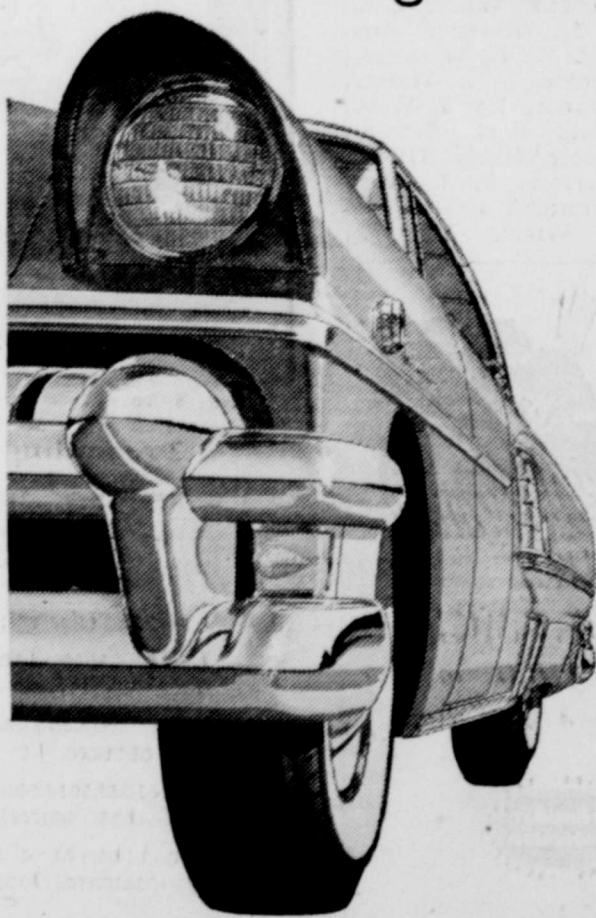

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

HAMILTON, Tex., Herald-News: "When a community asks for a Federal grant for anything at all, they are asking the government to give them back a part of the money that has been taken from them in taxes. This comes after a large number of bureaucrats have taken a dip for unnecessary services."

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Advocate: "J. L. Monroe, the Association of American Railroads' Vice President, told the annual meeting of the Railway Tie Association that the railroads were faced with increasingly tough competition—much of it subsidized by the government. Monroe warned that the country could not afford to let its railroads get into an unhealthy state because of the vital role the railroads play in times of national emergency. Monroe is, of course right in his contention, that railroads are a most vital part of any country's defense system. It is also true that there is no time to build sufficient cars and other rolling stock once a national emergency arises."

BEAVER FALLS, Pa., News-Tribune: "Courtesy costs nothing. It makes living easier and more pleasant. The employees, or the self employed, no matter how hard he works, is giving less than his best if he forgets the need for courtesy in dealing with people."

MIAMI, Fla., Jewish Floridan: "A free society needs men — who are actively engaged in governing themselves. Effective citizenship as a goal of education is more important now than it has ever been in our history."

OIL FOR TOMORROW

What will be the oil situation in the future? Will the industry be able to find and produce enough oil to meet the constantly increasing demands of our rapidly growing population?

The president of a major oil company dealt with such questions in a recent nationally broadcast radio talk. He said there will be plenty of oil, this year, next year and the following years. Oil shale deposits in the state of Colorado alone, he pointed out, contain about 100,000,000 barrels of potential oil — three times our present petroleum reserves.

He further observed that the petroleum industry is spending tens of millions of dollars each year in the search for new pools of underground oil, and in perfecting processes for making oil from shale and coal. Modern machines and techniques have been adopted to supplement the work of traditional ones. Aerial reconnaissance and the use of helicopters, for example, are aiding in the search for oil in areas which were hitherto inaccessible. New drilling methods make it possible to sink wells to depths unheard of only a few years ago. And, he added, long before we approach the end our resources of fossil fuels, atomic energy and solar power will have been developed to where they can take their places as major sources of energy.

This is good news for the 2,000,000 Americans who earn their living in some phase of the oil business — and good news for all the rest of us, who use and depend on oil products every day of our lives.

Getting Government Out Of Business

Everyone who believes in free enterprise should be cheered by a statement Secretary of Commerce Weeks made the other day. "We're trying to get government out of business, every way possible. We have quite a number of industry councils, and one of the things we keep asking these businessmen is this: 'Where is government competing with you?' Then, when we get an answer, we try to do something about it."

This is the kind of policy that will keep this country strong, free and secure.

WE CAN'T BUY PROSPERITY

In an editorial on the federal budget question, the Wall Street Journal observes that government can't buy prosperity, and adds: "All the Government can buy with its manufactured credit money is an inflationary spree like the one we just recovered from."

We should be frequently reminded of that fact. During the inflationary spiral, the great majority of us confused symptoms with causes. We blamed business, labor, and everything but the principal cause of inflation, — which is reckless spending and ever-increasing deficits with no real attempt to effect a cure.

If inflation comes again, it will come from the same cause.

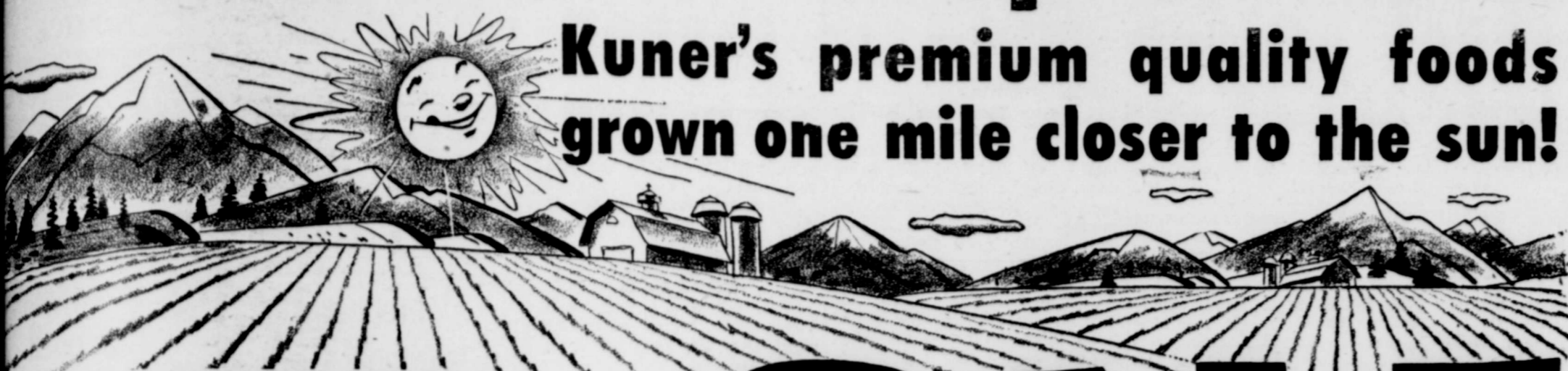

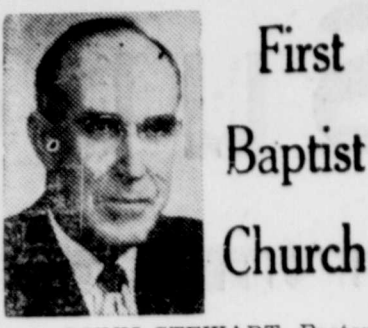
